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MOAH Opens Eyes, Opens Minds

Landmark museum puts local art and history in the spotlight



Scores of local dignitaries and enthusiastic citizens had their first chance to experience Lancaster's new Museum of Art and History (MOAH) on May 5th as the cultural center celebrated its official grand opening.

"This is a world-class addition to our community," noted City Manager Mark V. Bozigian, who joined many City officials and local dignitaries at the official ribbon cutting ceremonies. "MOAH provides an exciting new cultural and educational hub for the entire Antelope Valley."

The innovative space has been designed to exacting standards. A new high-tech climate control system has made it possible for the museum to borrow works from the collections of The Smithsonian and other major museums in the future.

"This is the perfect vessel for our offerings," says Andi Campognone, Interim Curator of MOAH. "It is very contemporary, yet harkens back to the modernism movement of the 1920s."

"Art and history go hand-in-hand. Fine art reflects the times in which it is created," observes Campognone. "Our mission is to document and highlight the attitudes, the materials and the techniques of an era. It is an educational endeavor."

New classroom facilities will allow the museum to further that mission. During the grand opening, the museum conducted eight separate art activities for both children and adults. Such programs will continue in the future, as will its art and history trunk school outreach programs.

"We bring art and history to the students," notes Ronda Perez, Lancaster's Director of Parks, Recreation & Arts. "Children can touch, feel and experience the artifacts and artwork themselves, something that isn't possible within most museums."

Those who wish to support the efforts of MOAH may become members of "Friends of the Museum" which offers special programs and benefits to donors.

"While we are a municipal museum, local support is critical to our mounting new exhibits and bringing art and history alive," says Perez.

MOAH MUSEUM OF ART & HISTORY





Located along The BLVD at Ehrlich Avenue, the new museum provides an impressive profile befitting its elevated stature in the community.



Comprised of nearly 20,000 square feet of exhibit space, MOAH provides ample room to host simultaneous exhibitions.

Current exhibitions include *Smooth Operations: Substance and Surface in Southern California Art*, an exploration into the use of unconventional materials in modern art; *The Painted Desert*, a collection of works from the museum's permanent collection and local artists, offering a variety of Mojave landscapes; and *Indians, Gold Miners and Gunslingers*, a retrospective exploring the history of Lancaster through photographs and artifacts. The ground floor Vault Gallery highlights the works of Stevie Love, the first in a series of solo exhibitions featuring local artists.



A dramatic, glass-enclosed public space provides spectacular views of BLVD activities. In addition to providing a location for lectures, intimate performances and special events, the room can also be reserved for private occasions.

The museum, located at 665 W. Lancaster Boulevard, is open from 11 a.m. to 6 p.m. Tuesdays through Sundays with special evening hours until 8 p.m. on Thursdays, during the BLVD Farmers Market. The museum is closed on Mondays. Admission is \$5 for adults, \$3 for youth and seniors. Children six and under are free. Admission is free on Sundays and free to active military members and their families all summer long.

Lancaster Wins Statewide Community Revitalization Award for Downtown Transformation

The City of Lancaster has been named 2012's best example of Community Revitalization in the state by the California Redevelopment Association (CRA). The association presented its Award of Excellence to the City at ceremonies in Pasadena, alongside winners from much larger cities including San Francisco, San Diego and Long Beach.

Recognized for its coordinated efforts to improve housing, retail and public infrastructure within the downtown area, the City was lauded for leveraging a \$41 million public investment into \$275 million in economic benefit in the midst of a great recession.

"A big part of our success has been our ability to work with private sector partners to achieve a common vision," noted City Manager Mark V. Bozigian. "Along The BLVD and throughout



our downtown area, you'll find a new optimism, new vitality and new opportunities, thanks to the combined efforts of people like Scott Ehrlich and his team, as well as our hardworking City staff. Together we've helped 44 new businesses open, rehabilitated more than 800 housing units and enabled the creation of more than 1,900 local jobs. Now we need to replicate this success in other parts of our City."

City officials recently announced new programs aimed at attracting more

businesses and jobs to the community and are moving aggressively on securing revenue sources to help finance their efforts.

"We are committed to continue on our quest to broaden our employment base, improve the local economy and provide a better quality of life for everyone who lives and works here," said Deputy City Manager Jason Caudle.

"In this post-redevelopment era, we must work harder than ever to find innovative ways to help spur local economic activity. But as this award shows, our people are ready and able to accomplish great things when they put their minds to it," added Bozigian.

Lancaster: New Focus for Growth in Los Angeles County

Inventive plan outlines strategy to bring new jobs, new businesses to community

The San Fernando and Santa Clarita Valleys are reaching their saturation points to accommodate new business growth, according to well-respected commercial real estate giant CB Richard Ellis (CBRE). To meet their needs, firms are looking beyond the Los Angeles basin. This is why CBRE and many other real estate experts believe Lancaster is poised for substantial growth in the months and years ahead.

“Potential business park demand could provide up to 9,850 direct jobs over the next 20 years, while retail demand could support more than 3,700 jobs,” said Craig Peters, Executive Vice President of CBRE. “Indirect jobs will more than double this amount.”

City officials and senior executives from the real estate firm recently announced an expanded strategic partnership to help prepare the City for the growth opportunity.

“Twenty-five years ago, Valencia faced the same issues Lancaster does today. They were considered too far away, they lacked a bit of polish, and their inventory didn’t fully match buyers’ needs,” noted Vince Roche, CBRE Senior Vice President. “Working together, we can change that mindset and put Lancaster on the short list of expansion candidates.”

“Viewing things from a customer perspective has helped us see where we can improve,” said Lancaster Economic Development Director Vern Lawson. “We need to provide prospects with a better first impression, great customer service and more options.”

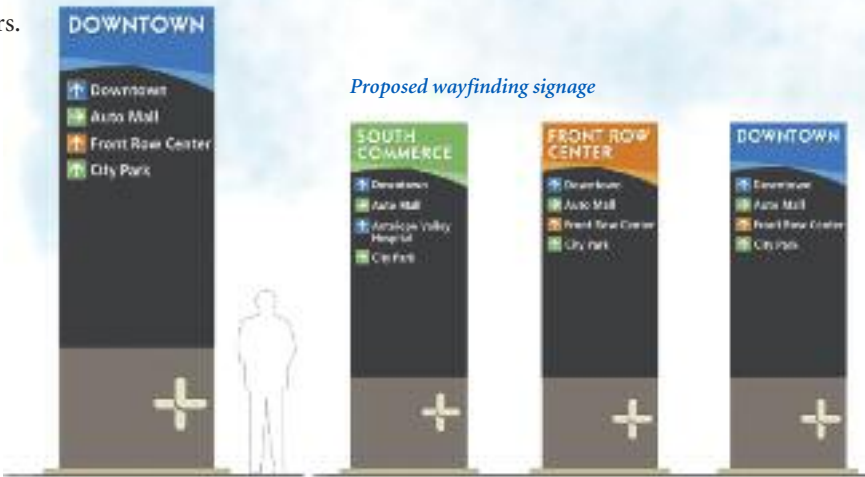
Toward that end, the City is developing plans to improve gateway entrances and key commercial corridors. Borrowing a page from the successful BLVD project, the City is working to create new streetscapes with more approachable, pedestrian-oriented commercial areas and attractive transitional corridors.

One of the first targets is the Lancaster Auto Mall, where much of the City’s sales tax revenue is generated. The City’s goal is to create a better shopping experience, which in turn should help sell more cars.

Another goal is to make it easier for visitors to find their way to the City’s many shopping areas. Attractive and consistent signage will drive business to these areas, helping to increase Lancaster’s tax base.

CBRE is assisting in the development of conceptual plans for select sites to help prospects visualize the possibilities. Such “paper specs” expand the “virtual” inventory of properties without committing major development dollars to building spec space ahead of demand.

“We’ve helped generate nearly 7,000 jobs in the past through the creation of the Lancaster and Fox Field Business Parks. We think we can do it again,” offered City Manager Mark V. Bozigan. “This time we have some pros from the private sector to help us out. We expect big things to happen.”

Fire Service Veteran Has Traveled Far and Wide

Engineer Adrian Meadows named “Firefighter of the Year”

With 27 years in the fire service under his belt, 14 of them piloting various vehicles with red lights and sirens, it should come as no surprise that Firefighter Specialist Adrian Meadows has seen a lot of action in many different places.

As he describes his tenure with the Los Angeles County Fire Department, Meadows rattles off nearly a dozen separate assignments, the latest of which landed him at Station 130 in Lancaster 14 months ago.

“It’s been great,” says Meadows, who has been active in the Antelope Valley inside and outside the department for years.

One of Meadows most rewarding assignments is teaching new recruits the finer points of driving a fire engine, the most important of which is staying alert and aware of your surroundings.

For the last decade, the firefighter specialist has been a member of the elite Urban Search and Rescue Team which responds to a wide range of natural and man-made disasters.

In 2008, Meadows received the department’s Medal of Valor Unit Citation for his team’s response to the tragic Metrolink derailment in Chatsworth.

Engineer Meadows has donated much of his free time coordinating the annual Antelope Valley Fire Services days, an outreach program touching nearly 12,000 area residents. He has also been active in youth sports as a coach for baseball, basketball and hockey.

When not serving the community in one capacity or another, Adrian enjoys spending time with his wife, Ruth, and their three boys.



Lawman Leaves His Mark on Anti-Graffiti Unit

David Keesee named “Deputy of the Year”

To hear Sheriff’s Department Captain Robert Jonsen tell it, Dave Keesee nearly singlehandedly sought to eliminate taggers from local streets. “Dave took ownership of our graffiti reduction effort, and its success is largely due to his leadership.”

From Keesee’s perspective it was much more of a team effort. He was one of four Community Oriented Response and Enforcement (CORE) Team members who took on the task of slowing down graffiti in the community. Over the course of 2011, the team issued nearly 30 warrants and made more than 150 arrests.

“Many taggers are responsible for hundreds, even thousands of markings,” said Keesee. “They do it for fame and to build a reputation with gangs. With a gang enhancement, those convicted face a felony strike on their record and some serious jail time.”

According to Keesee, at its peak, there were nearly 4,000 graffiti incidents per month in Lancaster. In December of 2011, the team was able to bring the total for the month down to a few hundred. Overall graffiti vandalism within Lancaster is down 24%.

The City has played a significant role by providing technology to track and catalog graffiti. This not only saves a lot of time for deputies in the field but also provides important evidence in court.

“Citizens are critical to our success as well,” added Keesee. “People should call the graffiti hotline as soon as they discover a tag, so that it can be quickly removed. When vandals are denied their 15 minutes of fame, the motive often goes away.”

When not chasing bad guys, Dave enjoys spending time camping and exploring with his family. He was raised in the Antelope Valley as part of a military family and was happy to return to the area to serve the community.

Community Salutes "Hometown Heroes"

Strolling down Lancaster Boulevard this spring, you couldn't help but notice 52 bright banners honoring local service men and women who have sacrificed to serve their country and community.

Each banner represented a local resident who has served in Iraq or Afghanistan in recent years. Nine of the banners honored fallen heroes who had given their lives in defense of their country.

"We are a community built around aerospace and we stand proud of our military heritage," proclaimed City Manager Mark V. Bozigian at special ceremonies held at the Lancaster Performing Arts Center on March 13 to honor those who perished or were wounded in combat.

"Freedom exacts a price, a sacrifice that is borne on the shoulders of those not only putting on the uniform but also by their family members... I'm hard pressed to think of a better way to acknowledge their service than to hang a banner bearing their name and image for all to see."

The program, which began in 2010, provides local businesses and individuals with the opportunity to sponsor a banner honoring a local veteran.

Two Simple Tasks to Make Your Family Safer this Summer

With summertime upon us, it's easy to let our to-do lists slide in favor of a dip in the pool or picnic in the park. However, the Los Angeles County Fire Department urges you to add two important items to your list and attend to them soon. They can mean the difference between life and death.

First, install a carbon monoxide (CO) detector. Protecting your family against this deadly colorless, odorless gas is not only critical to your safety, it is the law.

Since July of 2011, every homeowner with an attached garage or any fossil fuel source (stove, heater, dryer, fireplace or furnace) is required to install and maintain a carbon monoxide

detector. We recommend at least one on each floor of your home positioned outside all sleeping areas.

We also urge you to develop a personal escape plan for your family and practice it at least twice a year. Draw up a floor plan for your home and identify at least two ways out of each room including windows. Be sure windows can be opened easily, and if you live in a two story home, identify how to reach the ground safely using your alternate exit. Be sure your plan deals appropriately with any small children or elderly who may need special assistance.

Develop a home fire escape plan today... it could save your life tonight!

1. Draw a floor plan of your home.
2. Include all possible emergency exits.
3. Show two ways out of every room, if possible.
4. Does anyone need help to escape?
5. Choose a meeting place outside.
6. Call the fire department from outside your home.
7. Practice your escape.



Once everyone understands the plan, practice it. Try using the alternate routes you defined. You never know when your preferred path may be blocked by flames or debris.

Set a safe place for everyone to meet outside and count heads. In a real emergency, call 911 as soon as you reach safety. Do not go back into a burning home for any reason.

With a good plan and CO detector now in place, relax and enjoy your summer knowing you're ready to face an unexpected emergency.

Lock Up for Safety

Common sense precautions help prevent problems

Nearly 40% of all residential burglaries in Lancaster occur in homes left unlocked or with windows unsecured. The number rises to 60% for vehicles left unlocked.

"In order for us to help keep our community safe, residents need to act responsibly and take the necessary safety measures to deter theft," said Captain Robert A. Jonsen, commander of the Lancaster Sheriff's Station. "By just taking a few extra seconds to secure your valuables, you could be protecting yourself and your family from a burglary."

By locking your doors and windows and not leaving a spare key in an obvious spot such as under the doormat or in a flowerpot, you can significantly reduce the chance of your home being burglarized.

To help reduce vehicle burglaries, simply lock your car and take your keys with you, even when you are parked in your own driveway. Also, be sure to roll up all car windows and place valuables out of sight, preferably in a locked trunk or glove box.

Lee D'Errico, Lancaster Public Safety Manager, offers these insights: "You are an integral player in the fight against crime – use common sense. Don't make it easy for thieves to take advantage of you. Lock your home and vehicle and discourage burglars from victimizing your property."

City Wins Nearly \$500,000 in CalRecycle Grants

New cleanup efforts and recycling projects planned

The City of Lancaster has been awarded a series of four separate grants from CalRecycle to address environmental issues within the community.

Nearly \$90,000 was awarded to help clean up illegally dumped materials on agricultural land within the City.

Another \$300,000 was allotted to dealing with illegal dumping, hazardous materials and litter control. The funds will be used for enforcement, mitigation and prevention programs.

A third grant for close to \$50,000 will be used to implement a used motor oil recycling program. These moneys will help pay for public awareness and education, inspection of local collection centers, as well as mitigating oil spills and illegal dumping of oil.

The final grant of more than \$40,000 will be used to design and implement beverage container recycling programs in City parks, schools and at public events.

Don't Waste Water

During summer months, limit your lawn and landscape watering to between 10 p.m. and 10 a.m. Adjust your sprinkler timers to avoid needless water loss due to evaporation or wind.

Inoperable Vehicles

Driveways are for parking, not vehicle storage. Inoperable and unlicensed vehicles detract from the overall appearance of your neighborhood and cannot be stored in public view. An inoperable vehicle is defined as any vehicle that is immobilized or mechanically incapable of being driven on a highway. If it isn't drivable and/or doesn't have current registration, keep it off the driveway and out of site.



Trash Talk

Waste containers also need to be kept out of public view, except on trash collection day. Store receptacles behind a fence or within an approved enclosure.

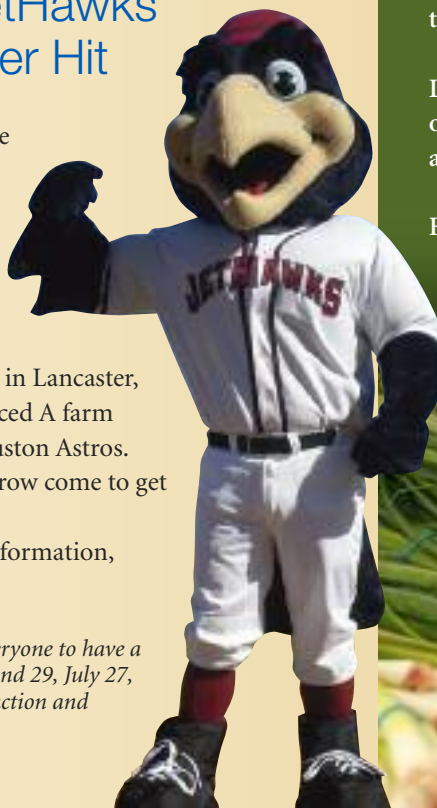

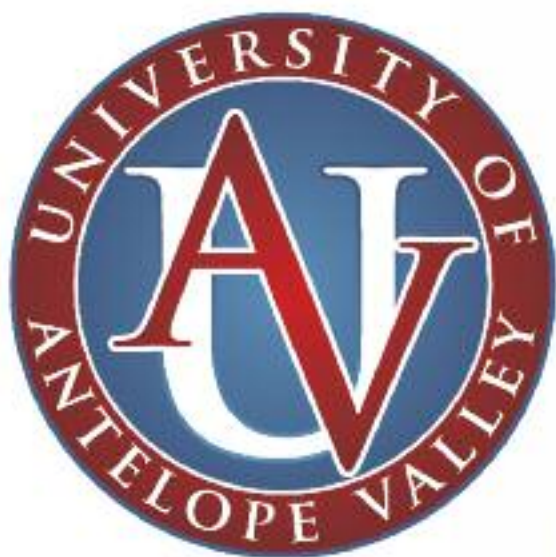

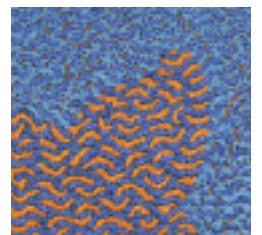
