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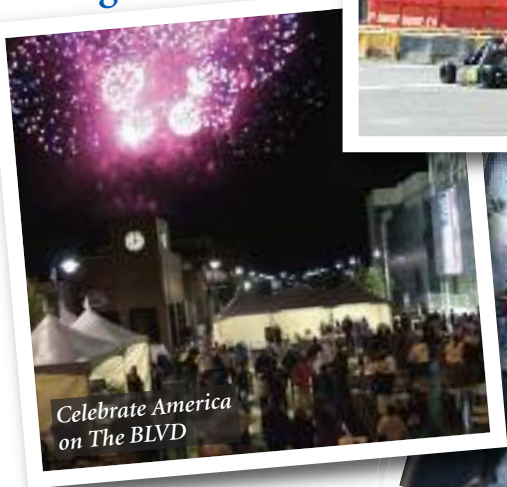

# FOCUS on Energy

*Lancaster leads the way in renewable energy*

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The City of Lancaster is providing a shining example of what is possible today with solar and other renewable energy sources.

Working with key partners in the private sector, the City has created groundbreaking pilot projects which demonstrate real potential. The City partnered with KB Home and BYD to build the “Home of the Future” which generates more power than it uses. Working with SolarCity, Lancaster has also created an aggressive on-site solar program. The City is also sharing the knowledge it has gained with other agencies across the state through the recently formed California Clean Energy Authority.

Such leadership is being recognized globally and has earned the respect of public agencies and sustainability experts everywhere.

## City Recognized as Global Leader in Solar Energy

*Public/private partnerships earn Lancaster the Energy Globe Award for the United States*

Lancaster’s efforts to become a Net Zero community have earned the City an Energy Globe Award, one of the world’s most prominent and prestigious environmental awards.

The award was created in 1999 by Austrian energy pioneer Wolfgang Neumann and is juried by a group of renowned experts in sustainability. Many consider it the green equivalent to an Oscar® award.

Competing among some 800 projects globally, Lancaster was chosen as the best from across the nation.

“Among all the projects submitted from the United States, the City of Lancaster’s endeavors shone the brightest,” offered Austrian Trade Commissioner Rudolf Thaler. “This forward-thinking city is harnessing the power of one of its greatest natural resources - the sun - and taking advantage of the abundant opportunities for solar energy.”

Cited for both the Solar Lancaster program created in cooperation with SolarCity and the “Home of the Future” prototype built with KB Home and China-based BYD, the selection committee noted that partnering with the private sector was instrumental in the success of these programs.

“Lancaster has masterminded and facilitated a public/private partnership of international proportions which has provided the citizens of Lancaster affordable energy-efficient homes in record time,” said the selection committee.

Spearheading these efforts on behalf of the City is the Lancaster Power Authority, an independent joint powers authority formed to explore new power generation and distribution opportunities both here and across the state.

# California Clean Energy Authority Helps Other Cities Learn Sustainable Best Practices

*Innovative joint powers authority designed to aid agencies in meeting new state mandates*

The City of Lancaster is offering its experience and knowledge in solar projects and recycling programs to other cities through a revolutionary joint powers authority known as the California Clean Energy Authority (CCEA).

“Few agencies, if any, have the breadth of knowledge in alternative energy that Lancaster has developed over the last

several years,” noted Jason Caudle, Deputy City Manager.

Recent state legislative actions have mandated that one-third of all power created by the state’s 43 municipal utilities come from renewable sources by 2020. Few cities know how to accomplish this directive. The CCEA will help by guiding them through the process Lancaster has already gone through in helping to create the many new solar sites within Lancaster.

Additionally, AB341 requires that all California cities divert 75% of their waste stream from landfills and into reclamation programs. Again, Lancaster has shown strong leadership in this area and is sharing its knowledge with other municipalities through the CCEA.

“With the formation of the joint powers authority, we’re leveraging our experience to aid other cities, while also helping to defray some of the costs of being a pioneer,” stated Caudle. “The knowledge we’ve gained is of great value to those who must implement these looming mandates. Add to this the many other benefits of a joint powers authority and the CCEA provides us with a powerful vehicle to guide and assist others in achieving cost-effective sustainability.”

## AV Clearview Transmission Line to Provide Pathway for Burgeoning Solar Power

While the Antelope Valley is an ideal region for solar power generation, it currently lacks sufficient infrastructure to connect numerous alternative energy facilities to the statewide energy grid.

The High Desert Power Authority (HDDPA), a new joint powers authority between the cities of Lancaster and Pittsburg, California, along with Kern County, aims to solve this problem. HDDPA is creating the AV Clearview Transmission Line, a conduit which will connect Antelope Valley and Kern County solar, wind and other renewable projects into the statewide grid.

The project is a high-voltage underground transmission cable which will span nearly 40 miles across the Antelope Valley from Edwards Air Force Base to the Vincent-Lugo transmission line south of Highway 138.

While building underground is more costly than traditional transmission towers, the overall impact on the environment and the community will be greatly reduced.

“This project is an opportunity to jumpstart economic development in the region,” said City Manager Mark V. Bozigian. “It will provide hundreds of good jobs during construction and will allow several solar plants currently on the drawing boards to begin building in anticipation of the new grid connection.”

The venture is being built by the HDDPA in cooperation with designers from Critical Path Transmission.

Currently under regulatory review, the project could begin construction in 2014 and be fully operational by 2017, allowing the project to contribute substantially to the state’s goal of generating 33% of its power needs from renewable energy sources by 2020.

# City Services Remain Strong Despite Declining Dollars

*Prudent fiscal management and dedicated staff allow City to do more with less*

There is no arguing that these are difficult times for cities nationwide. California communities have been particularly hard hit due to the state's ongoing fiscal crisis. Yet through it all, the City of Lancaster has found ways to serve its citizens well.

"We continue to weather tough times," noted City Manager Mark V. Bozigian. "Sales tax revenues are improving, we are operating at greater efficiency, and we've put great partnerships in place to help us better serve our residents. Sadly, the biggest challenge we face today is from other levels of government."

While the City lost substantial funds due to the state's decision to disband all redevelopment agencies, it continues to provide important City services at effective levels to satisfy customer needs. This has taken a good deal of creativity and innovation as well as tremendous support from the community.

For example, today there are 16 Wellness and Neighborhood Impact Homes in local neighborhoods designed to improve wellness and provide a positive environment for youngsters after school. These are all operated by volunteers from the medical community and faith-based organizations. While the City helped provide the locations,

none of these would be possible without community support.

At a corporate level, local businesses have stepped up to sponsor concerts and special events which help ensure that we maintain a true sense of community within Lancaster.

The City is developing new sources of revenue as well. Through innovative programs such as the Lancaster Power Authority and the California Clean Energy Authority, the City is creating new income possibilities while helping others benefit from its solar experience.

Lancaster has also aggressively pursued grants and special funding to help augment reduced sales and property tax revenues.

While the City has managed to avoid layoffs, it now employs 84 fewer staff members due to attrition. City employees have stepped up and helped in many other ways as well.

Despite all the challenges, City staff remains highly motivated and dedicated to finding new ways to accomplish more with less.

The magnificent Museum of Art and History (MOAH) stands as a shining example of this. It is truly amazing what can be accomplished with a little creativity and cooperation.

Lancaster has also attracted a major new employer to the City, Morton Manufacturing, and with it, over 300 jobs.

Nearly \$18 million in capital improvements will move forward in the coming year for the benefit of all who live and work here.

By working together as a community, Lancaster has managed to weather the last five years of the recession. The road ahead will undoubtedly be bumpy, but by continuing to team up with local citizens and businesses, Lancaster's future will remain positively clear.

## Maker of High-Tech Fasteners Latches onto Lancaster for Major Expansion

*Prominent aerospace provider brings new jobs, new opportunities to City*

Santa Clarita-based Morton Manufacturing is pulling up stakes and relocating their entire manufacturing facility to Lancaster within the next 12 to 18 months.

Morton is just one example of a trend predicted by a recent CBRE report commissioned by the City, which noted that the LA basin was running out of space to accommodate successful, growing manufacturers.

The high-tech supplier of precision bolts is bursting at the seams, attempting to operate out of their existing 45,000-square-foot facility.

“We are elbow to elbow down there,” explained Morton’s Chief Operating Officer Dale Ray. “We need to expand our capacity.”

Operating two shifts, the company has been cranking out 1.2 million fasteners a month. By next year they must deliver at least 1.5 million units a month just to keep up with existing orders.

Morton will build a new 86,000-square-foot facility on a 10-acre site in the Lancaster Business Park, bringing 300 jobs to the Antelope Valley.

The company is one of the leading suppliers of aircraft engine fasteners in the world, serving customers such as General Electric, Pratt & Whitney and Rolls Royce.

With many of their staff already living in the Antelope Valley, moving north where land is plentiful simply made sense. The company evaluated a dozen sites before selecting the parcel in the Lancaster Business Park.

“The dedication and support we’ve received from the City has been very encouraging,” offered Morton CEO Yolanda Morton. “We have never seen cooperation like this before.”

“Manufacturing jobs are ‘wealth-inducing,’ with each job creating additional jobs in the service sector,” said Economic Development Director Vern Lawson Jr. “Every dollar generated in manufacturing supports \$1.40 in output from other sectors.”

As a result, when all is said and done, upwards of 1,200 new jobs could be created by this move.



# New Retail Center to Spice Up Intersection with Chipotle Grill, Starbucks and More

After several years of searching for the perfect spot to locate in Lancaster, Chipotle Grill has chosen a site at the corner of Avenue K and 10th Street West.

To be located on the northeast corner of the intersection, the center will be built on the site of an old gas station, thus putting a fresh face on the parcel across from the popular Lowe's Center and diagonal to the resurgent Commerce Center.

"Restaurants and retailers want to be near other successful food services and stores," noted Planning Director Brian Ludicke. "With the success of Chili's, Rubio's and Panera Bread, it is only natural that Chipotle chose this spot to firmly establish their brand here in Lancaster."

Known for their generously proportioned and freshly prepared burritos, tacos and salads, Chipotle has earned a loyal following as large as their blimp-sized burritos.

A Starbucks coffeehouse will also locate in the redeveloped retail complex along with an existing Jack in the Box, which will undergo expansion and remodeling. Construction is slated to begin by the end of the year with anticipated completion in late 2013.

Nearby, See's Candies is relocating its shop within the Commerce Center, which will also be home to a new Yoshinoya Japanese Restaurant. In addition, WSS, a leading southern California shoe retailer, recently added Lancaster to their list of 55 stores statewide.

See's, founded in 1921, is well-known and well-loved throughout the West for their premiere chocolate candies.

Yoshinoya's popular Teriyaki Bowls combine fresh vegetables with chicken, beef and rice to make a delicious, healthy meal. With more than 1,400 locations worldwide, this is the company's first foray into the Antelope Valley.

"We're very pleased to see this resurgence in retail activity," said Ludicke. "It shows that businesses see Lancaster as a great growth opportunity."

## Illuminating Facts About Candles



With Halloween and the holidays right around the corner, now is a great time to refresh your awareness of safety issues with candles and other live flames in your home.

Throughout the last decade as the popularity of decorative and scented candles has grown, fires attributed to candles have tripled.

Forty-one percent of candle fires in the U.S. begin in the bedroom, causing 24% of the deaths resulting from these fires.

The Los Angeles County Fire Department reminds residents to be careful when burning candles, and follow these simple safety rules:

- Place candles in proper holders.
- Keep candles away from curtains or furniture and leave at least three feet of clearance overhead.
- Keep children and pets away from flames and avoid contact with clothing or hair.
- Extinguish all candles before leaving the room, using a snuffer or spoon.
- Never go to sleep with a candle still burning or use a candle or oil burner in a child's bedroom.
- Do not use candles for emergency illumination. One-third of people killed in candle fires were using them during a power outage.
- Have reliable flashlights available for use during power problems. Keep them in handy, accessible places including the bedroom, kitchen and car.

Candles can be beautiful, festive and romantic. Don't spoil the mood by using them carelessly.

# UNITE Winners Focus on Helping El Dorado Youth

*Lancaster's Neighborhood Vitalization Commission announces the 2012 winners of community improvement projects*

"The purpose of the UNITE (Uniting Neighbors In a Team Effort) program is to empower residents to help define the changes they wish to see in their community," said Patti Garibay, program coordinator. "Through UNITE, residents have the opportunity to propose projects they believe will enhance the quality of life in their neighborhood."

Many of the winning projects involve ideas to assist younger members of the community including development of a chess program at El Dorado Elementary, a Back-to-School Boot Camp for incoming students of Endeavor Middle School, and a bike and pedestrian safety program.

Also included in this year's awards is an anti-bullying program which will build awareness, while helping victims. A new mentoring program for young adults 15-24 received assistance as well.

Other winning projects are designed to help improve community aesthetics. These include a clean-up program for planters along

Fig Avenue and an address number painting program to help improve emergency response times.

In 2012, UNITE has adopted a more targeted approach. All of this year's projects are located within the El Dorado neighborhood, which encompasses the area from Avenue J to Lancaster Boulevard and from Division Street to Challenger Way.

Winning projects were evaluated on six criteria, including self-reliance, neighborhood involvement, sustainability, community benefit, partnership building and innovation.

# Tending to Business

## Viable Promotions without Visual Pollution

*Guidelines for proper signage within Lancaster*

Finding the right balance between promoting beauty and commerce can be a challenge. This is why the City of Lancaster has established a set of rules for signage within the City.



- An approved sign plan is required before erecting any permanent signage. You may contact the City's planning department for details.
- Once a sign has been installed, it must be kept in good repair. Broken signs or ones in disrepair may be cited.
- Window signs cannot exceed 25% of the total window area.
- With the exception of auto dealerships, temporary signs such as banners, flags, pennants and A-frames are not allowed.
- Signs that block the public right-of-way or pose potential line of sight issues for pedestrian and vehicular traffic are sure to attract the attention of Code Enforcement. Thus, avoid placing temporary signs on the sidewalk or any public right-of-way.
- Signs posted or affixed to utility poles, street lights or other areas of the public right-of-way contribute to visual blight and are prohibited.

All businesses are encouraged to make themselves aware of the City's Sign Ordinance and cooperate in helping to keep Lancaster an attractive and appealing place to do business.

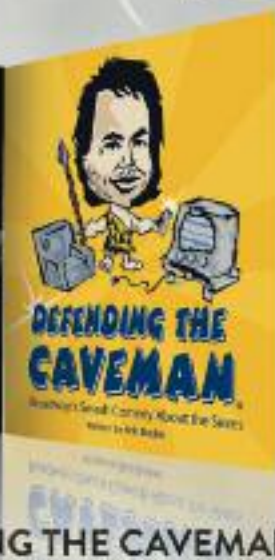
