M 1. Approve the City Council/Successor Agency/Financing/ Power/ California Choice Energy Authority Regular Meeting Minutes of May 23, 2017.

At each regular City Council Meeting, the City Council is presented with the financial claims (invoices) against the City for purchase of materials, supplies, services, and capital projects for checks and Automated Clearing House (ACH) payments issued the prior two to three weeks. This process provides the City Council the opportunity to review the expenses of the City. The justifying backup information for each expenditure is available in the Finance Department.

CC 3. Adopt **Ordinance 1022**, amending Chapter 17.08 of the Lancaster Municipal Code to establish regulations for the grazing of animals in the RR-2.5 and RR-1 Zones.

This ordinance prohibits "free-range" grazing, requiring that all grazing animals be controlled to prevent them from straying onto adjacent property. Grazing is only permitted to occur on property owned by the owner of the animals, or on property in which the herder has the written permission of the property owner. The owner of the animals is responsible for managing the grazing activity to prevent excessive removal of vegetation, and both the owner of the animals and the property owner are responsible for implementing any dust control measures in compliance with the City code and the requirements of the Antelope Valley Air Quality Management District (AVAQMD).

The City of Lancaster has several Commissions that serve in an advisory capacity to the City Council. Commissioners are residents of, or primarily employed in, the City of Lancaster and the Antelope Valley and appointed by the Mayor with consent of the Council. Members of City Commissions serve an important role to help shape the policies under which the City operates. Commissioners provide a vital link between residents, City Council, and City staff to ensure our local government remains dynamic, responsive and accountable. At the May 23, 2017, City Council meeting, Mayor Parris presented to Council the discussion of City Commissions, specifically the establishment of two new Commissions, and directed staff to present an item to the City Council identifying the necessary course of action.

NB 3. Adoption of City-wide Safe Routes to School Master Plan

Recommendation:

Adopt **Resolution No. 17-27**, approving the City of Lancaster Safe Routes to School Master Plan.

The Safe Routes to School (SRTS) Master Plan was initiated by the City of Lancaster in 2013, and was funded by two different grants, a Healthy Eating Active Living (HEAL) grant through the Los Angeles County Department of Public Health, and an Active Transportation Program (ATP) grant through the State of California. The plan builds on the efforts of the City's adopted Master Plan of Trails and Bikeways by further identifying improvements and programs that can make the neighborhoods around the schools safer for pedestrians, bicyclists, and motorists. The plan will help direct, and will assist the City in obtaining, grant funding for improvements, such as sidewalks, bike facilities, and installation of traffic calming devices.

NB 4. Introduction of Ordinance to Establish Speed Limits and Amend Section 10.04.020 of the Lancaster Municipal Code

Recommendation:

Introduce **Ordinance No. 1023**, establishing speed limits in the City of Lancaster based on the Engineering and Traffic Survey Report dated March 2017 prepared by Albert Grover and Associates, and Addendum dated May 2017, and amend Section 10.04.020, Subparagraph D of the Lancaster Municipal Code.

The purpose of the proposed ordinance is to adopt the speed limits on the City of Lancaster arterial and collector street network determined by the Engineering and Traffic Survey dated March 2017 and the Addendum dated May 2017. The studies were conducted to comply with existing state regulations concerning the increasing or decreasing of speed limits within City boundaries.

PH 1. Proposed Fiscal Year 2017-2018 Budget and Five-Year Capital Improvement Program

Recommendation:

City Council and City Council acting as Lancaster Housing Authority, Lancaster Choice Energy, Lancaster Power Authority, and California Choice Energy Authority conduct the public hearing on the Proposed Fiscal Year 2017-2018 Budget and Five-Year Capital Improvement Plan, and schedule the budget for adoption on June 27, 2017.

The Proposed FY 2017-2018 Budget is balanced, with healthy General Fund Reserves that will enable the City to continue to provide the community with a full scope of high quality municipal services, programs and special events that enhance the quality of life of all Lancaster residents. It will also provide the required resources to construct significant capital improvement projects that will improve infrastructure and facilities, and beautify the community.

PH 2. Lancaster Lighting Maintenance District for Fiscal Year 2017-2018

Recommendation:

Adopt **Resolution No. 17-28**, confirming the diagram and assessment and ordering the levying of an assessment in Lancaster Lighting Maintenance District for Fiscal Year 2017-2018.

Lancaster Lighting Maintenance District was formed, including subsequent annexations thereto, for the purpose of financing maintenance operations and installation of public lighting facilities, including, but not limited to, traffic signals (as defined in § 22525 of the California Code) within the City of Lancaster, and assessing those properties which benefit from this service their proportionate share of the cost. Each year, the City Council must, by law, order the preparation of an Engineer's Report describing the existing and proposed maintenance services, and conduct a public hearing to establish and order the amount of assessment for the next fiscal year.

PH 3. Lancaster Landscape Maintenance District No. 1 for Fiscal Year 2017-2018

Recommendation:

Adopt **Resolution No. 17-29**, confirming the diagram and assessment and ordering the levying of an assessment in Lancaster Landscape Maintenance District No. 1 for Fiscal Year 2017-2018.

Lancaster Landscape Maintenance District No. 1 and Fox Field Industrial Corridor Landscape Maintenance District were formed, including subsequent annexations thereto, for the purpose of providing maintenance services to landscaping and appurtenant improvements for various developments within the City and assessing those properties which benefit from this service. Each year, the City Council must, by law, order the preparation of an Engineer's Report describing the existing and proposed maintenance services, and conduct a public hearing to establish and order the amount of assessment for the next fiscal year.

PH 4. Lancaster Drainage Benefit Assessment District Levy of Annual Assessment for Fiscal Year 2017-2018

Recommendation:

Adopt **Resolution No. 17-30**, confirming the diagram and assessment, and ordering the levying of an assessment in Lancaster Drainage Benefit Assessment District for Fiscal Year 2017-2018.

The City Council previously formed the Lancaster Drainage Benefit Assessment District, including establishment of separate zones, and submitted the proposition to the eligible voters in each respective zone. The majority of voters approved the formation of the District, the separate zones, and the levying of the assessment. The first year's assessment was paid by the developers of the property. Each year, thereafter, the City Council, after public notice and hearing, may determine and impose an annual assessment.





Recommendation:

Adopt **Ordinance 1022**, amending Chapter 17.08 of the Lancaster Municipal Code to establish regulations for the grazing of animals in the RR-2.5 and RR-1 Zones.

Background:

This ordinance prohibits "free-range" grazing, requiring that all grazing animals be controlled to prevent them from straying onto adjacent property. Grazing is only permitted to occur on property owned by the owner of the animals, or on property in which the herder has the written permission of the property owner. The owner of the animals is responsible for managing the grazing activity to prevent excessive removal of vegetation, and both the owner of the animals and the property owner are responsible for implementing any dust control measures in compliance with the City code and the requirements of the Antelope Valley Air Quality Management District (AVAQMD).

At the May 23, 2017 City Council meeting, the City Council approved the introduction of Ordinance No. 1022 by the following vote:

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF LANCASTER, CALIFORNIA, AMENDING CHAPTER 17.08 OF THE LANCASTER MUNICIPAL CODE TO ESTABLISH REGULATIONS FOR THE GRAZING OF ANIMALS IN THE RR-2.5 AND RR-1 ZONES

WHEREAS, the City of Lancaster has adopted Title 17, Zoning, as part of the Lancaster Municipal Code to regulate the uses allowed in each of the zones within the City; and

WHEREAS, Section 17.08.050 permits light agricultural uses, including grazing, as an accessory use within the RR-2.5 and RR-1 zones, but does not contain regulations to clarify where and in which instances grazing of livestock is permitted; and

WHEREAS, the lack of these regulations has led to the grazing of livestock without property owner permission and the creation of wind-blown dust; and

WHEREAS, the City of Lancaster has determined that an amendment to the current zoning code to address these issues is warranted; and

WHEREAS, notice of intention to consider the amendment to Title 17 of the Lancaster Municipal Code has been given in accordance with Section 65090 of the Government Code of the State of California; and

WHEREAS, the City Council finds that the City has made a diligent effort to achieve public participation, and has held public hearings before the Planning Commission on April 17, 2017, and a public hearing before the City Council on May 23, 2017, for the proposed amendment, and has received and considered on all public testimony both oral and written; and

WHEREAS, staff has prepared a written report recommending approval of the amendment; and

WHEREAS, on April 17, 2017, the Planning Commission recommended to the City Council approval of the proposed amendment; and

WHEREAS, the City Council finds that the amendment to the LMC for the addition of grazing regulations will not have a significant effect on the environment since the proposed action is within the scope of the Program Environment Impact Report (SCH #2007111003) prepared for the Lancaster General Plan, and no further environmental review is required; and

WHEREAS, the City Council, based upon evidence in the record hereby makes the following findings in support of amending Title 17 of the Lancaster Municipal Code:

1. The proposed amendment would clearly identify where grazing can occur and the responsibilities of those grazing their livestock, including a prohibition of free range grazing, written property owner permission, and requirements to control dust.

2. The proposed amendment will ensure that impacts associated with livestock grazing are minimized.

THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF LANCASTER, CALIFORNIA, DOES HEREBY ORDAIN, AS FOLLOWS:

- Section 1. Add Section 17.08.185 as contained in the attached Exhibit "A".
- Section 2. That the City Clerk shall certify to the passage of this Ordinance, and will see that it is published and posted in the manner required by law.

EXHIBIT "A"

17.08.185 - Grazing

- A. Purpose. Section 17.08.050 permits light agricultural uses as an accessory use, which includes grazing, in the RR-2.5 and RR-1 zones. The following regulations clarify where and in which instances grazing is permitted.
- B. Grazing of animals (e.g., sheep, goats, cattle, etc.) is allowable in the rural zones identified above, in accordance with the following limitations and conditions.
 - 1. Free range grazing of animal herds is prohibited within the City limits.
 - 2. All grazing shall occur on property owned by the herder or with express written permission of the property owner.
 - 3. All grazing animals shall be controlled in a manner that prevents them from straying onto unauthorized property.
 - 4. The owner of said grazing animals is responsible for ensuring that the animals are moved regularly to prevent the removal of all vegetation. In the event that the overgrazing of animals causes dust control issues, the owner of the animals and/or the property owner shall be responsible for implementing measures to control the dust in accordance with the City's Municipal code and applicable Antelope Valley Air Quality Management District (AVAQMD) Rules and Regulations.
- C. Alternative energy developments may utilize sheep to control vegetation growth within the fenced boundaries of their facilities, subject to the requirements set forth in Subsection B of this Section.

- b. Introduce **Ordinance No. 1025**, amending Chapter 2.34 of the Lancaster Municipal Code regarding the Architectural and Design Planning Commission.
- c. Introduce **Ordinance No. 1026**, adding Chapter 2.37 to the Lancaster Municipal Code creating the Lancaster Homeless Impact Commission.
- d. Introduce **Ordinance No. 1027**, amending Chapter 2.38 of the Lancaster Municipal Code abolishing the Neighborhood Vitalization Commission and creating the Lancaster Healthy Community Commission.

Fiscal Impact:

While the City may incur some slight additional cost associated with the implementation of additional Commissions, it is expected to be minimal. After some history with the process, staff will amend the pertinent departmental budget(s) if these costs are greater than anticipated.

Background:

The City of Lancaster has several Commissions that serve in an advisory capacity to the City Council. Commissioners are residents of, or primarily employed in, the City of Lancaster and the Antelope Valley and appointed by the Mayor with consent of the Council. As such, Commissioners provide feedback and recommendations to City Council for further consideration and action.

Members of City Commissions serve an important role to help shape the policies under which the City operates. Commissioners provide a vital link between residents, City Council, and City staff to ensure our local government remains dynamic, responsive and accountable.

At the May 23, 2017, City Council meeting, Mayor Parris presented to Council the discussion of City Commissions and nomination/appointment of City Commissioners, specifically the establishment of two new Commissions, and directed staff to present an item to the City Council identifying the necessary course of action. Staff recommends introducing the following ordinances:

- 1. **Criminal Justice Commission.** Ordinance No. 1024 (i) allows this Commission to determine the time and date of meetings of the Commission by majority vote, (ii) authorizes the utilization of alternate commissioners, and (iii) makes technical changes to improve clarity and uniformity.
- 2. **Architectural and Design Planning Commission**. Ordinance No. 1025 (i) allows this Commission to determine the time and date of meetings of the Commission by majority vote, (ii) authorizes the utilization of alternate commissioners, and (iii) makes technical changes to improve clarity and uniformity.
- 3. **Lancaster Homeless Impact Commission.** Ordinance No. 1026 creates the Lancaster Homeless Impact Commission with the purpose of providing collaborative leadership through research, strategic policy development, and coordinated accountability to positively impact homelessness in the City of Lancaster.
- 4. **Neighborhood Vitalization Commission**. Ordinance No. 1027 abolishes the Neighborhood Vitalization Commission and creates the Lancaster Healthy Community Commission with the purpose of advocating for and promoting better health and well-being for City of Lancaster residents.

Therefore, it is recommended that:

- 1. Ordinance Nos. 1024, 1025, 1026, and 1027 be introduced
- 2. Two (2) new Commissions be created:
 - a. Lancaster Homeless Impact Commission
 - b. Lancaster Healthy Community Commission
- 3. The Neighbored Revitalization Commission be dissolved

ORDINANCE NO. 1024

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF LANCASTER, CALIFORNIA, AMENDING CHAPTER 2.30 OF THE LANCASTER MUNICIPAL CODE TO CHANGE THE PROCEDURE FOR SETTING THE TIME AND DATE FOR MEETINGS HELD BY THE CRIMINAL JUSTICE COMMISSION AS WELL AS OTHER CHANGES

WHEREAS, the City Council of the City of Lancaster ("City Council") has previously adopted Chapter 2.30 of the Lancaster Municipal Code establishing the Criminal Justice Commission ("Commission");

WHEREAS, the City Council desires to (i) allow the Commission determine the time and date of meetings of the Commission by majority vote, (ii) authorize the utilization of alternate commissioners, and (iii) make technical changes to improve clarity and uniformity.

NOW, THEREFORE, THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF LANCASTER DOES HEREBY ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

- Section 1. The City Council finds and determines that the above recitals are true and correct and incorporates the recitals herein by this reference.
- Section 2. Chapter 2.30 of the Lancaster Municipal Code is hereby amended to read as set forth in Exhibit "A" attached hereto and incorporated herein by reference.
- Section 3. All ordinances or resolutions, or provisions of the Lancaster Municipal Code, or parts thereof, that are inconsistent with this Ordinance, are hereby repealed only to the extent of their inconsistency; provided, however, that such repeal shall not be construed to revive any ordinance or resolution, or part thereof.
- Section 4. If any section, subsection, sentence, clause, phrase or portion of this Ordinance, including Exhibit "A", is held for any reason to be invalid or unconstitutional by the decision of any court of competent jurisdiction, such decision shall not affect the validity of the remaining portions of this Ordinance. The City Council hereby declares that it would have adopted this Ordinance and each section, subsection, sentence, clause, phrase or portion thereof, irrespective of the fact that any one or more sections, subsections, sentences, clauses, phrases or portions be declared invalid or unconstitutional.
- Section 5. The Mayor shall sign and the City Clerk shall certify to the passage and adoption of this Ordinance and shall cause the same to be published and posted pursuant to the provisions of law in that regard and this Ordinance shall take effect thirty (30) days after its final passage.

Fiscal Impact:

Background:

The Safe Routes to School (SRTS) Master Plan was initiated by the City of Lancaster in 2013, and was funded by two different grants, a Healthy Eating Active Living (HEAL) grant through the Los Angeles County Department of Public Health, and an Active Transportation Program (ATP) grant through the State of California. The City's community partner on this effort was Antelope Valley Partners for Health, which was instrumental in public outreach efforts, and involved in all of the educational presentations and walk audits conducted at the public schools within the City. The SRTS plan was prepared to improve the walking, biking, and rolling environment around each of the City's 30 public schools. This effort required the participation of all four school districts that serve the City (Lancaster School District, Eastside Union School District, Westside Union School District, and Antelope Valley Union High School District) to allow the educational presentations and walk audits to occur, and will require their on-going support for encouragement and enforcement programs. The SRTS plan was prepared by Ryan Snyder of the Transpo Group.

The SRTS plan is built around what is known as the "5 E's" that characterize the most successful on-going SRTS efforts, those being Education, Encouragement, Engineering, Enforcement, and Evaluation. The plan builds on the efforts of the City's adopted Master Plan of Trails and Bikeways by further identifying improvements and programs that can make the neighborhoods around the schools safer for pedestrians, bicyclists, and motorists. The plan will help direct, and will assist the City in obtaining, grant funding for improvements, such as sidewalks, bike facilities, and installation of traffic calming devices.

The SRTS Master Plan was reviewed and recommended for approval by both the City's Architectural and Design Planning Commission and Planning Commission.

A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF LANCASTER, CALIFORNIA, APPROVING THE LANCASTER SAFE ROUTES TO SCHOOL MASTER PLAN

WHEREAS, the City applied for and was awarded grant funding from both the Los Angeles County Department of Public Health's Healthy Eating Active Living (HEAL) in 2013, and the State of California's Active Transportation Program (ATP) in 2014 to prepare a City-wide Safe Routes to School (SRTS) Master Plan; and

WHEREAS, the City used the grant proceeds to create plans for each public school located within the boundaries of the City of Lancaster; and

WHEREAS, this was a collaborative effort between the City of Lancaster, Antelope Valley Partners for Health, and Ryan Snyder of Transpo Group, as well as the four school districts located within the City of Lancaster; and

WHEREAS, the City's vision is to create a plan that includes the "5 E's" of successful SRTS plans; specifically, Education, Encouragement, Engineering, Enforcement, and Evaluation; and

WHEREAS, when implemented, this plan will improve safety for pedestrians, bicyclists, and motorists within school neighborhoods; and

WHEREAS, the City has made a diligent effort to achieve public participation in the development of the SRTS Master Plan, including walk audits at all schools, education sessions, public outreach through Antelope Valley Partners for Health, and involvement of the City's Public Safety Department, as well as the Los Angeles County Sheriff's Department; and

WHEREAS, the Architectural and Design Planning Commission and the Planning Commission received public testimony at regular meetings of January 5, 2017, February 21, 2017, March 20, 2017, and April 17, 2017, reviewed the draft plan, and recommended modifications where appropriate; and

WHEREAS, the City Council hereby makes the following findings in support of the SRTS Master Plan:

- 1. The SRTS Master Plan builds on and complements the City's adopted Master Plan of Trails and Bikeways, further increasing opportunities for residents of various ages to travel safely by foot and bicycle.
- 2. The SRTS Master Plan would provide the basis for requesting, and improve the opportunities of receiving, additional funding to install vital infrastructure improvements related to active transportation, such as sidewalks, bike facilities, and traffic calming devices.

<u>RECOMMENDATION</u>: Receive public testimony and adopt Resolution No. 17-05, recommending to the City Council approval of the City of Lancaster Safe Routes To School Master Plan.

BACKGROUND: The Planning Commission received an initial presentation on the draft Safe Routes to School Plan at the February 21, 2017, regular meeting. The Commission received some testimony regarding the draft plan and also asked some questions regarding it. The Commission did not act on the matter at the meeting of March 20, 2017, due to a desire for additional time for review.

The Safe Routes To School (SRTS) Master Plan was initiated by the City of Lancaster in 2013, and was funded by two different grants, a Healthy Eating Active Living (HEAL) grant through the Los Angeles County Department of Public Health, and an Active Transportation Program (ATP) grant through the State of California. The City's community partner on this effort was Antelope Valley Partners for Health, which was instrumental in public outreach efforts, and involved in all of the educational presentations and walk audits conducted at the public schools within the City.

<u>DISCUSSION</u>: The draft SRTS plan was prepared to improve the walking, biking, and rolling environment around each of the City's 30 public schools. This effort required the participation of all four school districts that serve the City (Lancaster School District, Eastside Union School District, Westside Union School District, and Antelope Valley Union High School District) to allow the educational presentations and walk audits to occur, and will require their on-going support for encouragement and enforcement programs.

The draft SRTS plan is built around what is known as the "5 E's" that characterize the most successful on-going SRTS efforts, those being Education, Encouragement, Engineering, Enforcement, and Evaluation. The plan builds on the efforts of the City's adopted Master Plan of Trails and Bikeways by further identifying improvements and programs that can make the neighborhoods around the schools safer for pedestrians, bicyclists, and even motorists. Recommendation:

Introduce **Ordinance No. 1023**, establishing speed limits in the City of Lancaster based on the Engineering and Traffic Survey Report dated March 2017 prepared by Albert Grover and Associates, and Addendum dated May 2017, and amend Section 10.04.020, Subparagraph D of the Lancaster Municipal Code.

Fiscal Impact:

None.

Background:

The purpose of the proposed ordinance is to adopt the speed limits on the City of Lancaster arterial and collector street network determined by the Engineering and Traffic Survey dated March 2017 and the Addendum dated May 2017. The studies were conducted to comply with existing state regulations concerning the increasing or decreasing of speed limits within City boundaries.

Establishing Speed Limits in the City

It is a common belief that posting of speed limit traffic signs will influence drivers to drive at that speed. However, the facts indicate otherwise.

Driver behavioral research conducted in many parts of the country over a span of several decades show that the average driver is influenced by the appearance of the highway itself, and the prevailing traffic conditions in choosing the speed at which he or she drives. Recognizing this, the California Vehicle Code (CVC) requires that speed limits be established in accordance with the appropriate engineering practice and methods.

Sections 22357 and 22358 of the CVC require that certain local speed limits be determined based upon engineering and traffic surveys, and these speed limits are established by local ordinance. Section 40802 of the CVC requires that the engineering and traffic surveys be conducted every five years when enforcement of the speed limit involves the use of radar or any other electronic device that measures the speed of moving objects. The five-year period can be extended to seven years if the officer shooting the radar/laser is properly certified in the use of the equipment, and the electronic device used was calibrated within three years of the alleged violation. Additionally, if a registered engineer determines that no significant changes have occurred on the roadway after seven years, the engineering and traffic survey can be extended for an additional three years. Speed limits are not enforceable by law enforcement within the City if an engineering and traffic survey is not conducted in accordance with the CVC and the timelines discussed.

Reducing Speed Limits in the City

In an effort to be proactive, the City of Lancaster is currently utilizing several methods and programs focused on further reducing existing speed limits throughout the City. These efforts include the following programs:

- Safe Routes to School Master Plan, which includes the installation of pedestrian bulbouts, signage, and striping enhancements designed to increase pedestrian safety along routes to school;
- Complete Streets Master Plan, which includes speed-reduction tools and safety improvements, such as road diets, roundabouts, and pedestrian bulb-outs;
- Master Plan of Trails and Bikeways, which delineates future road diet locations and bike paths, lanes, and routes throughout the City; and
- Lancaster Lives, a traffic accident analysis program designed to utilize speed-related collision data, and identify roadway corridors where the implementation of mitigation measures, consisting of the tools provided to City staff in the above master plans, will reduce driver speeds and collision rates. The ultimate goal of the program is to substantially reduce the number of injury/fatal collisions within the City.

Engineering and Traffic Survey Report Summary

The California Manual on Uniform Traffic Control Devices, Section 2B.13, defines the requirements of an engineering and traffic survey, and requires the speed limit established shall be posted at the nearest 5-miles-per-hour (mph) increment of the 85th percentile speed of free-flowing traffic. Engineering and traffic surveys were conducted on a total of 269 roadway segments throughout the City. The data collected fell into one of three major categories: (1) geometric and characteristic street surveillance, (2) spot speed survey, and (3) accident rate analysis. The spot speed is used to determine the 85th percentile speed, and this may be reduced using either:

1. Speeds that were rounded up to the nearest 5 mph may be reduced by 5 mph, or

2. Speeds on roadway segments where conditions are not readily apparent to drivers may be reduced by 5 mph. "Conditions not readily apparent to drivers" occurring along a roadway segment may consist of, but are not limited to, characteristics, such as a high accident rate, high pedestrian usage, missing or disconnected sidewalks for pedestrians, high number of driveways, and proximity to, or use as, a primary route to a school.

No other reductions to the posted speed limit are allowed.

Both the Consultant and City staff have extensively reviewed all roadway segments citywide and applied 5-mph speed reductions, where applicable and in conformance with the CVC. Their collaborative analysis of the collision rates and the conditions not readily apparent to drivers are presented in the attached Engineering and Traffic Survey Report dated March 2017, and summarized as follows:

- Speed limits on a total of 41 street segments should be increased;
- Speed limits on a total of 47 street segments should be decreased;
- Speed limits on a total of 177 street segments should remain unchanged; and
- Speed limits on a total of 4 unposted street segments should be established

The attached Exhibits A through E provide maps depicting the locations of all the proposed speed limits.

The attached ordinance will establish speed limits on streets within the City of Lancaster based on the Engineering and Traffic Survey Report dated March 2017, and the Addendum dated May 2017, in conformance with the CVC.

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF LANCASTER, CALIFORNIA, ESTABLISHING SPEED LIMITS IN THE CITY OF LANCASTER BASED ON THE ENGINEERING AND TRAFFIC SURVEY REPORT DATED MARCH 2017 PREPARED BY ALBERT GROVER AND ASSOCIATES, AND ADDENDUM DATED MAY 2017, AND AMEND SECTION 10.04.020, SUBPARAGRAPH D OF THE LANCASTER MUNICIPAL CODE

WHEREAS, Sections 22357 and 22358 of the California Vehicle Code require that certain local speed limits be determined based upon engineering and traffic surveys; and,

WHEREAS, once established, speed limits shall not thereafter be revised except upon the basis of an engineering and traffic survey; and,

WHEREAS, speed limits shall be established by local ordinance; and,

WHEREAS, Section 40802 of the California Vehicle Code requires that the engineering and traffic surveys be conducted within five, seven or ten years, depending on certain qualifications, prior to the date of an alleged violation; and,

WHEREAS, enforcement of the speed limits involve the use of radar or other electronic devices that measure the speed of moving objects; and

WHEREAS, the City has conducted the engineering and traffic surveys, compiled in the Engineering and Traffic Survey Report dated March 2017, and the Addendum dated May 2017, which is on file in the office of the City Clerk and incorporated herein by reference.

THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF LANCASTER, CALIFORNIA, DOES HEREBY ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. Section 10.04.020 of the Lancaster Municipal Code is hereby amended by adding Line No. 8; replacing "established" with "repealed" in lines 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, and 7.

D. Speed Limits

- 1. The speed limits, as recommended in the Engineering and Traffic Survey Report, dated October 30, 2003, incorporated herein by reference, is hereby repealed.
- 2. The speed limits, as recommended in the Engineering and Traffic Survey Report, dated August 11, 2005, incorporated herein by reference, is hereby repealed.

- 3. The speed limits, as recommended in the Engineering and Traffic Survey Reports, dated November 1 and 29, 2005, incorporated herein by reference, are hereby repealed.
- 4. The speed limits, as recommended in Section 5.0 and Table 2 of the 2006 Engineering and Traffic Surveys Report, incorporated herein by reference, are hereby repealed.
- 5. The speed limits, as recommended in No.'s 8-11 of the Findings and Recommendations and Table 4 of the Engineering and Traffic Survey Report dated January 2009, incorporated herein by reference, are hereby repealed.
- 6. The speed limits, as recommended in the Engineering and Traffic Survey Report dated August 10, 2010, incorporated herein by reference, are hereby repealed.
- 7. The speed limits, as recommended in the Engineering and Traffic Survey Report dated July 7, 2011, incorporated herein by reference, are hereby repealed.
- 8. The speed limits, as recommended in the Engineering and Traffic Survey Report dated March 2017 and the Addendum dated May 2017, incorporated herein by reference, are hereby established.
- Section 2. That the City Clerk shall certify to the passage of this Ordinance, and will see that it is published and posted in the manner required by law.
 - Section 3. This Ordinance shall become effective 30 days after its adoption.

SECTION 1.0

Introduction

The purpose of this report is to document the results of an engineering and traffic survey conducted to update the speed limits on the City of Lancaster arterial and collector street network. The overall study was conducted to comply with existing State regulations concerning the increasing or decreasing of speed limits within City boundaries.

It is a common belief that posting of speed limit traffic signs will influence drivers to drive at that speed. However, the facts indicate otherwise.

Driver behavioral research conducted in many parts of this country over a span of several decades shows that the average driver is influenced by the appearance of the highway itself and the prevailing traffic conditions in choosing the speed at which he or she drives. Recognizing this, the California Vehicle Code (CVC) requires that speed limits be established in accordance with appropriate engineering practice and methods.

This report contains sufficient information to document that the conditions of the latest edition of the California Vehicle Code Section 627 have been satisfied and that other conditions not readily apparent to a motorist are properly identified. States and local agencies should conduct engineering studies at least once every 5, 7 or 10 years, in compliance with CVC Section 40802 to reevaluate non-statutory speed limits on segments of their roadways that have undergone significant changes since the last review, such as the addition or elimination of parking or driveways, changes in the number of travel lanes, changes in the configuration of bicycle lanes, changes in traffic control signal coordination, or significant changes in traffic volumes. The latest edition of the CVC has highlighted bicycle and pedestrian safety as part of the traffic and engineering survey, and this aspect was considered.

According to City records, the last speed zone survey was prepared in 2006. The current study will verify, increase, or decrease existing speed limits within the City of Lancaster based on the data and results of this survey.

At 269 locations on the City's network, spot speed surveys were taken in conformance with the State law for conducting engineering and traffic surveys for the purpose of establishing prima facie speed limits. The data was collected per the California Manual of Uniform Traffic Control Devices (CA MUTCD) November 2014. Sections of the CA MUTCD detailing regulations for conducting the required "Engineering and Traffic Survey" are presented in **Appendix A** (Section 2B.13). Also in **Appendix A** are definitions of terms used in speed zone surveys. Excerpts from the CVC regarding regulations governing speed limits are presented in **Appendix B**.

The actual speed zone surveys were conducted by Albert Grover & Associates (AGA) and Transportation Studies, Inc. (TSI). A California registered traffic engineer from AGA reviewed the streets.





SECTION 2.0

STUDY METHODOLOGY

The study involved three major categories of data collection and analysis. The three major components are: (1) geometric and characteristic street surveillance; (2) spot speed survey; and (3) accident rate analysis.

The arterial and collector streets were surveyed by field observation to determine the existing roadway characteristics, condition and placement of signs and markings, adjacent land uses, pedestrian and bicycle activity, and to identify roadway characteristics that are not readily apparent to vehicle drivers.

Spot speed surveys, utilizing a calibrated radar gun, were conducted at 269 locations to determine existing vehicular travel speeds. A minimum of 100 observations (when possible) were recorded. This data was used to calculate statistical information such as the 85th percentile speed, 10 mile per hour pace speed, percent of vehicles within the 10 mile per hour pace, median speed and other pertinent data for analysis.

Accident data was tabulated from the City's Accident Records (Crossroads) for the period from September 1, 2011 through August 31, 2013 (two years) for all roadway segments. The accident rate was calculated and considered in recommending the speed limits accordingly.





SECTION 3.0

SURVEY RESULTS

3.1 Street Surveillance

"Speed Limit Sign (R2-1)," Section 2B.13 of the CA MUTCD 2014, states the following, Standard:

12a When a speed limit is to be posted, it shall be established at the nearest 5 mph increment of the 85th-percentile speed of free-flowing traffic, except as shown in the two Options below.

Option:

- 1. The posted speed may be reduced by 5 mph from the nearest 5 mph increment of the 85th-percentile speed, in compliance with CVC Sections 627 and 22358.5. See Standard below for documentation requirements.
- 2. For cases in which the nearest 5 mph increment of the 85th-percentile speed would require a rounding up, then the speed limit may be rounded down to the nearest 5 mph increment below the 85th percentile speed, if no further reduction is used. Refer to CVC Section 21400(b).

Standard:

12b If the speed limit to be posted has had the 5 mph reduction applied, then an E&TS shall document in writing the conditions and justification for the lower speed limit and be approved by a registered Civil or Traffic Engineer. The reasons for the lower speed limit shall be in compliance with CVC Sections 627 and 22358.5. Support:

12c The following examples are provided to explain the application of these speed limit criteria:

Example 1. Using Option 1 above and first step is to round down: If the 85th percentile speed in a speed survey for a location was 37 mph, then the speed limit would be established at 35 mph since it is the closest 5 mph increment to the 37 mph speed. As indicated by the option, this 35 mph established speed limit could be reduced by 5 mph to 30 mph if the conditions and justification for using this lower speed limit are documented in the E&TS and approved by a registered Civil or Traffic Engineer.

Example 2. Using Option 1 above and first step is to round up: If the 85th percentile speed in a speed survey for a location was 33 mph, then the speed limit would be established at 35 mph since it is the closest 5 mph increment to the 33 mph speed. As indicated by the option, this 35 mph speed limit could be reduced by 5 mph to 30 mph if the conditions and justification for using this lower speed limit are documented in the E&TS and approved by a registered Civil or Traffic Engineer.

Example 3. Using Option 2 above and first step is to round up: If the 85th percentile speed in a speed survey for a location was 33 mph, instead of rounding up to 35mph, the speed limit can be established at 30mph, but no further reductions can be applied (which is allowed in the two examples above).

Standard:

12d Examples 1 and 2 for establishing posted speed limits shall apply to engineering and traffic surveys (E&TS) performed on or after July 1, 2009 in accordance with Caltrans' Traffic Operations Policy Directive Number 09-04 dated June 29, 2009.

Option:

12e After January 1, 2012, Example 3 may be used to establish speed limits. Refer to CVC 21400(b). Support:

12f Any existing E&TS that was performed before July 1, 2009 in accordance with previous traffic control device standards is not required to comply with the new criteria until it is due for reevaluation per the 5, 7 or 10 year criteria.





Whenever such factors are considered to establish the speed limit, they should be documented on the speed survey or in the accompanying engineering report.

The survey streets were reviewed by Mr. Mark Miller, P.E, Principal-in-Charge, who is a registered Civil and Traffic Engineer in the State of California. The roadway characteristics, location of speed limit signs, conditions not readily apparent to the driver, type of area adjoining the street (commercial, residential, school zone, parks, etc.) and type of roadway (divided, undivided, number of lanes, etc.) were recorded as part of the study. The roadway characteristics recorded were used to determine if any physical conditions warranted consideration of an *additional* five mile per hour reduction of the recommended speed in accordance with CVC Section 627.

The speed survey segment roadway characteristics for each segment are indicated on the Engineering and Speed Survey Summary sheets in **Appendix C** (binder).

3.2 Accident Rate Analysis

The accident rate for each speed survey segment was determined by using the most recent accident records as required by CVC Section 627. Based on a review of the City's Accident Record System reports from September 1, 2011 to August 31, 2013, mid-block accident rates were calculated for each street surveyed.

The results of the accident rate calculations, including the Average Expected Accident Rates for each type of roadway facility are shown in **Table 1** and in the Engineering and Speed Survey Summary sheets (**Appendix C**). The Average Expected Accident Rates are based on the latest average rate for each type of roadway in the City of Lancaster derived from the County of Los Angeles Department of Public Works, *Traffic and Lighting Division*.

- ◆ Major Arterial (6+ lanes/<40 mph) 1.73</p>
- ◆ Major Arterial (6+ lanes/>=40 mph) 1.15
- ◆ Secondary Arterial (2-4 lanes/<40 mph) 1.32
- ◆ Secondary Arterial (2-4 lanes/>=40 mph) 0.84
- ◆ Collector Street (2 lanes/prevailing) 1.96
- ◆ Local Street (2 lanes/prevailing) 2.61

The mid-block accident rate in terms of "accidents per 1,000,000 vehicle miles of travel" for each street surveyed was calculated and is shown on the Engineering and Traffic Survey summary sheets (**Appendix C**). The following shows a sample calculation.

Accident Rate Calculation:

The rate was calculated using the following equation:

Accident Rate = Number of Midblock accidents x 10⁶

24-hour volume x 365 x segment length(mi) x number of years

Where: Number of mid-block accidents based on two years (September 1, 2011 to

August 31, 2013), 24-hour volume (both directions) in the survey segment

and segment length in miles.

The Average Expected Accident Rate for the segment is 0.84. The calculated accident rate of 0.73 is below the expected rate for this segment.

3.3 Spot Speed Survey

Spot speed surveys were conducted at each street segment to establish a reasonable and effective speed limit based on the premise that the speed limit thus established conforms to the actual behavior of the majority of motorists. The speed limit should normally be established near the 85th percentile speed recorded for the surveyed segment. However, engineering judgment and other factors such as Street Surveillance (Section 3.1) and accident rates (Section 3.2) may indicate the need for further reduction in establishing reasonable and effective speed limits.

The criteria used in conducting the radar survey are listed in **Appendix A**.

Appendix C contains the Engineering and Speed Survey Summary sheets for each of the 269 sections surveyed. The information collected and data calculated for the radar speed survey are as follows:

SECTION 4.0

SURVEY FINDINGS AND RECOMMENDATIONS

In accordance with the State-imposed speed limit establishment regulation, as defined by CVC Section 627 described in **Appendix B**, there are several factors that may be considered to justify setting the prima facie speed limits more than five miles per hour below the observed 85th percentile speed.

The factors to be considered are:

- ◆ Most recent accident record (mid-block)
- ♦ Roadway design speed
- ◆ Safe stopping sight distance
- ♦ Super-elevation
- ♦ Grades
- Shoulder condition
- Profile condition
- Intersection spacing offsets
- ◆ Commercial driveway characteristics (land use)
- Pedestrian traffic with and without sidewalks
- Pedestrian and Bicycle safety

The above factors for each roadway segment surveyed are listed in the Engineering and Speed Survey Summary sheets in **Appendix C**. The 85th percentile speed and the above factors were considered in verifying existing speed limits and recommending speed limit changes (increase or decrease). Additionally, discussions were held with City staff in making decisions with respect to changing existing speed limits. This allowed for consideration of any special knowledge of the segment. The Speed Zone Survey – Accident Survey Analysis (**Table 1**) lists the total number of accidents, calculated accident rate, and the expected accident rate. **Table 2** shows the surveyed road segments with posted and recommended speed limits.

4.1 Speed Limit Signing

All California motorists are required to know the basic 15, 25, and 65 MPH speed laws and are tested on the subject when applying for a driver's license. The maximum speed limit on most California highways is 65 mph. You may drive 70 mph where posted. Unless otherwise posted, the maximum speed limit is 55 mph on two-lane undivided highways and for vehicles towing trailers. Consequently, speed limit signs covering these conditions need not be posted on City streets. However, although not required by law, speed limit signs for these situations may be posted on streets that have significant daily vehicular traffic volumes, a by-pass traffic situation, the continued violation of a residential 25 MPH speed zone, or with other applicable warrants.

It is normal policy to recommend the posting of speed limit signs only on streets that have been covered by the City speed limit ordinance or by warranted situations covered above.

Speed limit signs should be installed at about one-half mile intervals on the City streets which have been speed zoned. Signs are normally installed on the exit side of traffic signal controlled intersections and the more important intersections where there is high side street vehicle entry. It is important that motorists be given adequate information while not over signing, which tends to confuse the motorist.

Enforcement problems can occur when, (a) the highway is posted with inappropriate speed limit signs, (b) the highway is improperly or inadequately posted; or, (c) the highway is not posted nor covered by ordinance and therefore falls under the basic speed law. In any of these events, the result is a debatable validity that may be questioned in court cases where citations are issued and contested.





SECTION 5.0

SUMMARY AND CONCLUSIONS

- 1. The radar survey and the raw data collection were conducted per CVC Section 627.
- 2. A total of 269 segments on the City's arterial, secondary arterial, and collector roadway network were surveyed.
- 3. The accident rate (**Table 1**) for the majority of the street segments is well below the expected accident rate obtained from the City of Lancaster for various types of roadway facilities within the L.A. County Area.
- 4. It was concluded that the existing speeds on arterial, secondary arterial, and collector roadways in the City of Lancaster can remain unchanged at a total of 177 segments. For speed limits on the remaining 92 segments, 41 increased, 47 decreased, and 4 were established as detailed below. Recommendations for speed limits to increase, decrease, or remain the same were made on 148 sections based on "conditions not readily apparent to the driver".
 - Avenue H-8 from 15th East to 20th East it is recommended that the speed limit be decreased from 40 mph to 35 mph based on the 85th percentile speed.
 - Avenue I from:
 - o 27th West to Valley Central it is recommended that the speed limit be increased from 45 mph to 55 mph based on the 85th percentile speed.
 - o Sierra Highway to Division it is recommended that the speed limit be decreased from 45 mph to 40 mph based on the 85th percentile speed.
 - o Division to 5th East it is recommended that the speed limit be decreased from 50 mph to 40 mph based on the high accident rate, pedestrian activity, and proximity to a school.
 - o Challenger to 30th East it is recommended that the speed limit be decreased from 55 mph to 50 mph based on the high accident rate, pedestrian activity, and lack of sidewalks.
 - Lancaster Blvd from:
 - o 20th West to 15th West it is recommended that the speed limit be decreased from 45 mph to 40 mph based on the high accident rate.
 - o 15th East to Loneoak it is recommended that the speed limit be decreased from 45 mph to 40 mph based on proximity to a school.
 - Division to 5th East it is recommended that the speed limit be decreased from 45 mph to 40 mph based on the high accident rate.
 - 20th East to 30th East it is recommended that the speed limit be decreased from 50 mph to 45 mph based on pedestrian activity.
 - o 30th East to 40th East it is recommended that the speed limit be decreased from 50 mph to 45 mph based on the 85th percentile, proximity to a school, and roadway condition.
 - Milling Avenue from Yucca to Division it is recommended that the speed limit be decreased from 45 mph to 40 mph based on 85th percentile speed.

Introduction

This is an Addendum to the Citywide Engineering and Traffic Survey, dated March 2017, conducted by Albert Grover & Associates. This documents the results of an Engineering and Traffic Survey conducted along Lancaster Boulevard between 10th Street West & Sierra Highway.

Lancaster Boulevard is classified as a Collector Street and is controlled by traffic signals at 10th Street West and Sierra Highway. The roadway consists of one travel lane in each direction with parallel parking as well as diagonal parking provided in the center median.

Survey Results and Analysis

Prevailing Speeds

The spot speed survey showed that the 85th percentile speed was determined to be 17 miles per hour. As provided by law, this 85th percentile speed indicates a speed limit of 15 miles per hour, which is the nearest five-mile-per hour increment. Speed survey results are shown in more detail in the attached summary sheet.

Conditions Not Readily Apparent

However, an exception can be made due to conditions not readily apparent to the driver. This is indicated by an analysis of the collision record. There were 11 collisions in a recent two-year period. This record calculates to a collision rate of 3.09, which is higher than the expected rate of 1.96 for a two-lane Collector Street in Los Angeles County.

A possible explanation for the high collision rate may lie in the presence of parking ramblas in the center median as well as parallel parking along the curb in both directions. Additionally, this facility was downsized to provide an environment more conducive to walking which, in turn, results is greater pedestrian and bicycle traffic.

Conclusion

Therefore, a speed limit of 15 miles per hour is reasonable and appropriate on Lancaster Boulevard between 10th Street West and Sierra Highway, due to prevailing speeds and conditions not readily apparent to the driver.

Recommendation

It is recommended that the following speed limits be maintained on Lancaster Boulevard:

1. 15 miles per hour, between 10th Street West and Sierra Highway.






Increased Speed Limits




Decreased Speed Limits

Subject: Proposed Fiscal Year 2017-2018 Budget and Five-Year Capital Improvement

Program

Recommendation:

City Council and City Council acting as Lancaster Housing Authority, Lancaster Choice Energy, Lancaster Power Authority, and California Choice Energy Authority conduct the public hearing on the Proposed Fiscal Year 2017-2018 Budget and Five-Year Capital Improvement Plan, and schedule the budget for adoption on June 27, 2017.

Fiscal Impact:

The Fiscal Year 2017-2018 Budget totals \$187.7 million, including \$45.7 for the Capital Improvement Program.

Background:

The City's Budget is a "roadmap" and budget preparation is the business-planning tool used to ensure proper reviews are made and allocations adjusted, accordingly.

The budget process is a multi-month effort that began in January. Through the development and refinement of the budget, attention is given to the state of the economy, trends, Council priorities and direction, community needs, operational service provisions, financial challenges, revenue projections, and other factors.

The proposed budget is a culmination of many months of work by the City Council and staff in reviewing priorities and evaluating programs to meet those priorities, with a focus on maintaining responsive and relevant service for residents. As well, the City Council's priorities of Financial Stability, Public Safety, Infrastructure, and Economic Development are considered and have been affirmed through the Proposed FY 2017-2018 Budget.

The Proposed FY 2017-2018 Budget is balanced and totals \$187.7 million. This includes funding appropriations for Capital Improvements, Capital Outlay, Operations & Maintenance, and Personnel.

Part of ensuring that the Budget roadmap is responsibly navigated by the City, estimating revenues for the upcoming fiscal year and forecasting out-years is essential. By reviewing past year's actual revenue receipts, new revenue sources, fee-based program and service projections, grant opportunities, and the State's economic outlook, the City is able to best determine the revenues available for spending allocations.

The City's largest unrestricted funding source is the General Fund totaling \$67,629,975. General Fund resources include: Sales Tax, Property Tax, Fees, Grants, and others--noting Sales Tax as the top General Fund source projected at \$20,368,490. The Proposed FY 2017-2018 Budget General Fund appropriations include \$67,608,795. General Fund appropriations include funding for Operating Departments, Transfers Out, and Reserves.

The City of Lancaster desires to maintain a prudent level of financial resources to guard its residents against service disruption in the event of unexpected, temporary revenue shortfalls or unanticipated expenditures.

Reserves accumulated during years when revenues exceeded expenditures cushion the City's transition to a lower revenue base and allow the City to adjust spending in response to economic downturns, emergencies, State revenue takeaways, and/or investment opportunities.

The Proposed FY 2017-2018 Budget greatly recognizes and strengthens the City Council's priority of fiscal prudence and discipline with such Reserves: *Financial Stability Reserve* (10%); *Contingency Reserve* (10%), and *Investment Reserve* (8%), representing a General Fund Reserve totaling 28% of Operating Expenditures.

As well, to continue transforming the City, we must continue focusing on the infrastructure in the City, through our Capital Improvement Program (CIP). We are persistent in our aggressive, proactive approach to allocating more capital improvement and equipment monies than ever before. The CIP for the Proposed FY 2017-2018 Budget totals \$45.7 million.

The Proposed FY 2017-2018 Budget is balanced, with healthy General Fund Reserves that will enable the City to continue to provide the community with a full scope of high quality municipal services, programs and special events that enhance the quality of life of all Lancaster residents. It will also provide the required resources to construct significant capital improvement projects that will improve infrastructure and facilities, and beautify the community.

The Proposed Fiscal Year 2017-2018 Budget and the Capital Improvement Program will be presented to the City Council for final adoption at the regular City Council meeting of June 27, 2017.

Levy of Annual Assessment for Fiscal Year 2017-2018

Recommendation:

Adopt **Resolution No. 17-28**, confirming the diagram and assessment and ordering the levying of an assessment in Lancaster Lighting Maintenance District for Fiscal Year 2017-2018.

Fiscal Impact:

Each benefit unit will be assessed \$98.43, which includes a 2.7% CPI adjustment (\$45.00 in zones that voted "no" during the 2003 election). A total of \$4,441,041.00 will be assessed against the benefiting properties, which will be used for maintenance expenses.

Background:

On March 11, 2003, the City Council directed that an election be held asking the property owners within the Lancaster Lighting Maintenance District (LLMD) to approve an increase in the annual street lighting assessment to \$70.00 per lighting unit, including a Consumer Price Index (CPI) based inflator. On July 8, 2003, the City Council announced the results of the election to approve the increase in annual assessments within the City's lighting maintenance district. The results of the tally of the election were that out of 104 zones, nine zones, namely zones 27, 30, 49B, 51B, 51D, 65B, 70A, 89B, and 103 failed to receive voter approval. Following the results of the original vote, and with the street lights being turned off, property owners within three zones that voted "no", namely zone 27 split into zones 27A and 27B, zone 30, split into zones 30A and 30B, and zone 89B split into zones 89B-1 and 89B-2, submitted petitions to the City to initiate another voting process. The City Council adopted resolutions initiating proceedings for the levy of additional assessments, and notices of public hearings and assessment ballots were mailed to the affected property owners within these zones. The three election processes were successful, and the City Council approved the levy of additional assessments at the October 28, 2003, November 11, 2003, and January 27, 2004 Council meetings.

Lancaster Lighting Maintenance District was formed, including subsequent annexations thereto, for the purpose of financing maintenance operations and installation of public lighting facilities, including, but not limited to, traffic signals (as defined in § 22525 of the California Code) within the City of Lancaster, and assessing those properties which benefit from this service their proportionate share of the cost. Each year, the City Council must, by law, order the preparation of an Engineer's Report describing the existing and proposed maintenance services, and conduct a public hearing to establish and order the amount of assessment for the next fiscal year.

The assessment for Fiscal Year 2017-2018 is \$98.43, including a CPI factor for Los Angeles-Riverside-Orange County of 2.7% per lighting unit, except for those parcels within the zones that voted "no", which will remain at \$45.00 per lighting unit.

The street lighting improvements in the areas within the District will be maintained with funds generated by the Lighting Maintenance District. Each lot or parcel within the District that has been annexed, as indicated on the diagram, will be assessed a unit assessment of \$98.43 for Fiscal Year 2017-2018. Parcels within the zones that voted "no" will remain at a unit assessment of \$45.00.

Levy of Annual Assessment for Fiscal Year 2017-2018

Recommendation:

Adopt **Resolution No. 17-29**, confirming the diagram and assessment and ordering the levying of an assessment in Lancaster Landscape Maintenance District No. 1 for Fiscal Year 2017-2018.

Fiscal Impact:

Parcels annexed prior to Fiscal Year 2005-2006 will be assessed \$80.00 per benefit unit, which is the same as the previous year's assessment. Parcels annexed beginning Fiscal Year 2005-2006 will be assessed \$107.89 per benefit unit; parcels in the Fox Field Industrial Corridor will be assessed \$0.36 per benefit unit, which includes the 2.7 % CPI adjustment. A total of \$1,776,354.00 will be assessed against the benefiting properties, which will be used for maintenance expenses.

Background:

Lancaster Landscape Maintenance District No. 1 and Fox Field Industrial Corridor Landscape Maintenance District were formed, including subsequent annexations thereto, for the purpose of providing maintenance services to landscaping and appurtenant improvements for various developments within the City and assessing those properties which benefit from this service. Each year, the City Council must, by law, order the preparation of an Engineer's Report describing the existing and proposed maintenance services, and conduct a public hearing to establish and order the amount of assessment for the next fiscal year.

The landscaping improvements in the areas within the District will be maintained with funds generated by the Landscape Maintenance District. Each lot or parcel within the District that was annexed prior to Fiscal Year 2005-2006, as indicated on the diagram, will be assessed a unit assessment of \$80.00 for Fiscal Year 2017-2018. The unit assessment for Fiscal Year 2017-2018 is the same as Fiscal Year 2004-2005, except for those parcels that were

annexed beginning Fiscal Year 2005-2006, which will be assessed at a rate reflective of an annual index increase consistent with the consumer price index for Los Angeles-Riverside-Orange Counties. Last year's rate was \$105.05 per benefit unit. For Fiscal Year 2017-2018, the rate of assessment will be \$107.89 per benefit unit, including the established CPI adjustment of 2.7% (($$105.05 + ($105.05 \times 0.027) = 107.89)). Last year's rate for the Fox Field Industrial Corridor Landscape Maintenance District was \$0.35 per benefit unit. For Fiscal Year 2017-2018, the rate of assessment will be \$0.36 per benefit unit, including the established CPI adjustment of 2.7% (($$0.35 + ($0.35 \times 0.027) = 0.36)).

Levy of Annual Assessment for Fiscal Year 2017-2018

Recommendation:

Adopt **Resolution No. 17-30**, confirming the diagram and assessment, and ordering the levying of an assessment in Lancaster Drainage Benefit Assessment District for Fiscal Year 2017-2018.

Fiscal Impact:

Parcels annexed prior to Fiscal Year 2005-2006 will be assessed \$50.00 per equivalent drainage unit, which is the same as the previous year's assessment. Lots and parcels annexed beginning Fiscal Year 2005-2006 will be assessed \$67.43 per equivalent drainage unit, which includes the 2.7% CPI adjustment. A total of \$1,688,212.00 will be assessed against the benefiting properties, and will be used for maintenance expenses.

Background:

The City Council previously formed the Lancaster Drainage Benefit Assessment District, including establishment of separate zones, and submitted the proposition to the eligible voters in each respective zone. The majority of voters approved the formation of the District, the separate zones, and the levying of the assessment. The first year's assessment was paid by the developers of the property. Each year, thereafter, the City Council, after public notice and hearing, may determine and impose an annual assessment. Due to the cost and complexity of accounting for separate zones of benefit within the District, separate zone designations were eliminated in 1993 by City Council action.

The drainage improvements in the District have been completed and accepted by the City Council, and will be maintained with funds generated by the Drainage Benefit Assessment District. Each lot or parcel within the District that was annexed prior to Fiscal Year 2005-2006, as indicated on the diagram, will be assessed a unit assessment of \$50.00 per equivalent drainage unit (EDU) for Fiscal Year 2017-2018. The unit assessment for Fiscal Year 2017-2018 is the same as Fiscal Year

2004-2005, except for those parcels that were annexed beginning Fiscal Year 2005-2006, which will be assessed at a rate reflective of an annual index increase consistent with the consumer price index for Los Angeles-Riverside-Orange Counties. Last year's rate was \$65.66. For Fiscal Year 2017-2018, the rate of assessment will be 67.43 per assessment unit, including the established CPI adjustment of 2.7% (($65.66 + (65.66 \times 0.027) = 67.43$)). The method of assessment is based on proportionate storm water runoff, thereby assessing developments with more impervious area a proportionately larger share of the total assessed costs.
