COMMISSION/ STAFF UPDATES

1. LOS ANGELES COUNTY SHERIFF'S DEPARTMENT CRIME TRENDS REPORT

Deputy Deciga provided the statistics for October and November of 2018 for the Burglary Suppression Team, LAN-CAP Team, Robbery Team and LEAPS program.

The Los Angeles County Sheriff's Department has continued with their Community Engagement with the following activities: Monthly Coffee with a Deputy, Coffee with a Deputy at Antelope Valley College, Walk a Mile in Her Shoes, Red Ribbon Week, BooLVD, Valley Oasis Trunk or Treat, Coffee with a Deputy with Animal Control, Cop On A Rooftop, AYSO VIP Special Athletes, and Tip A Cop.

Discussion among the Commission, Lieutenant Morrow, Deputy Deciga and staff included the statistics provided, baseline average, and recent incident being investigated.

2. LOS ANGELES COUNTY PROBATION DEPARTMENT UPDATE

Director Unfondu presented the AB 109 Region 5 statistics for December of 2018.

Discussion among the Commission, Director Ufondu and staff included the statistics provided, caseload, risk categories, assessment criteria, case management and new programs in the works for this next year.

3. CALIFORNIA HIGHWAY PATROL UPDATE

Lieutenant Castro of the California Highway Patrol provided statistics through the end of the 2018 year along with a comparison to the previous year for fatal accidents, traffic collisions, DUI related accidents, total arrests, and motor vehicle thefts.

Lieutenant Castro provided information on the success of their annual CHiPS for Kids Toy Drive and thanked the community for their support.

Discussion among the Commission, Lieutenant Castro, and staff included an update on Caltrans' work.

4. DISTRICT ATTORNEY UPDATE

Deputy District Attorney Robert Sherwood provided information on changes to law this New Year relating to theory of liability and prosecution of a minor as an adult.

Deputy District Attorney Sherwood provided felony and misdemeanor statistics for cases provided to them by the Los Angeles County Sheriff's Department Lancaster Station through the end of the 2018 year along with a comparison to the last two years.

Discussion among the Commission, Deputy District Attorney Sherwood, and staff included the status of the upcoming no bail changes and theory of liability.

5. CITY ATTORNEY UPDATE

The Assistant City Attorney provided an update on SB 946 relating to street vendors.

6. PUBLIC SAFETY UPDATE

The Public Safety Director discussed new legislation including future programs and partnerships.

7. STATE LEGISLATIVE OFFICE UPDATE

Richard Cook from Senator Scott Wilk's office indicated the Legislature returned on Monday and updates will be provided at the next meeting.

Additionally, Mr. Cook provided information on a new mobile office to be implemented along with information on upcoming community events.

Vanessa Wilk from Tom Lackey's Office provided information on recent community events including updates on possible bills returning this year.



During January 2019 and with numerous sorties lost due to inclement weather and limited operator staffing, LASD formally logged 1 LEAPS service call supporting tactical field operations. LEAPS was dispatched 19 times totaling 4.4 hours and was airborne providing strategic surveillance for 252.8 hours.

LEAPS provided airborne observation and support in the arrest of 1 suspect. Additional support of Lancaster patrol deputies and detectives included the surveillance of specific targeted locations. 




Homicides Over A Year Period




Rapes Over a Year Period




Robberies Over a Year Period




Aggravated Assaults Over a Year Period




Domestic Violence-Related Aggravated Assaults Over a Year Period




Burglaries Over a Year Period




Larceny Thefts Over a Year Period
