#### **PRESENTATIONS**

1. Recognition for National Service Day – Cities across the country are increasingly turning to national service and volunteerism as a cost-effective strategy to address city challenges. To spotlight their impact and thank those who serve, the Corporation for National and Community Service, in cooperation with the United States Conference of Mayors has proclaimed April 9, 2013 as the first-ever Mayors Day of Recognition for National Service. A brief video from the Corporation for National & Community Service and the City of Lancaster regarding community service was shown; Mayor Parris presented a Proclamation to Steven Derryberry, Chairman of the Lancaster Neighborhood Vitalization Commission, in recognition of April 9, 2013 as National Service Day.

2. Walking School Bus Program Presentation

Presenter: Donita Winn, AV Union High School District Board Member and Organizer Ms. Winn briefly discussed the program and the organizations involved in the Walking School Bus Program which include the Sheriff's Department, High Desert Medical Group and Lancaster School District; she discussed recent walks held at West Wind, Miller and Lincoln Elementary schools, students received wristbands which identified them as 'walking school bus' riders; Ms. Winn thanked City staff who were heavily involved with the program and stated the Lancaster School District will be starting the program in the Fall and will be walking every morning.

### CC 6. ACCEPTANCE OF AN AMENDMENT TO SUBDIVISION UNDERTAKING AGREEMENT

Approved and accepted an amendment to the Subdivision Undertaking Agreement submitted by Magnolia, LP ("Subdivider"), for Tract Map No. 53102, located on the southwest corner of Avenue J-8 and 45<sup>th</sup> Street West, extending the date of completion to March 12, 2015.

#### CC 7. APPROVAL OF A GRANT OF EASEMENT

Approved the Grant of Easement for underground water supply lines, appurtenant fixtures and other equipment necessary including ingress/egress purposes to Lancaster Promenade III, LLC, a California limited liability company, being a portion of the property identified as Assessor's Parcel No. 3134-009-915 and authorized the City Manager or his designee to execute all documents necessary to complete the transaction.

#### CC 8. DESIGNATING CITY MANAGER AS SIGNATORY FOR PBID

Designated the City Manager as the signatory representing the City on documents related to the formation of the proposed Downtown Lancaster Property-Based Improvement District (PBID) and authorized the City Manager or his designee to execute related documents.

#### NB 1. LANCASTER CRIMINAL JUSTICE COMMISSION UPDATE

Dr. David Vierra, Chair and Lee D'Errico, Public Safety Manager discussed part-one crime statistics for 2012 and stated the goal for 2013 will be 250 part-one crimes per 10,000 residents; discussed the focus for 2013 will be on larcenies and crime prevention related to larcenies. The Criminal Justice Commission is working with businesses that have minimal loss prevention policies/programs or do not have loss prevention policies/programs in place; Mr. D'Errico discussed the effect larcenies are having on the crime rate. A program called the Business Improvement Group (BIG) has recently been implemented and will target businesses in specific business districts in the City. The businesses near Avenue K and 10<sup>th</sup> Street West will be the first focused area. Mr. D'Errico discussed Target's strong loss prevention program, and stated sharing strategies and the sharing of information will be the focus in this targeted area; the thought is that by eradicating larcenies the part-one crime rate will be eradicated.

Mayor Parris asked if the names of businesses who do not participate will be released; Mr. D'Errico stated that if businesses cooperate, releasing the name may not be needed; if a business does not cooperate it may come to that. Mr. D'Errico stated a status report will be brought to the City Council in 60 days.
