



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#### Cedar Center for the Arts Returned to Former Glory

#### A heritage of fine and performing arts is preserved



The history of the Cedar Center dates back to the early 1920s, but few today know it better than Cedar Street Theatre's Artistic Director Barbara Coates. Now in her 37th year

with the company, she spent 15 of them mounting

more than 50 shows on the Center's stage.

"It was really a lot of fun back then," said Coates, who still performs at the Lancaster Performing Arts Center (LPAC). "What we lacked in gear and space, we made up for with creativity."

"It got cozy at times. Our dressing room was the kitchen. When you had 20 people crammed in there for a musical, you had to be careful what kind of undergarments you wore!"

"The talent and artistry shown by our little theater group was amazing. We drew performers from throughout the valley and beyond. Most would consider our performances to be of

"We've come full circle," says Coates. The same can be said for the Cedar Center for the Arts.

Little more than a year ago, the Center seemed rather long in the tooth, with years of use and countless coats of paint masking its full potential. Today, the newly restored Cedar Center for the Arts stands as testament to the talents within our community.

"It's been a labor of love," said Lancaster Housing & Neighborhood Revitalization Director Elizabeth Brubaker, who spent months searching for electrical fixtures, locks and floor coverings that would faithfully recreate the ambiance of an earlier era.

"The Cedar Center has been an anchor in our community for many years," noted City Manager Mark V. Bozigian. "The Mayor and City Council simply didn't want to lose it."

The entire 12,500-square-foot facility has been restored. A few modern touches have been added here and there for safety and convenience, but the aesthetic of the original Art Deco design has been retained throughout. Overall costs for the project were tabbed at \$750,000. Waste Management helped underwrite some of the costs while several area contractors performed much of the work.

Restoration was completed in the spring and this summer, the newly christened Cedar Center for the Arts once again celebrated the joy and inspiration that art can bring to a community.

#### Visual and Performing Arts Offered at Newly Revitalized Cedar Center

The City has wasted no time in putting the fully restored Cedar Center for the Arts to good use. More than 30 classes are scheduled at the facility this fall.

Theatre programs include acting and vocal classes, a Shakespeare program and a kids theatre class.

Dance classes range from hula to jazz, while music programs teach guitar, drums and piano.

The Fine Arts program includes classes in animation and character design as well as new poetry classes.

The Center's Gallery, an extension of the Museum of Art and History, features the works of local artists. The Gallery is open Thursday through Sunday from 2 until 8 p.m.

Thursday nights also bring back the popular Open Mic night to the Center's stage. Here, local musicians, poets and comics demonstrate their talents before enthusiastic crowds starting at 7 p.m.

"An eclectic collection of specialty programs are also being offered," said Ronda Perez, Director of Parks, Recreation & Arts. "Students can explore their spiritual, physical and mental well-being through yoga and Tai Chi programs, as well as some other never before offered specialty classes. They can also strengthen their math and science skills by attending the Innovative Education programs."

Watch as top pro drivers careen down The BLVD at breakneck speeds of up to 100 mph. Enjoy local celebs battling for bragging rights and perhaps catch a glimpse of some motorsport superstars of tomorrow. Many top pros, including seven-time Formula One champ Michael Schumacher, NASCAR stars Darrell Waltrip and Kyle Petty as well as Indy racer Sarah Fisher, got their start racing karts.

Last year's race drew more than 30,000 spectators. Even more thrill seekers are expected for this year's three-day weekend event.

Accompanying the race action will be a festive street fair complete with a classic car show, many fun children's activities as well as live entertainment and great food from the numerous BLVD restaurants.

The action-packed schedule kicks off Friday with a Media Challenge Race, where reporters get behind the wheel for some "On-the-Street" interviews.

Saturday is filled with practice and qualifying events leading up to the Mayor's Gold Cup Race, Guns & Hoses (Sheriff's versus Fire Department) and the VIP BLVD Series. Saturday night, they'll be dancing in the street with live bands.

The pros hit the field on Sunday to showcase their skills. Top racers will vie for championship points and prize money across 10 competition classes.



#### New fiscal year 2014-15 budget pegged at \$108 million

While many municipalities have struggled during the past few years, Lancaster has survived and even thrived.

What's different here? Perhaps it is the dedication and creativity of the people. Talk to City staffers and you'll find attitudes more akin to scrappy Silicon Valley startups.

The City of Lancaster is always looking for better ways to do things, creating greater efficiencies while questioning why some tasks should continue being done at all. It is a refreshing approach to governance and is what sets Lancaster apart from so many other cities.

It starts with visionary leadership – people who are willing to take calculated risks and fully embrace those ideas that prove themselves to work well.

Developing strong relationships within the business community is also an important factor. By partnering with civic-minded private sector leaders, the City is able to achieve far more than could be done alone.


This year's budget reflects this startup attitude. It embraces sensible change, finds new efficiencies and discovers ways to accomplish goals and objectives at lower costs.

#### **PAVING THE WAY**

Through its innovative Pavement Preservation Program, the City's Development Services Department is making tax dollars go further by focusing on performing less costly, yet more frequent maintenance techniques while utilizing City staff rather than outside contractors. The program has increased the number of lane miles serviced by 200%, while lowering costs by 10 to 25% versus prior methods.

#### SEEING THE LIGHT

Upon doing the math, Lancaster realized it could do a more efficient job of lighting our streets than Southern California Edison (SCE) is currently doing. So the City initiated a plan to buy 18,000 streetlights from SCE, resulting in a savings of nearly \$400,000 per year. Upgrading lampposts to use more efficient LED lighting and taking advantage of new renewable sources could create even greater savings, while helping the City achieve its "Net-Zero" goal of consuming less energy than it generates.



To further its energy independence, the City has started the process of creating Lancaster Choice
Energy, which will provide local businesses and residents with an alternative source for their electricity. Under the program, SCE will continue to deliver power and provide customer service and billing, but this new local entity will provide the power from a combination of both traditional and renewable sources. It is anticipated that Choice Energy will begin providing power to municipal customers in mid-2015, with business and residential customers following thereafter.

#### FINDING NEW FRIENDS

The City continues to work closely with the business community to identify new ways to fund efforts which benefit both public and private sectors. Both Destination Lancaster and The BLVD Association now

derive funding from special Business Improvement Districts, with member-supported self-assessments, in order to finance tourism and special events. Residents benefit from the higher sales and transient occupancy revenues generated by these increased marketing efforts.

#### **INNOVATION FOR THE NEXT 50**

As the landscape of local government continues to evolve, the City is taking a proactive approach. The City is thinking beyond this year's budget, even further than a five-year plan, to envision what Lancaster will look like 50 years in the future. By creating a sound, sustainable plan for sensible growth which balances environmental, economic, individual and collective needs, the City hopes to set new standards for how local government can best fulfill its role in a future where new challenges and opportunities frequently arise .

#### City Invests in Auto Mall's Future

Business expansion and streetscape improvements help drive new revenues to City

For the last 26 years, the Lancaster Auto Mall has been one of the largest ongoing contributors of sales tax revenues to City coffers.

Each time a car is sold, 1% of the selling price goes to help fund vital services. If you buy a used car for say \$5,000, you may be contributing \$50 towards road repair. A \$50,000 luxury car could mean \$500 for public safety.

This is why the City of Lancaster is investing in streetscape and signage improvements to the Auto Mall and is helping to support expansion plans for Clutter Motors, the parent company of Lancaster Honda.

Under the plan, the Honda dealership will be temporarily relocated next door while the current site undergoes extensive renovation and expansion from 28,000 to 40,000 square feet. Once this new Honda Super Center is complete, the temporary facility will then become the showroom for Clutter Motors' recently acquired motorcycle and watercraft dealership.

"This is a good deal for the City, as well as a good deal for the auto mall," noted City Economic Development Director Vern Lawson.

The streetscape improvements will include new sidewalks, gutters and improvements designed to make the Auto Mall more inviting and walkable. The aim is to create a "sense of community" similar to that achieved in the award-winning BLVD project in downtown Lancaster.

"Clutter Motors has been an important part of our community for nearly 30 years," said City Manager Mark V. Bozigian. "They have been a good partner in economic development and a strong supporter of civic programs. When we have an opportunity to partner with a corporate citizen of this caliber, it only makes sense to leverage that asset."

### Lancaster prepares to launch Southern California's first Community Choice YOUtility

In the next year or two, Lancaster residents will have new options when it comes to purchasing the power they consume. Thanks to California's new Community Choice Aggregation (CCA) program, the monopoly once held by public utilities such as Southern California Edison (SCE) will give way to a more competitive marketplace where consumers are in control, choosing who supplies them with power.

Lancaster Choice Energy is a locally run, not-for-profit power program created by the City of Lancaster. The program is an important step in the City's "Net-Zero" initiative, which seeks to create a community which produces more clean energy than it consumes. These services will be available to those who live and work within Lancaster.

The goal of Choice Energy is to move decision-making closer to home, while providing citizens with a far greater say as to how the community approaches power generation, energy conservation and sustainability. That's why it is called a YOUtility, it puts you in charge of the decisions.

Choice Energy will invest locally to support our region's renewable resources, while helping to create good paying, local jobs. It will begin offering power to select local government accounts in mid-2015, with public enrollment beginning later in the year.





When you join Choice Energy, a number of things will remain the same. SCE will still deliver power to your home, handle outages and send your bill. However, Choice Energy will be the entity providing the power, giving you added choices as to where your power comes from and how much it will cost you. A menu of plans will be made available allowing you to choose from lower cost options, more renewable content and programs to help you achieve greater energy efficiency.


# KB Home Introduces "Double Zero House"

The home's water recycling system treats grey water from showers, tubs, sinks and washing machines to near-potable quality, then reuses it on landscaping.

"Driven by a strong commitment to sustainability, KB Home has succeeded in building our most water and energy-efficient home to date at Dawn Creek," said Tom DiPrima, Executive Vice President of KB Home's Southern California division. new opportunities locally

All veterans who have served our country deserve our thanks and appreciation, but one very special group deserves even more. Those who have been disabled may require assistance adapting to civilian life. As such, the City has created a program which can aid these wounded warriors in rehabilitating their homes to make them work within their limitations.



Grants of up to \$20,000 are available to rehabilitate and retrofit homes of disabled veterans residing in Lancaster. These funds can be used to widen doorways, add ramps or grab bars, even remodel kitchens and bathrooms to accommodate the veteran's specific needs.

Any honorably discharged disabled veteran can apply, even when injuries occurred outside of military service. Specific income qualifications apply and documentation from the Department of Defense is required.

City recognizes countless contributions of Newton "Newt" Chelette

Throughout the last 25 years, Newton Chelette has been an inspiration to those who know him, giving his time and talents to his students, peers and the community at large.

Chelette coached the Antelope Valley College (AVC) Marauder Men's Basketball team from 1989 to 2006 and currently serves as Dean of Kinesiology, Athletics and Visual & Performing Arts. He's served on many boards and commissions over the years including the Antelope Valley Boys and Girls Club, the Antelope Valley Sheriff's Boosters, Antelope Valley Air Quality Management District and the Antelope Valley Fair Association. He also serves as a trustee to the University of Antelope Valley and as a member of the City of Lancaster's Criminal Justice Commission.

At AVC, Chelette led the Marauder Men's Basketball team to ten conference titles in 17 seasons and was named conference "Coach of the Year" seven times.

Chelette has also shown himself to be an invaluable asset away from the hoops. After being chosen to be the college's athletic director in 2004, he was named the Dean of Physical Education and Athletics at Antelope Valley College in the summer of 2005.

Off-campus, Newt recently spearheaded a local fundraising effort to benefit the American Cancer Society. Coaches vs. Cancer raised more than \$10,000 - four times the amount of any other California Community College Athletic Department donation. This year, under his direction, they more than doubled that amount.

For his efforts on behalf of Antelope Valley College and the community as a whole, the City of Lancaster is pleased to name Newt Chelette "Citizen of the Year."

#### Children Drown

- Survival depends upon quick action, as death can occur within just three minutes.
- Even kids with basic swimming skills who unexpectedly fall into water can quickly panic and forget what they've learned.


#### **SAFETY TIPS**

- Keep children in sight at all times.
- Never leave a child alone near water, even for a few seconds.
- Kids should wear life jackets when on a boat or outdoors around lakes, ponds, rivers or creeks.
- Post emergency numbers and always keep a phone handy.
- Fence your pool along all sides with a barrier that is at least five feet high.
- Use a self-closing gate and keep it locked when the pool is not in use.
- Install alarms on doors leading to the pool area and keep them locked at all times.
- Supervise...Supervise...

#### IF POOL TROUBLE OCCURS

- · Don't panic, shout for help.
- Immediately get the child/adult out of the pool.
- · Call 911 for emergency medical service.
- · If necessary, begin hands-only CPR.
- If you are not trained in CPR, follow instructions from the 911 operator until the Fire Department arrives.
