# **Lancaster Sheriffs Seek Public Participation**

As part of its ongoing effort to reduce crime in the City by 30 percent over the next few years, Lancaster Sheriffs recently canvassed a tensquare-block area on the City area eastside. Deputies involved in Community Oriented Policing (COP) and High Impact Teams (HIT) from throughout the County participated in the April 28 survey. They sought input from residents on issues of concern and obtained new information to help them root out gang activities.

To date, the Antelope Valley Crime Fighting

Initiative that was established this spring by LA County Sheriff Lee Baca has netted over 300 arrests in the Antelope Valley. Additional apprehensions are expected to result from information gathered during the neighborhood sweep that covered over 500 households.

Berhaps the most important thing we can do is develop a dialogue with our residents, says Captain Carl Deeley, who commands the Lancaster Sheriff Station. 

Bygoing door-to-door on a proactive basis, we are able to develop better relationships with the community and often pick up tips that can help us solve crimes.□



# The Antelope Valley: Hollywood's Backlot

Commercials, feature films and TV have big impact on local economy

Hollywood may get all the credit, but often it's the Antelope Valley where much of the filming is done.

This summer's blockbusters, Pirates of the Caribbean III

- At Worlds End along with its predecessor Pirates II - Dead Man's Chest were filmed on giant soundstages at Plant 42 over a period of seven months. The production brought with it over \$60 million in positive economic impact.



"When filmmakers choose the Antelope Valley, they bring with them large crews that need to be housed, fed and entertained," says AV Film Office Liaison Pauline East. "The overall impact on local business is many times greater than simply the fees generated by film permits."

In the last year, over 300 production days of feature films were shot in the Antelope Valley with an economic impact of over \$9 million. Television, commercial production and location photography accounted for nearly 200 production days and another \$2.2 million in economic impact.

So the next time you see a vaguely familiar setting on screen, it may have been shot

# Engineering Lab Opens at University Center

A new state-of-the-art laboratory for mechanical and electrical engineers has opened at Lancaster's University Center. The new facility is designed to serve students enrolled in Fresno State's undergraduate and graduate studies held at the satellite campus in Lancaster.

"The opening of the mechanical engineering building at the Lancaster University Center is an important milestone for engineering education in the Antelope Valley that would not have been possible without the commitment and support of the City of Lancaster, the Air Force Research Laboratory and many others," said CSU Fresno Dean Andrew Hoff.

The Air Force contributed equipment and staffing to the new lab, while the City's Redevelopment Agency contributed over \$700,000 toward its construction.

The program inaugurated in 2003, graduated its first students in June.
