#### Recommendation:

Approve the Check and Wire Registers for July 11, 2021 through July 24, 2021 in the amount of \$14,734,679.34 as presented.

At each regular City Council Meeting, the City Council is presented with check and ACH/wire registers listing the financial claims (invoices) against the City for purchase of materials,

supplies, services, and capital projects issued the prior three to four weeks. This process provides the City Council the opportunity to review the expenditures of the City. Claims are paid via checks, Automated Clearing House (ACH) payments, or federal wires. The justifying backup information for each expenditure is available in the Finance Department.

**CC 3.** Approve an Increase to the Letter of Credit with River City Bank on behalf of Lancaster Choice Energy to Comply with California Public Utilities Commission Financial Security Requirements

#### Recommendation:

That the City Council approve an increase of \$226,440, for a total amount of \$373,440, to the Letter of Credit with River City Bank (RCB) on behalf of Lancaster Choice Energy (LCE), in satisfaction of the California Public Utilities Commission Community Choice Aggregation Financial Security Requirement (FSR).

On May 27, 2014, City Council adopted Ordinance No. 997 Establishing the Lancaster Community Choice Aggregation (CCA) Program, LCE. LCE began serving customers in May 2015. As a CCA, LCE is required to meet certain state mandated obligations, including the posting of a FSR instrument per CPUC Resolution E-5059 (Resolution). The purpose of the FSR instrument is to cover reentry fees borne by Southern California Edison (SCE) in the event of a mass involuntary return of CCA customers to SCE, such as the decertification of the LCE or LCE failure. SCE may only withhold funds from the financial security instrument for unpaid administrative or procurement costs associated with the return of LCE customers to SCE. Any withholding of those funds must first be approved by the CPUC.

#### **CC 4.** Conditional Use Permit 17-06 - Acceptance of Improvements (Streets)

#### Recommendation:

Approve the developer-constructed streets on the following project. In addition, accept the streets for maintenance by the City and for public use.

<u>Project</u> <u>Location/Owner</u>

Conditional Use Permit No. 17-06 2060 West Avenue J-8

Owner: Amargosa Mini Storage, LLC

The streets have been constructed and completed by the developer according to the approved plans and specifications. The work has been inspected and found to be satisfactory to the Senior Director - Development Services.

#### **CC 5.** Conditional Use Permit 17-06 - Acceptance of Improvements (Water)

#### Recommendation:

Approve the completed water system installed by the developer for the following project:

Project Location/Owner

Conditional Use Permit No. 17-06 2060 West Avenue J-8

Owner: Amargosa Creek Storage, LLC

Water system improvements are accepted by the City in order to exonerate the developer's Undertaking Agreement and release of improvement securities. The water system for this project has been constructed and completed to the satisfaction of the local water purveyor, Los Angeles County Waterworks District 40-04, Antelope Valley, and was constructed according to the approved plans and specifications. Additionally, the work has been inspected and found to be satisfactory to the Senior Director - Development Services.

**CC 6.** Approval of Multi-Year Professional Service Agreements for On-Call Construction Management and Inspection Services

#### Recommendation:

Approve Multi-Year Professional Service Agreements with each of the pre-qualified consulting firms on the attached list, and authorize the City Manager, or his designee, to execute all task orders within existing signature authority limits.

In May 2021, the City advertised a Request for Qualifications (RFQ 739-21) for Multi-Year On-Call Construction Management and Inspection Services, for the term of September 2021 to August 2023, from professional consulting firms to support the Capital Improvement Program and departmental operations. The RFQ included one (1) major service category for which professional service firms were being sought. Firms that provide services were encouraged to submit a Statement of Qualifications (SOQ), the necessary qualifications, and the workforce capacity to perform the work. The RFQ was listed on the City's website, and the City's online bidding service (PlanetBids).

CC 7. Award of Bid – PWCP 21-008 (REBID) - 2021 Neighborhood Improvement Project

#### Recommendation:

Award PWCP 21-008 (REBID), 2021 Neighborhood Improvement Project, to Sully-Miller Contracting Company of Brea, California, in the amount of \$3,820,928.30 plus a 10% contingency, to repair and resurface approximately twenty-four (24) lane-miles of streets, as part of the City's Pavement Management Program (PMP). Authorize the City Manager, or his designee, to sign all documents. This contract is awarded to the lowest responsible bidder per California Public Code Section 22038 (b).

The proposed project will be the seventh project funded, in part, with road bond funds in addition to Proposition C funds. The proposed project will include approximately twenty-four (24) lanemiles of roadway repair and rehabilitation in the following project areas: (1) NBH 1 – Avenue J to Avenue J-8 and Division Street to  $5^{th}$  Street East, and (2) NBH  $2-10^{th}$  Street West to Sierra Highway and Avenue I to Lancaster Boulevard.

CC 8. Final Map Approval – Parcel Map No. 82978 (Located at the northwest corner and southeast corner of 70th Street West and Avenue K-8)

#### Recommendation:

Approve the map and accept the dedications as offered on Parcel Map No. 82978, located at the northwest corner and southeast corner of 70th Street West and Avenue K-8; make findings that this project will not violate any of the provisions of Sections 66473.5, 66474.1 and 66474.6

of the Subdivision Map Act; and instruct the City Clerk to endorse on the face of the map the certificate which embodies the approval of said map and the dedications shown thereon.

On August 14, 2020, the City of Lancaster Development Services Department - Community Development Division approved Tentative Administrative Parcel Map No. 82978. The Final Map is in substantial conformance with the approved tentative map. Parcel Map No. 82978 has been examined by the City Surveyor, is in substantial conformance with the approved tentative map and is ready for Council approval. The parcels in this map are created for financing and conveyance purposes only. A separate Final Subdivision Map with development conditions must be recorded in order to create developable/buildable lots. Therefore, no Undertaking Agreement or securities for public improvements are required in accordance with the Subdivision Map Act and the City's Municipal Code.

**CC 9.** Multi-Year Professional Services (Service Group Category 4 – Environmental Services) for Preparation of a Citywide Vehicle Miles Traveled (VMT) Mitigation Program and Associated Program Environmental Impact Report

#### Recommendation:

Approve award of Additional Authorization No. 1 to Michael Baker International, to amend and increase the Professional Services Agreement in the amount of \$219,250.00 to continue the preparation of the Citywide Vehicle Miles Traveled (VMT) Mitigation Program and associated Program Environmental Impact Report (EIR). Authorize the City Manager, or his designee, to sign all documents.

The City of Lancaster adopted thresholds for VMT as required by Senate Bill 743 in July 2020. In order to facilitate the implementation of these thresholds, the City is proposing to adopt a Citywide VMT Program and EIR.

#### **CC 10.** Approval of the purchase of networking equipment for City Hall

#### Recommendation:

Approve the purchase of Cisco networking equipment from Logicalis using National Association of State Procurement Officials (NASPO) ValuePoint Master Agreement #AR3227 for City Hall.

The City of Lancaster operates an Internet Protocol (IP) network that allows for electronic data and voice communications between city sites and the wider world. City Hall is the core backbone of the larger City wide network that all electronic communications flows through as well as the location of the City's primary data center. As such it is vital to have supported, robust and secure networking equipment that is also modern allowing for fast network speeds.

#### CC 11. General Municipal Election Date Reestablishment

#### Recommendation:

Introduce **Ordinance No. 1086**, an ordinance of the City Council of the City of Lancaster, California, reestablishing the second Tuesday in April of even-numbered years as the date of the City's General Municipal Election.

On September 26, 2017, the City adopted Ordinance No. 1033 which consolidated the City's general municipal elections with a statewide election in even-numbered years, beginning with the statewide direct primary election in February of 2022. Adoption of Ordinance No. 1033 satisfied the requirements of the California Voter Participation Rights Act (Cal. Elec. Code §§ 14050-14057) ("CVPRA"), which generally required that as of January 1, 2018, the City either (a) consolidate future general municipal elections with a statewide election or (b) adopt a plan to consolidate general municipal elections with a statewide election not later than the November 8, 2022, statewide general election. However, since the requirement to consolidate was implemented, the *City of Redondo Beach v. Padilla*, 46 Cal. App. 5th 902, held that the CVPRA does not apply to charter cites. The City of Lancaster is a charter city in which would not be required to merge with statewide elections.

**CC 12.** Designation of City of Lancaster's Voting Delegate(s) and Alternate(s) League of California Cities Annual Conference

#### Recommendation:

- a) Designate and appoint Council Member Raj Malhi as City of Lancaster's voting delegate to the League of California Cities Annual Conference scheduled for September 22-24, 2021.
- b) Designate and appoint Council Member Darrell Dorris as City of Lancaster's voting alternate to the League of California Cities Annual Conference scheduled for September 22-24, 2021.

The League of California Cities Annual Conference is slated for September 22-24, 2021 in Sacramento. An important aspect of the conference is the Annual Business Meeting which will take place on September 24, 2021. Member cities consider and act on resolutions that establish Cal Cities policy. In order to vote at the Annual Business Meeting, the City must appoint and designate a voting delegate. The City may also appoint up to two alternate voting delegates, one of whom may vote if the designated voting delegate is unable to serve in that capacity.

**PH 1.** Amending and Restating Resolution No. 21-10, Authorizing the City to join the Statewide Community Infrastructure Program (SCIP); Authorizing the California Statewide Communities Development Authority (CSCDA) to Accept Applications from Property Owners of Developments (Participating Developers), Conduct Special Assessment Proceedings and Levy Assessments and Special Taxes and to Form Assessment Districts and Community Facilities Districts within the City of Lancaster

#### Recommendation:

Amend and restate Resolution 21-10 of the City Council of the City of Lancaster authorizing the City to join the Statewide Community Infrastructure Program; authorizing the California Statewide Communities Development Authority to accept applications from property owners, conduct special assessment proceedings and levy assessments and special taxes and to form Assessment Districts and Community Facilities Districts within the territory of the City of Lancaster; embodying a joint community facilities agreement setting forth the terms and conditions of community facilities district financings; and authorizing related actions.

Through Resolution No. 21-10 (adopted February 23, 2021), the City joined the CSCDA, which is a joint powers authority sponsored by the League of California Cities and the California State Association of Counties. The CSCDA members include 530 cities, counties, and special districts throughout California. Resolution No. 21-10 allowed Participating Developers to finance development impact fees through pooled Statewide Community Infrastructure Program (SCIP) special assessment districts programs. SCIP has been expanded to include Community Facilities Districts ("CFDs"), as provided for in this proposed Amended and Restated Resolution. By adding CFDs, Participating Developers can finance a broader range of fees including school fees, and allow the Participating Developers more flexibility in adjusting tax rates by specific product type, assist in forming separate improvement areas when projects need to be phased, and provide for more facilities to be financed similar in type to the fees. Costs as low as \$500,000.00 can be financed.



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

#### **Recommendation:**

That the City Council approve an increase of \$226,440, for a total amount of \$373,440, to the Letter of Credit with River City Bank (RCB) on behalf of Lancaster Choice Energy (LCE), in satisfaction of the California Public Utilities Commission Community Choice Aggregation Financial Security Requirement (FSR).

#### **Fiscal Impact:**

\$226,440 transferred from a secured deposit account to a cash collateral account held at RCB in the name of the City of Lancaster (City). Sufficient funds are available in LCE's secured deposit account to provide the increase in cash collateral for the LOC.

#### **Background:**

On May 27, 2014, City Council adopted Ordinance No. 997 Establishing the Lancaster Community Choice Aggregation (CCA) Program, LCE. LCE began serving customers in May 2015. As a CCA, LCE is required to meet certain state mandated obligations, including the posting of a FSR instrument per CPUC Resolution E-5059 (Resolution).

The purpose of the FSR instrument is to cover reentry fees borne by Southern California Edison (SCE) in the event of a mass involuntary return of CCA customers to SCE, such as the decertification of the LCE or LCE failure. SCE may only withhold funds from the financial security instrument for unpaid administrative or procurement costs associated with the return of LCE customers to SCE. Any withholding of those funds must first be approved by the CPUC.

In order to meet this requirement, the City Council approved the issuance of the initial LOC, in the amount of \$147,000, at its January 12, 2021 Council meeting. In response to the failure of Western Community Energy, which had launched in March 2020, SCE has reevaluated the current FSR to determine whether a change in the amount is warranted. On July 16, 2021, SCE filed Advice Letter 4494-E-A (Attached) which requests approval of FSR increases, including that for LCE. The new amount is proposed at \$373,440, an increase of \$226,440. LCE, through CalChoice, will be filing a protest of this mid-term increase, however, to be ready to comply should it be approved, staff is requesting Council approval of the new amount.

#### **PURPOSE**

Southern California Edison Company (SCE) hereby submits this supplemental advice letter to implement Energy Division's recommendation to update the Renewable Energy Credit (REC) Value (Line 21) of the Community Choice Aggregator (CCA) financial security requirement (FSR) calculations. This advice letter supplements the semi-annual reports updating the financial security requirement for each active CCA in SCE's territory (Attachment A) and the associated confidentiality declaration (Attachment B) as submitted on May 10, 2021.1

#### **BACKGROUND**

On May 10, 2021, SCE submitted Advice 4494-E to update the CCA FSR amounts calculated pursuant to the methodology set forth in SCE's Rule 23, Section X. Advice 4494-E was the first update to the calculated CCA FSR amounts since the initial postings of the CCA FSRs in December 2020.

In Advice 4494-E, SCE noted the following concern:

For the Resource Adequacy (RA) Cost Forecast, SCE is using the data that is published in the CPUC's 2019 Resource Adequacy Report (CPUC 2019 RA Report or "Report") as an estimate of the incremental cost of procuring RA for the involuntarily returned CCA load. However, SCE notes that the Report's data is out of date and not consistent with current RA market

These changes are made in accordance with General Order (GO) 96-B, General Rule 7.5.1, which authorizes utilities to make additional changes to an advice letter through the submittal of a supplemental advice letter. This advice letter supplements Advice 4494-E in part.

pricing as reflected in the Commission's RA Market Price Benchmarks (MPBs) established pursuant to D.18-10-019 and D.19-10-001. Consistent with the CCA FSR methodology established in Decision (D.) 18-05-022 and Resolution E-5059, the CCA FSR should be calculated using the Commission's MPBs for RA and Renewable Portfolio Standards (RPS) because the MPBs reflect actual market transactions and prices. In the Provider of Last Resort (POLR) Rulemaking (R.21-03-011), SCE is seeking the Commission's concurrence to begin using the MPBs for the FSR calculations.<sup>2</sup>

In relation to SCE's concern, and in the wake of the Western Community Energy (WCE) bankruptcy filing and subsequent deregistration and mass involuntary return of WCE customers to SCE's procurement service, Energy Division convened a meeting on July 13, 2021 and recommended that SCE update the REC values used in Advice 4494-E to the current forecasted 2021 RPS MPB calculated by the Commission pursuant to D.18-10-019 and D.19-10-001, issued in the Power Charge Indifference Adjustment (PCIA) rulemaking (R.17-06-026 or PCIA OIR). Energy Division did not recommend updating the RA value at this time.

#### **DISCUSSION**

SCE hereby updates the CCA FSR amounts using the current forecasted 2021 RPS MPB calculated by the Commission pursuant to D.18-10-019 and D.19-10-001 of \$14.49 per megawatt-hour. Based on Energy Division's recommendation, SCE has not updated the RA value used to calculate the CCA FSR amounts.

However, SCE reiterates that use of the RA value from the data published in the CPUC's 2019 RA Report **significantly under-estimates current RA market prices**, and therefore CCA FSRs are not likely to cover Re-Entry Fees in the event that a CCA fails or otherwise terminates service over the next six months and involuntarily returns its customers to SCE's procurement service without sufficient advance written notice.

For this reason, SCE continues to urge the use of the updated RA MPBs established in the PCIA OIR, in addition to the updated RPS MPB, to more adequately protect CCA customers from the risks of mass involuntary returns.<sup>4</sup> The PCIA RA MPBs are based on actual transactions for RA of jurisdictional load-serving entities (LSEs) in California, and are thereby entirely appropriate and reasonable benchmarks of the market value of RA.

SCE requests that the CCA FSR postings be updated within 30 calendar days of the effective date of this supplemental advice letter.

They also provide some measure of protection for CCA and ESP customers, although the FSR is not designed to fully indemnify CCA or ESP customers and will likely be insufficient to fully cover the Re-Entry Fees in many stressed market conditions, absent sufficient advance notice to the IOU POLR of the mass involuntary return, thereby resulting in residual Re-Entry Fees that must be paid by the involuntarily returning customers." (emphasis added). See also Reply Comments in the POLR OIR, filed 5/10/21, at Section E.3 (pp. 10-12) entitled "ESP and CCA FSRs by design do not fully protect DA and CCA Customers from Residual Re-Entry Fees."





#### 1. Parties to the AGREEMENT.

2. <u>Notices</u>. All written notices required by or related to this AGREEMENT shall be sent by Certified Mail, Return Receipt Requested, postage prepaid and addressed as listed below. Neither party to this AGREEMENT shall refuse to accept such mail; parties to this AGREEMENT shall promptly inform the other party of any changes of address. All notices required by this AGREEMENT are effective on the day of receipt, unless otherwise indicated herein.

3. <u>Successors and Assigns</u>. The terms hereof shall be binding upon and inure to the benefit of the successors and assigns of the parties hereto; provided, however, that no party hereto shall assign any of the benefits and burdens hereunder, whether voluntarily or by operation of law, without prior written consent of the other party, and any such assignments without said consent shall be void.

- 4. <u>Incorporation by Reference</u>. The Request for Qualifications RFQ 739-21 Construction Management and Inspection Services, all executed Task Orders, and CONSULTANT'S Proposal is hereby incorporated in and made a part of this AGREEMENT. CONSULTANT agrees to comply with all of the requirements set forth therein.
- 5. <u>Precedence of AGREEMENT Documents</u>. If there is a conflict between AGREEMENT documents, the document highest in precedence shall control. The precedence shall be:

First: This AGREEMENT consisting of \_\_\_\_ pages

Second: All executed Task Orders

Third: Request for Proposal – RFQ 739-21 Construction Management and

Fourth: The CONSULTANT'S Proposal

6. <u>Description of Work</u>. OWNER hereby engages CONSULTANT, and CONSULTANT accepts such engagement, to perform the technical and professional services from time to time as requested by Owner, in writing and accepted by consultant pursuant to a Task Order issued under this Agreement. CONSULTANT shall perform and complete, in a manner satisfactory to OWNER, all work and services set forth in each Task Order. The Development Services Director or his designee shall have the right to review and inspect the work during the course of its performance at such times as may be specified by the Development Services Director, or his designee.

#### 7. Obligations of the OWNER.

- A. The total compensation to be paid by OWNER to CONSULTANT for all work and services associated with each assignment shall be specified in the Task Order in accordance with the Rate Schedule described in Exhibit "A".
- B. No payment made hereunder by OWNER to CONSULTANT, other than the final payment, shall be construed as an acceptance by OWNER of any work or materials, nor as evidence of satisfactory performance by CONSULTANT of its obligations under this AGREEMENT.

#### 8. **Obligations of the CONSULTANT**.

- A. CONSULTANT shall perform as required by this AGREEMENT. CONSULTANT also warrants on behalf of itself and all subcontractors engaged for the performance of this AGREEMENT.
- B. CONSULTANT shall be responsible for payment of all employees' and subcontractor's wages and benefits, and shall comply with all requirements pertaining to employer's liability, workers' compensation, unemployment insurance, and Social Security.

#### 9. Senate Bill 854.

SB 854 bill signed into law on June 20, 2014, established a new public works contractor registration program to replace prior Compliance Monitoring Unit (CMU) and Labor Compliance Program (LCP) requirements for bond-funded and other specified public works projects. The Department of Industrial Relations (DIR) requires all contractors and subcontractors who bid or perform work on a public works project (as defined under the Labor Code) be subject to a registration and annual renewal fee. Contractors must apply online and meet minimum qualifications to be registered as eligible to bid and work on public works

projects. The requirement to list only registered contractors and subcontractors on bids became effective on March 1, 2015. The requirement to only use registered contractors and subcontractors on public works projects applies to all projects awarded on or after April 1, 2015. **This project shall comply with the requirement of SB 854.** 

Coverage is not limited only to work performed at the construction site by the traditional construction trades, but extends broadly to workers employed "in the execution of" the public works contract.

Attention is directed to the revisions to Labor Code Section 4. 1725.5 and Section 5. 1771.1:

## A. SECTION 4 1725.5

"A contractor (consultant) must be registered pursuant to this section in order to be qualified to bid on, be listed in a bid proposal pursuant to Section 4104 of the Public Contract Code, or engage in the performance of any contract for public work that is subject to requirements of this chapter.

- (a) To qualify for registration under this section, a contractor must do all of the following:
  - (1) Beginning July 1, 2014, register with the Department of Industrial Relations in the manner prescribed by the department and pay an initial non-refundable application fee of \$400 to qualify for registration under this section and an annual renewal fee on or before July 1<sup>st</sup> each year thereafter. The annual renewal fee shall be in a uniform amount set by the Director of Industrial Relations, and the initial registration and renewal fees may be adjusted no more than annually by the director to support the costs specified in Section 1771.3.
  - (2) Provide such evidence, disclosures, or releases as are necessary to establish all of the following:
    - (A) Worker's Compensation coverage that meets the requirements of Division 4 (commencing with Section 3200) and includes sufficient coverage for any worker who the contractor will employ to perform work that is subject to prevailing wage requirements other than a contractor who, is separately registered under this section. Coverage may be evidenced by a current and valid Certificate of Workers' Compensation Insurance or Certification of Self-Insurance required under Section 7125 of the Business and Professions Code.
    - (B) Where applicable, the contractor is licensed in accordance with Chapter 9 (commencing with Section 7000) of the Business and Professions Code.
    - (C) The contractor does not have any delinquent liability to an employee or the state for any assessment of back wages, or related damages, interest, fines, or penalties pursuant to any final judgment, order, or determination by a court or any federal, state, or local administrative agency, including a confirmed arbitration award. However, for any judgment, order, or determination that is under appeal, provided that the contractor has secured the payment of any amount eventually found due through a bond or other appropriate means.
    - (D) The contractor is not currently debarred under Section 1777.1 or under any other federal or state law providing for the debarment of contractors from public works.
    - (E) The contractor has not bid on a public works contract, been listed in a bid proposal, or engaged in the performance of a contract for public works without being lawfully registered in accordance with this section, within the preceding 12 months, or since the effective date of the requirements set forth in subdivision (f), whichever is shorter. For a contractor found to be in

violation of the requirements of this paragraph only, the period of disqualification shall be waived if: (i) the contractor has not previously been found to be in violation of the requirements of this paragraph within the preceding 12 months; and (ii) the contractor pays an additional non-refundable penalty registration fee of \$2,000.

- (b) Fees received pursuant to this section shall be deposited in the State Public Works Enforcement Fund established pursuant to Section 1771.3 and shall be used only for the purposes specified in subdivision (b) of Section 1771.3
- (c) The term "contractor," as used in this section, shall include any subcontractor or "consultant", as defined in Section 1722.1.
- (d) A contractor who fails to pay the renewal fee required under paragraph (1) of subdivision (a) on or before the expiration of any prior period of registration shall be prohibited from bidding on or engaging in the performance of any contract for public work until once again registered pursuant to this section. A contractor who inadvertently fails to pay the renewal fee may retroactively renew its registration by paying an additional non-refundable penalty renewal fee equal to the amount of the renewal fee within 90 days of the date of the renewal fee.
- (e) The requirements of this section shall not apply with respect to any contract, which as a result of a determination by the Director of Industrial Relations pursuant to Section 1773.5 or decision by a court that classifies, after the time at which the body awarding the contract accepts the contractor's bid or awards the contractor a contract, the work covered by the bid or contract as a "public work," as defined in this chapter, to which Section 1771 applies, provided that:
  - (1) The body awarding the contract failed to identify as a public work, in the bid specification or in the contract documents that portion of the work that the determination or decision classifies as a "public work."
  - (2) Within twenty (20) days following service of notice on the awarding body of a determination by the Director of Industrial Relations pursuant to Section 1773.5 or a decision by a court that the contract was for public work as defined in this chapter, the contractor and any subcontractors are registered under this section or are replaced by a contractor or subcontractors who are registered under this section.
  - (3) The requirements of this section shall apply prospectively only to any bid, bid proposal, contract, or work performed after the awarding body is served with notice of the determination or decision referred to in paragraph (2) of this subdivision.
- (f) The requirements of this section shall apply to any bid proposal submitted on or after March 1, 2015, and any contract for public work, as defined in this chapter, entered into on or after April 1, 2015."

## B. <u>SECTION 5</u> 1771.1

(a) No contractor or subcontractor shall be qualified to bid on, be listed in a bid proposal pursuant to Section 4104 of the Public Contract Code, or engage in the performance of any contract for public work, as defined in this chapter, unless currently registered to perform public work pursuant to Section 1725.5 It shall not be a violation of this section for an unregistered contractor to submit a bid that is authorized by Section 7029.1 of the Business and Professions Code or by

Sections 10164 or 20103.5 of the public work pursuant to Section 1725.5 at the time the contract is awarded.

- (b) Notice of this requirement shall be included in all bid invitations and public works contracts, and no bid shall be accepted nor any contract or subcontract entered into without proof of the contractor or subcontractor's current eligibility to perform public work pursuant to Section 1725.5.
- (c) An inadvertent error in listing a subcontractor who is not registered pursuant to Section 1725.5 in a bid proposal shall not be grounds for filing a bid protest or grounds for considering the bid nonresponsive, provided that any of the following requirements are met: (1) the subcontractor is registered prior to the bid opening; (2) within 24 hours after the bid opening the subcontractor is registered and has paid the penalty registration fee specified in paragraph (E) of subdivision (2) of Section 1725.5; or (3) the subcontractor is replaced by another registered subcontractor pursuant to Section 4107 of the Public Contract Code.
- (d) Failure by a subcontractor to be registered to perform public work as required by subdivision (a) of this Section shall be grounds under Section 4107 of the Public Contract Code for the contractor, with the consent of the awarding authority, to substitute a subcontractor who is registered to perform public work pursuant to Section 1725.5 in place of the unregistered subcontractor.
- (e) The DIR shall maintain on its website a list of contractors who are currently registered to perform public work pursuant to Section 1725.5.
- (f) A contract entered into with any contractor or subcontractor in violation of subdivision (a) shall be subject to cancellation. However, no contract for public work shall be unlawful, void, or voidable solely due to the failure of the awarding body, contractor, or any subcontractor to comply with the requirements of Section 1725.5 or this section.
  - A. This section shall apply to any bid proposal submitted on or after March 1, 2015, and any contract for public work entered into on or after April 1, 2015. **This project shall comply with the requirements of SB 854.**

## 10. Payment of Prevailing Wage.

A. The State of California, Department of Industrial Relations, has ascertained the general prevailing rate of wages and employer payments for health and welfare, vacation, pension, and similar purposes applicable to the field work to be done, including mapping and surveying, geotechnical investigation, traffic control, and potholing services. These rates shall be the minimum wage rates for this project. These rates are on file with the City of Lancaster and copies will be made available to any interested party upon request.

Attention is directed to the provisions of Section 1777.5 (Chapter 1411, Statutes of 1968) and Section 1777.6 of the Labor Code concerning the employment of apprentices by the CONSULTANT or any subcontractor under him.

Section 1777.5, as amended, requires the CONSULTANT or subcontractor employing tradesmen in any apprenticeable occupation to apply to the joint apprenticeship committee nearest the site of the public works project and which administers the apprenticeship program in that trade for a certificate of approval. The certificate will also fix the ratio of apprentices to journeymen that will be used in the performance of the contract. The ratio of apprentices to journeymen in such cases shall not be less than one to five except:

- (A) When unemployment in the area of coverage by the joint apprenticeship committee has exceeded an average of 15% in the 90 days prior to the request for certificate; or
- (B) When the number of apprentices in training in the area exceeds a ratio of one to five; or
- (C) When the trade can show that it is replacing at least 1/30 of its membership through apprenticeship training on an annual basis statewide or locally; or
- (D) When the CONSULTANT provides evidence that he employs registered apprentices on all of his contracts on an annual average of not less than one apprentice to eight journeymen.

The CONSULTANT is required to make contributions to funds established for the administration of apprenticeship programs if he employs registered apprentices or journeymen in any apprenticeable trade on such contracts and if other Contractors on the public works site are making such contributions.

The CONSULTANT and any subcontractor under them shall comply with the requirements of Section 1777.5 and Section 1777.6 in the employment of apprentices.

Information relative to apprenticeship standards, wage schedules, and other requirements may be obtained from the Director of Industrial Relations, ex officio the Administrator of Apprenticeship, San Francisco, California, or from the Division of Apprenticeship Standards and its branch offices.

- B. The provisions of subsection A above shall be included in all solicitations or advertisements placed by or on behalf of CONSULTANT for personnel to perform any services under this AGREEMENT. OWNER shall have access to all documents, data and records of CONSULTANT and its subcontractors for purposes of determining compliance with the Prevailing Wage provisions of this Section.
- 11. <u>Audit</u>. OWNER shall have the option of inspecting and/or auditing all records and other written materials used by CONSULTANT in preparing its statements to OWNER as a condition precedent to any payment to CONSULTANT.
- 12. <u>Hold Harmless and Indemnification</u>. CONSULTANT agrees to indemnify and hold harmless the OWNER, its officers and employees, from and against any and all claims, losses, obligations, or liabilities whatsoever, including reasonable Attorney's fees, incurred in or in any manner arising out of or related to CONSULTANT'S negligent or willful wrongful acts, errors or omissions, or those of its employees or agents. CONSULTANT agrees to defend OWNER, its officers and employees, from and against any and all claims arising from any alleged negligent or wrongful acts, errors or omissions on the part of CONSULTANT or on the part of its employees.
- 13. <u>Amendments</u>. Any amendment, modification, or variation from the terms of this AGREEMENT shall be in writing and shall be effective only upon mutual written approval by the Development Services Director and CONSULTANT.

## 14. Non-Discrimination and Equal Employment Opportunity.

A. In the performance of this AGREEMENT, CONSULTANT shall not discriminate against any employee, subcontractor, or applicant for employment because of race, color, religion, ancestry,

sex, national origin, physical or mental disability or age. CONSULTANT will take affirmative action to ensure that subcontractors and applicants are employed, and that employees are treated during employment without regard to their race, color, religion, ancestry, sex, national origin, physical or mental disability or age. Affirmative action relating to employment shall include, but not be limited to the following: employment, upgrading, demotion or transfer; recruitment; layoff or termination; rates of pay or other forms of compensation; and selection for training including apprenticeship.

- B. The provisions of subsection A above shall be included in all solicitations or advertisements placed by or on behalf of CONSULTANT for personnel to perform any services under this AGREEMENT. OWNER shall have access to all documents, data and records of CONSULTANT and its subcontractors for purposes of determining compliance with the equal employment opportunity and non-discrimination provisions of this Section.
- 15. <u>Termination for Convenience</u>. The governing board of the OWNER may terminate this AGREEMENT at any time without cause by giving fifteen (15) days written notice to CONSULTANT of such termination and specifying the effective date thereof. In that event, all finished or unfinished documents and other materials shall, at the option of OWNER, become the OWNER's property. If this AGREEMENT is terminated by OWNER as provided herein, CONSULTANT will be paid a total amount equal to its costs as of the termination date, plus ten percent (10%) of that amount for profit. In no event shall the amount payable upon termination exceed the total maximum compensation provided for in this AGREEMENT.

## 16. **Termination for Cause**.

- A. The governing board of the OWNER may, by written notice to CONSULTANT, terminate the whole or any part of this AGREEMENT in any of the following circumstances:
- (1) If CONSULTANT fails to perform the services required by this AGREEMENT within the time specified in each Task Order or any authorized extension thereof; or
- (2) If CONSULTANT fails to perform the services called for by this AGREEMENT or so fails to make progress as to endanger performance of this AGREEMENT in accordance with its terms, and in either of these circumstances does not correct such failure within a period of ten (10) days (or such longer period that OWNER may authorize in writing) after receipt of notice from OWNER specifying such failure.
- B. In the event OWNER terminates this AGREEMENT in whole or in part as provided above in paragraph A of this Section, OWNER may procure, upon such terms and in such manner as it may deem appropriate, services similar to those terminated.
- C. If this AGREEMENT is terminated as provided above in paragraph A, OWNER may require CONSULTANT to provide all finished or unfinished documents, data, studies, drawings, maps, photographs, reports, etc., prepared by CONSULTANT. Upon such termination, CONSULTANT shall be paid an amount equal to the contract amount, less the cost of hiring another CONSULTANT to complete CONSULTANT's services. In the event no new CONSULTANT is employed, CONSULTANT shall be paid an amount equal to the value of the work performed. In ascertaining the value of the work performed up to the date of termination, consideration shall be given to completed work and work in progress, complete and incomplete drawings, and other documents whether delivered to OWNER or in possession of CONSULTANT, and authorized reimbursement expenses.

- D. If, after notice of termination of the AGREEMENT under the provisions of this Section, it is determined, for any reason, that CONSULTANT was not in default, or that the default was excusable, then the rights and obligations of the parties shall be the same as if the notice of termination had been issued pursuant to Section 15.
- 17. <u>Independent Contractor</u>. CONSULTANT is an independent contractor and shall have no power or authority to incur any debt, obligation or liability on behalf of the OWNER. It is expressly understood between the parties to this AGREEMENT that no employee/employer relationship is intended; CONSULTANT is an independent contractor.

## 18. **Insurance**.

A. The CONSULTANT, at its expense, shall maintain in effect at all times during the term of this AGREEMENT the following coverage and limits of insurance, which shall be maintained with insurers listed "A-, VIII" or better in the Best's Key Rating Guide:

B. The Consultant's insurance shall apply separately to each insured against whom claim is made or suit is brought, except with respect to the limits of the insured's liability.

- C. Professional liability insurance written on a "claims made" basis must be renewed for a period of three (3) years after this contract expires or is terminated. Such insurance must have the same coverage and limits as the policy that was in effect during the term of this contract and will cover Consultant for all claims made by the City insured entities arising out of any acts or omissions of Consultant or its officers, employees, or agents during the time this Agreement was in effect.
- D. Any deductibles or self-insurance retentions must be declared and approved by the City. At the City's option, either the insurer shall reduce or eliminate such deductibles or self-insured retentions as respects the City insured entities or the insurer shall procure a bond guaranteeing payment of losses and related investigations, claim administration and defense expenses.
- E. All insurance shall be primary and non-contributory as respects the City insured entities. Any insurance or self-insurance maintained by the City insured entities shall be in excess of the Consultant's insurance and shall not contribute with it.
- F. Consultant shall furnish the City with Certificates of Insurance and with original endorsements effecting coverage required by this Agreement. Certificates of Insurance shall meet the following requirements:
  - (1) Show that the insurance policy has been endorsed to state that coverage shall not be suspended, voided, cancelled, reduced in coverage or in limits except after 30 days prior written notice (10 days written notice for non-payment) to the City of Lancaster.
  - (2) List in the "Descriptions of Operations/Locations/Vehicles" section:

The City of Lancaster, its elected officials, officers, employees, and volunteers are included as additional covered parties, but only insofar as the operations under this contract are concerned."

(3) List in the "Certificate Holder" section:

- G. Consultant shall include all subcontractors as an insured under its policies or shall furnish separate certificates and endorsements for each subcontractor. Subcontractors are subject to the same insurance requirements as the Consultant.
- 19. <u>Commencement and Completion of Work</u>. The execution of this AGREEMENT by the parties does not constitute an authorization to proceed. The services of CONSULTANT shall commence when the OWNER, acting by and through its Development Services Director or his designee, has issued an executed Task Order for the work described therein.

CONSULTANT shall have no claim for compensation for any services or work which has not been authorized by the OWNER's Notice to Proceed.

## 20. Extension of Time for Completion of Work.

- A. If, at any time, the work is delayed due to suspension order by OWNER, or due to any other cause which, in the reasonable opinion of the OWNER, is unforeseeable and beyond the control and not attributable to the fault or negligence of CONSULTANT, then CONSULTANT shall be entitled to an extension of time equal to said delay, subject to the OWNER's right to terminate this AGREEMENT pursuant to Section 15.
- B. CONSULTANT shall submit to OWNER a written request for an extension of time within ten (10) days after commencement of such delay, and failure to do so shall constitute a waiver thereof. OWNER shall, in its sole discretion, determine whether and to what extent any extensions of time shall be permitted.
- C. No extension of time requested or granted hereunder shall entitle CONSULTANT to additional compensation unless, as a consequence of such extension, additional work must be performed. In such event, OWNER shall in good faith consider any request for additional compensation submitted by CONSULTANT.
- 21. <u>Ownership of Documents</u>. All plans, specifications, reports, studies, tracings, maps and other documents prepared or obtained by CONSULTANT in the course of performing the work required by this AGREEMENT shall be the property of the OWNER. Basic sketches, charts, computations and similar data prepared or obtained by CONSULTANT under this AGREEMENT shall, upon request, be made available to OWNER without restriction or limitation on their use.
- 22. <u>Data Provided to CONSULTANT</u>. OWNER shall provide to CONSULTANT, without charge, all data, including reports, records, maps and other information, now in the OWNER's possession which may facilitate the timely performance of the work described in each Task Order.

## 23. **CONSULTANT's Warranties and Representations**.

CONSULTANT warrants and represents to OWNER as follows:

- A. CONSULTANT has not employed or retained any person or entity, other than a bona fide employee working exclusively for CONSULTANT, to solicit or obtain this AGREEMENT.
- B. CONSULTANT has not paid or agreed to pay any person or entity, other than a bona fide employee working exclusively for CONSULTANT, any fee, commission, percentage, gift, or any other consideration contingent upon or resulting from the execution of this AGREEMENT. Upon any breach or violation of this warranty, OWNER shall have the right, in its sole discretion, to terminate this AGREEMENT without further liability, or, in the alternative, to deduct from any sums payable hereunder the full amount or value of any such fee, commission, percentage or gift.
- C. CONSULTANT has no knowledge that any officer or employee of the OWNER has any interest, whether contractual, noncontractual, financial, proprietary, or otherwise, in this transaction or in the business of the CONSULTANT, and that if any such interest comes to the knowledge of CONSULTANT at any time, a complete written disclosure of such interest will be made to OWNER, even if such interest would not be deemed a prohibited "conflict of interest" under applicable laws.

D. Upon the execution of this AGREEMENT, CONSULTANT has no interest, direct or indirect, in any transaction or business entity which would conflict with or in any manner hinder the performance of services and work required by this AGREEMENT, nor shall any such interest be acquired during the term of this AGREEMENT.

## 24. **Resolution of Disputes**.

- A. Disputes regarding the interpretation or application of any provisions of this AGREEMENT shall, to the extent reasonably feasible, be resolved through good faith negotiations between the parties.
- B. If the parties cannot resolve the dispute through good faith negotiations, either party may give Notice of Dispute to the other party. The Notice of Dispute shall state the nature of the dispute and the corrective action necessary to remedy the dispute.

After Notice of Dispute, the parties shall first attempt to resolve any disputes by mediation. The parties shall agree on a single mediator. Mediation shall be conducted in Lancaster, California. Each party shall pay its own attorneys' fees and the costs of mediation shall be split equally between the parties.

If the dispute has not been resolved by mediation within 45 days after Notice of Dispute, or the parties are unable to agree to a mediator, within 15 days after Notice of Dispute, then, the dispute may, upon agreement of the parties be resolved by binding arbitration.

#### 25. Exhibits.

Any additional work will require a separate Task Order Authorization for Consultant Services signed by both parties.

CONSULTANT will be reimbursed, as promptly as fiscal procedures will permit, upon receipt by the City of itemized invoices. Invoices shall be submitted no later than forty-five (45) calendar days after the performance of work for which CONSULTANT is billing. Invoices shall detail the work performed on each milestone, on each project, as applicable. Invoices shall follow the format stipulated for the Cost Proposal and shall reference this contract number, task order number and project title. Final invoice must contain the final cost and all credits due City. The final invoice should be submitted within sixty (60) calendar days after completion of CONSULTANT's work.

Consultant shall not be reimbursed for actual travel expenses incurred in the performance of the work.

#### **Recommendation:**

Award PWCP 21-008 (REBID), 2021 Neighborhood Improvement Project, to Sully-Miller Contracting Company of Brea, California, in the amount of \$3,820,928.30 plus a 10% contingency, to repair and resurface approximately twenty-four (24) lane-miles of streets, as part of the City's Pavement Management Program (PMP). Authorize the City Manager, or his designee, to sign all documents. This contract is awarded to the lowest responsible bidder per California Public Code Section 22038 (b).

## **Fiscal Impact:**

\$4,203,021.13 (including 10% contingency) to be awarded; with these actions, sufficient funds are available in Capital Improvements Budget Account Numbers 209-15ST079-924 and 701-15ST079-924.

#### **Background:**

The proposed project will be the seventh project funded, in part, with road bond funds in addition to Proposition C funds. The proposed project will include approximately twenty-four (24) lanemiles of roadway repair and rehabilitation in the following project areas: (1) NBH 1- Avenue J to Avenue J-8 and Division Street to  $5^{th}$  Street East, and (2) NBH  $2-10^{th}$  Street West to Sierra Highway and Avenue I to Lancaster Boulevard.

Per Section 2.2 of the Existing Community Workforce Agreement ("CWA"), this project is subject to the CWA by and between the City of Lancaster and Los Angeles/Orange Counties Building and Construction Trades Council, and the Signatory Craft Councils and Unions ("CWA"). The PWCP 21-008 (REBID) contract documents were prepared, and the project was advertised accordingly. Per Section 2.6(b) of the CWA, Letters of Assent shall be submitted by the contractor and each of its subcontractors, of whatever tier, forty-eight (48) hours prior to commencement of work, or

within forty-eight (48) hours after the award of Project Work to that contractor (or subcontractor), whichever occurs later.

On April 6, 2021, at 11:00 a.m., the City conducted an electronic bid opening for PWCP 21-008 via PlanetBids. Four (4) bids were received and opened. All bids were rejected on May 11, 2021. The project was repackaged and re-advertised.

On July 8, 2021, at 11:00 a.m., the City conducted an electronic bid opening for PWCP 21-008 (REBID) via PlanetBids. Sully-Miller Contracting Company was the lowest responsive bidder amongst four (4) bids. Of those four (4) electronic bids, three (3) were deemed responsive. The bids were as follows:




## **Background:**

#### **Fiscal Impact:**

\$219,250.00; sufficient funds are available in the Community Development Division budget. These funds are in Account No. 101-4770-316.

### **Background:**

The City of Lancaster adopted thresholds for VMT as required by Senate Bill 743 in July 2020. In order to facilitate the implementation of these thresholds, the City is proposing to adopt a Citywide VMT Program and EIR.

To assist with the preparation of this program and EIR, the City selected a consultant on the Multi-Year Professional Services Agreement Pre-Qualified List under Service Group Category (SGC) 4 – Environmental Services. On May 9, 2021 the City signed a contract to start the preparation of the Citywide VMT Program in the amount of \$86,440.00 for Tasks 1.1, 1.3, 2, 3 and 4. With the approval of the new budget, the City wishes to retain Michael Baker to prepare the remainder of the work identified in the proposal (Tasks 1.2 and 5 through 8). The Consultant will be responsible for aspects of the VMT program development and preparation of the EIR. Staff anticipates that the program and EIR will be completed by the Spring of 2022. With approval of Additional Authorization No. 1, the Professional Services Agreement will be revised for a total contract amount not to exceed \$305,690.00.

Michael Baker International (Michael Baker) is pleased to submit this proposal to the City of Lancaster (City) to prepare a Vehicle Miles Traveled (VMT) Mitigation Program and associated environmental clearance documentation under the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA). We understand that implementation of Senate Bill 743 (SB 743) and the City's recently adopted VMT guidelines have created challenging entitlement conditions for many projects throughout the City, with many smaller projects subject to onerous requirements under CEQA. #### PROJECT UNDERSTANDING AND KEY STAFF

Based on our conversation with City staff, we understand that recent development projects within the City have resulted in potentially significant VMT impacts under CEQA based on the City's recently adopted VMT thresholds per Senate Bill 743. Therefore, the City's desire to develop a VMT Mitigation Program that can streamline future development within Lancaster while also provide a funding mechanism to implement active transportation and infrastructure improvement projects.

The proposed project is intended to provide developers with the ability to mitigate potentially significant VMT impacts to less than significant levels under CEQA by paying impact fees towards the proposed VMT Mitigation Program. Funding from the VMT Mitigation Program would then be utilized towards active transportation infrastructure improvement projects, such as expanded sidewalks, multi-use trails, shared bicycle lanes, bus shelters, etc.

Together, Michael Baker, Fehr & Peers, and EPS have a comprehensive understanding of the City's VMT guidelines and thresholds. Mitigating VMT impacts in the City in areas where VMT metrics are 100% or greater than the regional average is challenging primarily due to lack of high-quality transit in the City. However, the City has a desire to focus active transportation, transit and VMT reduction strategies in the City's downtown, in transit priority areas and in VMT efficient areas of the City. The City of San Diego implemented a strategy where primarily suburban residential areas of the City contribute fees that fund infrastructure in the City's more densely populated urban areas. This approach to developing a fee program for the unmitigable areas of the City is reflected in the Scope of Work provided. The program identifies existing City programs and planned projects as well as potential mitigation strategies included in the City VMT guidelines and establishes a citywide implementation fee. The fee will be associated with VMT benefits and a "per ADT" or "per VMT" fee will be established in the recommended Nexus Study.

Our key staff have a strong familiarity with the City based on current and past experience working with City staff, extensive experience with transportation-related projects, and high-quality expertise in technical analysis, which are detailed in the following table. #### **SCOPE OF WORK**

The following scope of work focuses on preparation of the VMT Mitigation Program and associated environmental compliance documentation, which is assumed to be a Program EIR. Based on the information provided and our experience, we have made every effort to provide a scope of work to meet the City's needs. Due to the uniqueness of this project, we are open to further discussions and refinements of the scope of work based upon additional information and discussions with City staff.

#### 1.0 PROJECT MANAGEMENT

#### 1.1 Kick-Off Meeting

Michael Baker will prepare materials for and conduct the project kick-off meeting, which will be conducted within two weeks of notice to proceed. Michael Baker will be responsible for preparing the meeting agenda, developing a list of data needs and preparing meeting minutes. Minutes will be sent to the City within five business days of the kick-off meeting.

## 1.2 Project Team Meetings

Michael Baker will prepare materials for and facilitate up to five (5) project team meetings, which will be held at key decision points during Tasks 2.0 through 7.0. In addition, Michael Baker's transportation team will attend up to four public hearings and one CEQA specific scoping meeting.

#### 1.3 VMT Mitigation Program Management / Coordination

Michael Baker will conduct regular check in meetings with the City project manager to provide updates on the project progress, coordinate on project schedule and milestones, and discuss potential issues. We anticipate these meeting will happen twice per month and will involve the City project manager and Michael Baker's technical leads. This task also includes time allocated for day to day project management and coordination of subconsultants and internal project team meetings.



#### 2.0 STAKEHOLDER MEETING / COORDINATION

#### 2.1 Develop Stakeholder Outreach Plan

Michael Baker will work with City staff to identify key stakeholder groups in the region and develop a strategy to present the project in small group settings. This task assumes that meetings will be virtual using platforms such as Zoom or WebEx. The purpose of the meetings will be to provide information on our analysis, recommendations and mitigation strategies.

#### 2.2 Conduct Stakeholder Outreach Meetings

Michael Baker will facilitate and prepare materials for up to five (5) virtual outreach meetings. Following each meeting, Michael Baker will provide a summary of comments received.

### 3.0 REVIEW CITY DOCUMENTS / MODEL

#### 3.1 Review City Documents

Michael Baker will review relevant available City documents including but not limited to: City TIA guidelines, VMT documentation, capital improvement plans, active transportation plans, safe routes to school plans and other planning documents that include infrastructure or policies related to VMT or TDM measures.

Michael Baker will develop a map that illustrates the planned infrastructure projects in the City that will be relevant to the potential VMT mitigation strategies such as new sidewalks, trails, pathways, bicycle lanes or transit improvements. Additional programs and policies that affect VMT will be documented in a supporting technical memorandum.

### 4.0 IDENTIFY VTM REDUCTION STRATEGIES / EVALUATION

#### 4.1 Peer Agency Review

Michael Baker will conduct a peer agency review of up to four other Southern California Agencies to determine how VMT mitigation strategies are being implemented. We will work with the City to identify agencies similar to Lancaster who have implemented VMT mitigation programs. As part of the peer agency review, Michael Baker will conduct online document research and review available publications. In addition, we will conduct phone interviews with key staff at each agency to find out about their process of identifying and implementing mitigation strategies.

Michael Baker will work closely with the City to develop questions prior to conducting the interview and will include staff in the interviews if appropriate. Information gathered from the online research and the phone interviews will be clearly documented in a technical memorandum.



#### 4.2 Establish List of VMT Reduction Strategies

The City's VMT guidelines include a list of potential VMT reduction strategies. The list of strategies will be reviewed and supplemented based on the City document review and information gathered from the peer reviews. For each of the strategies, Michael Baker will provide a detailed discussion of applicability to the City of Lancaster and anticipated VMT benefit. Findings will be presented with the Peer Agency review technical memorandum.

#### 4.3 Evaluation of VMT Benefits

Working with Fehr & Peers, Michael Baker will test the VMT benefits of the identified VMT reduction strategies. We anticipate this process will be a combination of modeling and off-model analysis and will focus on implementation of improvements and programs in the transit priority areas and VMT efficient areas of the City.

Fehr & Peers will be responsible for preparing a technical memorandum summarizing the results of the modeling efforts.

#### 5.0 COST ANALYSIS OF VMT STRATEGIES

#### 5.1 Cost Assessment

Michael Baker and EPS will prepare planning level cost estimates for the identified VMT reduction strategies identified in Task 4.0. Cost will be summarized in a tabular format and will be provided to the City for review and comment. Physical improvements will be based on linear feet of improvements using typical construction and escalation costs. Programmatic measure costs will be based on general costs for implementation, staff time if appropriate and other factors. Upon City review and comment, Michael Baker will refine the costs and submit a final cost assessment table for inclusion in Task 6.0 Nexus Study.

#### 6.0 NEXUS STUDY

#### 6.1 Identify Appropriate Methodological Approach

The best methodological approach for a VMT will depend on the type of VMT reducing transportation improvements being considered, the type and location of growth, traffic data and modeling capabilities, CEQA compliance, and other considerations. EPS will work with the project team to identify several potential approaches to establishing the VMT Mitigation Program utilizing best Statewide practices. Based on City feedback regarding project goals, EPS and the project team will recommend a preferred approach, recognizing that specific methodological approaches may need to be refined as part of the study process.

#### 6.2 Nexus Analysis

EPS will work with the project team to prepare the nexus calculations needed to establish a legally sound VMT mitigation fee. In particular, EPS will work with the project team to estimate the cost of identified



transportation improvements, the net VMT benefits of the program, and cost allocations between existing and new development and between different land uses. The nexus analysis will calculate the maximum allowable fee by land use that can be charged for VMT mitigation.

#### 6.3 Meetings, Presentations, and Reports

Based on the above analysis, EPS will prepare a Draft Nexus Report that summarize the assumptions, methodology, and findings as required for fee ordinance and resolution adoption. The study will include recommendations for various implementation elements related to the proposed VMT Mitigation Program. Based on one round of consolidated comments from City staff, EPS will revise and prepare a Final VMT Fee Nexus Report.

This task also assumes EPS' participation in one (1) public presentation as well as up to four (4) meetings with City staff conducted via teleconference. EPS may require a budget augment if additional meetings are requested by the City, particularly those in person, as well as any additional report iterations.

#### 7.0 MOBILITY ZONE RECOMMENDATION / MAPPING

#### 7.1 Mobility Zone Recommendations and Mapping

Using the VMT maps prepared for the TIA guidelines and the recommendations included in the Nexus Study, Michael Baker will develop a map and supporting documentation for the Citywide Mobility Zones, which will be used to identify project mitigation requirements. It is anticipated that Traffic Analysis Zones (TAZs) where VMT is anticipated to exceed the regional threshold by 100 percent or more will be determined to be in a "VMT inefficient, non-mitigated zone," where impacts will be determined to be significant and unavoidable in the Program EIR prepared for this study and fees will be paid by projects in these zones to help contribute toward VMT reducing improvements in VMT efficient or potentially efficient zones. Where VMT is anticipated to be between 85 and 100 percent of the regional VMT, the TAZ may be determined to be "potentially VMT efficient with mitigation." In these zones, VMT impacts may be mitigated through payment of a fee or through physical improvements. Finally, a third zone will be established, which is considered "VMT efficient," where VMT is anticipated to be 85 percent or less than the regional average. Projects in these TAZs would not be required to mitigate impacts. Michael Baker will submit the technical memorandum to the City summarizing this approach to VMT mitigation.

#### 8.0 ENVIRONMENTAL REVIEW

Michael Baker proposes to prepare a Program EIR for the proposed VMT Mitigation Program. While the EIR will serve as a "standalone" CEQA document for the proposed project, Michael Baker will utilize information provided in the City's General Plan EIR and Master Environmental Assessment for background and existing conditions information to inform portions of the analysis (e.g., utilizing Citywide biological/cultural resources data to provide baseline information for impacts related to active transportation improvements in various Mobility Zones). A detailed scope of work for the Program EIR is provided below.



#### 8.1 Project Scoping

#### 8.1.1 CEQA Kick-off and Project Characteristics

The CEQA work program will be initiated with a formal virtual kick-off meeting with City staff to discuss the project features in greater detail. This initial meeting is vital to the success of the process and will be a key milestone in order to confirm the work program, scheduling, and overall communications. Prior to the kick-off, Michael Baker will distribute a kick-off meeting agenda and detailed memorandum, which will identify information needs.

#### 8.1.2 Research and Investigation

Michael Baker will obtain and review available referenced data for the project area, including policy documentation from the City of Lancaster, County of Los Angeles, State and Federal agencies, the Southern California Association of Governments (SCAG), and other agencies which may be affected by the project. Specifically, the General Plan, General Plan EIR, and General Plan MEA will be reviewed and incorporated. This information, along with environmental data and information available from the City and County, will become part of the foundation of the Program EIR and will be reviewed and incorporated into the analysis, as deemed appropriate.

#### 8.1.3 Notice of Preparation

This task assumes the City will be responsible for preparation, distribution, and posting of the Notice of Preparation (NOP) for the project.

#### 8.1.4 Public Scoping Meeting

Michael Baker will conduct one (1) virtual scoping meeting during the NOP public review period that will be set up as a brief project overview presentation so that the community can gain an understanding of the proposed project and provide comments based upon accurate knowledge of the proposed project. The scoping meeting will orient the community on the CEQA review process and will be presented in a manner which the community can gain a greater understanding of the proposal, intent of CEQA, and the key issue areas to be addressed in the Program EIR. Michael Baker will provide a PowerPoint presentation to supplement the discussion. Following the presentation, the meeting will be devoted to public participation, questions, and comments. Written comments will be encouraged, and these comments, along with oral comments, will become a part of the administrative record.

#### 8.2 Administrative Draft Program EIR

#### 8.2.1 Introduction and Purpose

The Introduction will cite the provisions of CEQA, the CEQA Guidelines, and the City of Lancaster CEQA Implementation procedures for which the proposed project is subject. This section will identify the purpose of the study and statutory authority as well as document scoping procedures, summary of the Program EIR format, listing of responsible and trustee agencies, and documentation incorporated by reference.



#### 8.2.2 Executive Summary

The Executive Summary will include a project summary; an overview of project impacts, mitigation, and levels of significance after mitigation; summary of project alternatives; and any areas of controversy or issues to be resolved. The project impacts summary will be presented in a columnar format.

#### 8.2.3 Project Description

The Project Description will detail the project location, background and history of the project, discretionary actions, characteristics, goals and objectives, phasing, agreements, and permits and approvals that are required based on available information. This section will also include a summary of the local environmental setting for the project. Exhibits depicting the regional and site vicinity will be included in this section.

#### 8.2.4 Thresholds of Significance

This section will provide a comprehensive description of thresholds of significance for each issue area of the environmental analysis. The significance threshold criteria will be described and will provide the basis for conclusions of significance. Primary sources to be used in identifying the criteria include the CEQA Guidelines, and local, State, Federal, or other standards applicable to an impact category. The thresholds of significance for each topical area will be incorporated within each Environmental Analysis section discussed below.

#### 8.2.5 Cumulative Projects/Analysis

In accordance with Section 15130 of the CEQA Guidelines, the Draft Program EIR will include a section providing a detailed listing of cumulative projects and actions under consideration for the analysis. The likelihood of occurrence and level of severity will be studied. The purpose of the section is to present a listing and description of projects, past, present, and anticipated in the reasonably foreseeable future, even if those projects are outside of Lancaster's jurisdiction. The potential for impact and levels of significance are contingent upon the radius or area of interaction with the project area. Michael Baker will consult with City staff and other applicable local jurisdictions to define the appropriate study area for the cumulative analysis. The cumulative analysis for each topical area will be incorporated throughout the analyses in detailed under Task 8.2.6.

#### 8.2.6 Environmental Analysis

Michael Baker will evaluate the necessary information with respect to the existing conditions, the potential adverse effects of project implementation (both individual and cumulative), and measures to mitigate such effects.

Environmental issues raised during the scoping process (NOP responses, public scoping meeting, and any other relevant and valid informative sources) will also be evaluated. The analyses will be based upon available data, results from additional research, and an assessment of existing technical data.

The Environmental Analysis section of the Draft Program EIR will thoroughly discuss the existing conditions for each environmental issue area, identify short-term construction and long-term operational



impacts associated with the project, and their levels of significance. The thresholds for significance shall be identified for every environmental issue. Feasible mitigation measures will be recommended to reduce the significance of impacts and identify areas of significant unavoidable impacts even after mitigation. This section will include analysis for the following environmental issue areas.

#### AESTHETICS/LIGHT AND GLARE

Utilizing the General Plan, General Plan EIR, and General Plan MEA, Michael Baker will characterize the existing aesthetic environment within the City, including a discussion of scenic resources, public views, and scenic routes. Major scenic resources and scenic routes within the unique desert scene of the City include long-range views of the San Gabriel Mountains to the south, the Sierra Pelonas to the southwest and west and the Tehachapi Mountains to the northwest. Michael Baker will analyze the project's potential visual impacts to scenic views/vistas in the City, particularly from public areas. Impacts to designated scenic resources as a result of the proposed project will be considered. Additionally, the section will include a project consistency analysis with the City's existing General Plan policies governing scenic quality. Potential project impacts associated with the introduction of new light and glare sources will also be considered.

#### AGRICULTURE AND FORESTRY RESOURCES

According to the California Department of Conservation's Important Farmland Maps, areas within Lancaster are designated either Prime, Unique, or Farmland of Local Importance. However, future VMT improvement projects in accordance with the proposed project would not be constructed near or within these important farmland areas. Thus, this scope of work assumes that no adverse effects to existing agricultural and forestry resources will result and, as such, will be documented in the Effects Found Not to Be Significant section.

#### AIR QUALITY

Existing Conditions/Regulatory Framework. The project is located within the Mojave Desert Air Basin (MDAB), which is under the jurisdiction of the Antelope Valley Air Quality Management District (AVAQMD). Baseline meteorological and air quality data developed through the California Air Resources Board (CARB) will be utilized for the description of existing ambient air quality. Air quality data from the nearest air quality monitoring station will be included to help highlight existing air quality local to the project area. The existing conditions will also describe and address the requirements set forth by the AVAQMD's Federal 8-Hour Ozone Attainment Plan. The analysis will be conducted in compliance with the AVAQMD CEQA Guidelines.

<u>Short-term Construction Emissions</u>. Air quality impacts from short-term construction activities associated with future VMT improvement projects in accordance with the proposed VMT Mitigation Program will be qualitatively analyzed. The short-term construction analysis will be conducted in compliance with the AVAQMD CEQA Guidelines. Naturally occurring asbestos impacts will also be discussed qualitatively. If necessary, mitigation measures will be identified to reduce construction-related emissions to the extent feasible.

<u>Long-Term Operational Emissions</u>. Operational (i.e., area, mobile, and energy source) emissions will be quantified and compared to the AVAQMD air quality emissions thresholds. The emissions will be



quantitatively derived utilizing the California Emissions Estimator Model version 2016.3.2 (CalEEMod). Primary sources of emissions will be related to area sources and local/regional vehicle miles traveled. Project consistency with the AVAQMD's Federal 8-Hour Ozone Attainment Plan will be evaluated. This scope excludes a Health Risk Assessment (HRA).

<u>Air Emissions Health Impacts</u>. As a result of the California Supreme Court decision for *Sierra Club vs. County of Fresno* (Friant Ranch L.P.), the resultant human health impacts from the project's short-term construction and long-term operational air emissions will be analyzed.

<u>Valley Fever</u>. Valley Fever, or *coccidioidomycosis*, is a pulmonary infection of human and other mammals caused by inhalation of the spores of the *Coccidioides immitis* fungus, which grows in the soil of the southwestern United States. Michael Baker International will conduct a review of maps and other available information to determine whether the soils within the project site have the potential to contain Valley Fever spores.

#### BIOLOGICAL RESOURCES

The Biological Resources section will rely on the General Plan, General Plan EIR, and General Plan MEA to describe the existing baseline biological conditions on a regional and local basis, analyze the potential direct and indirect impacts of the proposed project on any sensitive resources, and identify appropriate mitigation measures for those impacts determined to be significant to reduce potential impacts to the extent feasible.

#### CULTURAL RESOURCES

Utilizing information in the General Plan, General Plan EIR, and General Plan MEA, Michael Baker will describe the historic and archaeological setting of Lancaster and evaluate the project's potential to impact cultural resources based on CEQA significance thresholds. If there are known or potential prehistoric or historic resources that could be impacted by implementation of the proposed VMT Mitigation Program, mitigation measures will be identified to prevent or minimize disturbance of such resources, as appropriate.

#### ENERGY

Michael Baker will analyze the energy implications of the project pursuant to Public Resources Code Section 21100(b)(3) and Appendix G of the CEQA Guidelines. These statutes and guidelines require a project to describe, where relevant, the wasteful, inefficient, and unnecessary consumption of energy caused by a project. In addition, Appendix G of the CEQA Guidelines requires a consistency analysis with State or local plans for renewable energy or energy efficiency.

#### GEOLOGY AND SOILS

The Geology and Soils section will describe the City's geologic conditions, including areas of potential geologic hazards such as landslide, liquefaction, fault rupture, etc. The potential for future VMT infrastructure improvement projects developed in accordance with the proposed VMT Mitigation Program to result in substantial adverse effects involving exposure of people or structures to fault rupture, strong seismic ground shaking, seismic-related ground failure (i.e., liquefaction), or landslides will be



analyzed. This section will also evaluate potential project impacts related to paleontological resources within Lancaster.

#### GREENHOUSE GAS EMISSIONS

Michael Baker will review the project's vehicle trip generation, energy consumption, and other operational sources and will prepare an inventory of the greenhouse gas (GHG) emissions (i.e., nitrous oxide, methane, and carbon dioxide) from both direct (i.e., area and mobile sources) and indirect sources (i.e., energy/water consumption and wastewater/solid waste generation). CalEEMod will be used to quantify long-term operational GHG emissions associated with the future VMT improvement projects. Construction GHG emissions will be qualitatively analyzed. Reductions from recently adopted programs and regulations will be included, such as improvements in fuel efficiency, state building code energy efficiency, and landscaping water efficiency. The analysis will determine the project's impact by identifying if the project GHG emissions exceed the thresholds established by the AVAQMD. The GHG emissions analysis will also discuss the potential global climate change impacts, the effects of GHG emissions, and history of GHG emissions regulations in California. The analysis will review project consistency with applicable plans for the purpose of reducing GHG emissions, such as the California Air Resources Board's 2017 Climate Change Scoping Plan and Southern California Association of Governments' Connect SoCal: 2020-2045 Regional Transportation Plan/Sustainable Communities Strategy (2020–2045 RTP/SCS). Mitigation measures will be identified and incorporated, as necessary, to reduce potentially significant GHG impacts of the proposed project.

#### HAZARDS AND HAZARDOUS MATERIALS

Based on the General Plan, General Plan EIR, General Plan MEA, and available online resources, a summary of existing regulatory conditions per the State Cortese Database Listing and hazardous materials conditions within the City will be provided. Michael Baker will utilize the above referenced research/documentation to analyze potential project-related impacts, as they pertain to hazards and hazardous materials per the CEQA thresholds of significance. Potential accidental conditions will also be analyzed. Further, impacts from future VMT improvement projects on emergency access and evacuation routes within the City will also be considered.

### HYDROLOGY AND WATER QUALITY

This analysis will describe existing and proposed hydrology and water quality conditions. Michael Baker will utilize available existing information from the General Plan, General Plan EIR, and General Plan MEA to support the analysis within this section. Hydrology and water quality information provided in local reference documents will also be utilized to identify hydrological or water quality concerns. The potential for future VMT improvement projects associated with the proposed VMT Mitigation Program to degrade water quality, interfere with groundwater recharge, or expose people to water-related hazards will be identified. Potential for the proposed project to violate water quality standards or waste discharge requirements will also be analyzed. Applicable mitigation measures, if necessary, will be identified and incorporated, as necessary, to reduce the project's potentially significant hydrology and water quality impacts.



#### LAND USE AND PLANNING

The proposed project is a VMT Mitigation Program to provide funding for future VMT improvement infrastructure projects. No new land uses or development are currently proposed as part of the project. Thus, no impacts related physically dividing an established community would occur. Nevertheless, the proposed project will be analyzed to evaluate consistency with applicable land use plans and policies, including the Southern California Association of Governments' 2020-2045 RTP/SCS, General Plan, and Municipal Code.

#### MINERAL RESOURCES

This scope of work assumes that no adverse effects to mineral resources will result and, as such, will be documented in the Effects Found Not to Be Significant section of the EIR.

#### NOISE

<u>Existing Conditions</u>. The applicable noise and land use compatibility criteria for Lancaster will be reviewed and noise standards regulating noise impacts will be discussed. Noise contour maps from the General Plan will be reviewed and utilized for a baseline comparison.

<u>Construction-Related Noise and Vibration</u>. Construction activities associated with future VMT improvement projects would occur during implementation of the proposed VMT Mitigation Program. Noise impacts from construction sources will be qualitatively analyzed. The construction noise analysis will rely on the City's Noise Ordinance to evaluate potential short-term construction noise impacts.

<u>Operational Noise Sources</u>. Operational noise sources will be qualitatively addressed and analyzed for the potential redistribution of traffic and improvements that are planned through the proposed VMT Mitigation Program.

#### POPULATION AND HOUSING

The proposed project would establish a funding mechanism for future VMT improvement infrastructure projects in the City. No development is proposed as part of the project that could directly or indirectly result in substantial population growth or displace existing residents or residences. As such, the proposed project is not anticipated to have substantial adverse effects pertaining to population and housing. These findings will be documented in the Effects Found Not to Be Significant section.

#### PUBLIC SERVICES

The proposed VMT Mitigation Program would fund future VMT improvement infrastructure projects. However, no residential or non-residential development is proposed as part of the project. Thus, the project is not expected to result in a substantial increase in demand for public services. These findings will be documented in the Effects Found Not to Be Significant section.



## RECREATION

No residential or non-residential development is proposed as part of the project that could result in any substantial adverse effects involving recreational uses, or the need for such facilities. As such, Michael Baker will document these findings in the Effects Found Not to Be Significant section.

## TRANSPORTATION

The Transportation section will analyze the potential for project implementation (i.e., development of future VMT infrastructure improvements funded by the proposed VMT Mitigation Program) to conflict with appliable transportation plans and policies, including transit, roadway, bicycle, and pedestrian facilities. The intent of the project is to improve Citywide VMT and thus, it is anticipated that project implementation would not conflict or be inconsistent with CEQA Guidelines section 15064.3, subdivision (b). Potential impacts related to geometric design feature hazards and emergency access will also be considered.

## TRIBAL CULTURAL RESOURCES

Michael Baker will assist the City with meeting Native American consultation requirements pursuant to Assembly Bill (AB) 52. In coordination with the City, we will prepare and send initial consultation letters to tribes that have requested AB 52 notification and complete the consultation log. However, because consultation is required to be government-to-government, pursuant to State law, we assume the City will complete AB 52 consultation and provide documentation (e.g., letters, emails, and phone conversation summaries) for inclusion in the consultation log. This scope does not include meetings or additional consultation.

Michael Baker will incorporate the findings made as part of the City's AB 52 consultation process. Should tribal consultation efforts, if any, determine the City is sensitive to, or includes known tribal cultural resources, mitigation will be incorporated into the section.

## UTILITIES AND SERVICE SYSTEMS

The ability of existing infrastructure within the City to support future VMT infrastructure improvements in accordance with the proposed VMT Mitigation Program will be evaluated in terms of increased demand/generation of utilities, including water, wastewater, dry utilities, and solid waste. Given the nature of the anticipated improvements, potential impacts would primarily be associated with construction activities. The discussion will focus on the potential alteration of existing facilities, extension, or expansion of new facilities and the increased demand on services based on the anticipated VMT improvements.

## WILDFIRE

The California Department of Forestry and Fire Protection does not identify any areas within the City as Very High Fire Hazard Severity Zones. As such, Michael Baker will document these findings in the Effects Found Not to Be Significant section.



## 8.2.7 Growth Inducement

Michael Baker will analyze the project's potential growth-inducing impacts pursuant to CEQA Guidelines Section 15126(g). The analysis in this section will be based on data from the City of Lancaster, California Department of Finance, and U.S. Census. The section will discuss ways in which the proposed project could foster economic or population growth, or the construction of additional housing, either directly or indirectly, in the surrounding environment. The analysis will address growth-inducing impacts in terms of whether the project influences the rate, location, and the amount of growth. Growth-inducing impacts are assessed based on the project's consistency with adopted/proposed plans that have addressed growth management from a local and regional standpoint. Potential growth-inducing impacts from the proposed development will be analyzed as they relate to population, housing, and employment factors.

## 8.2.8 Alternatives to the Proposed Action

Pursuant to CEQA Guidelines Section 15126.6, Michael Baker will work with City staff to identify reasonable and feasible alternatives to the proposed project. The range of alternatives is expected to include up to three (3) alternatives, including the No Project Alternative and others that may have been considered through the project review/planning process.

The Alternatives analysis will compare environmental impacts of each alternative in each impact area to the project. For each alternative, Michael Baker will provide a qualitative analysis based upon available data. One important element of the Alternatives section will be an impact matrix which will offer a comparison of the varying levels of impact of each alternative being analyzed. This matrix will be prepared in a format to allow decision-makers a reference that will be easily understood, while providing a calculated (where feasible), accurate comparison of each alternative.

The Alternatives section will conform to both amendments to Section 15126.6 of the CEQA Guidelines and to recent and applicable court cases. The analysis will focus on alternatives that avoid or minimize environmental effects as compared to the proposed project while achieving the project's primary objectives. Therefore, the objectives contained in the project description must be crafted with care in consultation with the City. Michael Baker will discuss, as required by the CEQA Guidelines, the advantages and disadvantages of each alternative and the reasons for rejecting or recommending the project alternatives stated. This alternatives section will culminate with the identification of the Environmentally Superior Alternative in accordance with CEQA requirements.

## 8.2.9 Additional Sections

Michael Baker will provide additional sections in the Draft Program EIR to meet CEQA and City requirements including the following: Significant Irreversible Environmental Changes That Would Be Involved In the Proposed Action Should It Be Implemented, Effects Found Not To Be Significant, Significant and Unavoidable Adverse Impacts, Organizations/Persons Consulted, and Bibliography.

The Effects Found Not To Be Significant section will provide a brief analysis of those environmental topical areas determined to have no impact or a less than significant impact (e.g., Agriculture and Forestry Resources, Mineral Resources, Population and Housing, Public Services, Recreation, and Wildfire) and are not specifically addressed in the environmental analysis sections referenced above.



## 8.3 Screencheck Draft Program EIR

Michael Baker will respond to one compiled set of City comments on the Administrative Draft Program EIR. If desired by the City, Michael Baker will provide the Screencheck Draft Program EIR with all revisions made in track changes to assist in document review.

## 8.4 Public Review Draft Program EIR

Michael Baker will respond to a second review of the Screencheck Draft Program EIR and will prepare the report for the State-mandated 45-day public review period.

This task assumes the City will be responsible for preparation, distribution, and posting of the Notice of Availability (NOA) for the EIR.

## 8.5 Final Program EIR

## 8.5.1 Response to Comments

Michael Baker will respond to written comments received on the Draft Program EIR during the 45-day public review period. Michael Baker will prepare thorough, reasoned, and sensitive responses to relevant environmental issues. The Draft Responses to Comments will be prepared for review by City staff. Following review of the Draft Responses to Comments, Michael Baker will finalize this section for inclusion in the Administrative Final Program EIR.

It is noted that at this time the extent of public and agency comments that will result from the review process is unknown. Michael Baker has budgeted conservatively, given the potential scrutiny involved with the proposed project. Should the level of comments and response exceed our estimate, Michael Baker will submit additional funding requests to the City in order to complete the responses.

## 8.5.2 Mitigation Monitoring and Reporting Program

To comply with the Public Resources Code Section 21081.6 (AB 32180), Michael Baker will prepare a Mitigation Monitoring and Reporting Program (MMRP) to be defined through working with City staff to identify appropriate monitoring steps/procedures and in order to provide a basis for monitoring such measures during and upon project implementation.

The Mitigation Monitoring and Reporting Checklist will serve as the foundation of the Mitigation Monitoring and Reporting Program for the proposed project. The Checklist indicates the mitigation measure number as outlined in the Draft Program EIR, a list of Mitigation Measures (in chronological order under the appropriate topic), the Monitoring Milestone (at what agency/department responsible for verifying implementation of the measure), Method of Verification (documentation, field checks, etc.), and a verification section for the initials of the verifying individual date of verification, and pertinent remarks.

## 8.5.3 Final Program EIR

The Final EIR will consist of the Responses to Comments, Errata (revised Draft Program EIR text, as necessary), and MMRP. The Draft Program EIR will be revised in accordance with responses to public



comments, if needed. To facilitate City review, Michael Baker will format the Errata section with <u>double</u> <u>underlined</u> text for any new or modified text, and <u>strike out</u> for any deleted text.

This task assumes the City will be responsible for preparation and posting of the Notice of Determination (NOD) within five days of EIR certification.

## 8.5.4 Findings and Statement of Overriding Considerations

Michael Baker will provide administrative assistance to facilitate the CEQA process including the preparation of the Findings of Facts and Statement of Overriding Considerations (if required) for City use in the project review process. Michael Baker will prepare the Findings of Facts in accordance with the provisions of Section 15091 and 15093 of the State CEQA Guidelines and in a form specified by the City. Michael Baker will submit the Draft Findings of Facts for City review and will respond to one compiled set of City comments.

As noted above, this scope assumes the City would be responsible for all project notices, mailings, and postings, including any radius mailing and newspaper notices required for the project. This scope excludes any CEQA filing fees required for the project, such as the California Department of Fish and Wildlife (CDFW) Notice of Determination filing fee and Los Angeles County Clerk filing fee.

#### 8.6 Environmental Review Coordination

Mr. Alan Ashimine will be responsible for management and supervision of the Environmental Team. Mr. Ashimine will undertake consultation and coordination of the project and review the Program EIR for compliance with CEQA requirements and guidelines and City CEQA procedures. Mr. Ashimine will coordinate with City staff and/or other stakeholder representatives as well as internal technical staff, support staff, and word processing toward the timely completion of the EIR. It is the goal of Michael Baker to serve as an extension of City staff throughout the duration of the project.

## 8.7 Environmental Review Meetings/Hearings

Mr. Ashimine and members of the Michael Baker Team, as necessary, will participate in conference calls and/or meetings with City staff. For budgeting purposes, the following meetings are included and assumed to be virtual:

- One (1) CEQA Kick-off Meeting with City Staff (refer to Task 8.1.1);
- Up to four (4) CEQA progress meetings with City staff to provide progress reports, resolve issues, review comments on Administrative documents, and receive any necessary direction from City staff;
- Up to one (1) public scoping meeting (refer to Task 8.1.4); and
- Up to four (4) public hearings (i.e., two Planning Commission hearings and two City Council hearings).

## Senate Bill 743 Guidelines | County of San Diego, California

Michael Baker currently serves in an as-needed capacity for the County of San Diego on their Advanced Planning contract. As part of this contract, Michael Baker lead the task order that updated the County's Traffic Study Guidelines to incorporate both vehicles miles traveled (VMT) and Local Mobility Analysis (LMA). Over the period of two years, the project team led the County through detailed discussions that informed the overall process of developing the VMT guidelines. The guidelines are largely consistent with OPR's Technical Advisor (December 2018), however key decisions need to be made including the geographic boundaries for calculating VMT, screening criteria and thresholds of significance. The Michael Baker Team, along with our subconsultant Fehr & Peers, facilitated and presented at Project Working Group Meetings with multiple County departments to gain concurrence on these key decision points. In addition to the work on the CEQA portion of the guidelines, the team also updated the County's approach to operational analysis required in the LMA. The team executed an online engagement strategy to roll out the details of the guidelines to key stakeholders and community groups. Due to COVID-19 stay at home orders, the meetings were shifted from in-person meetings to virtual meetings. The guidelines were approved by the County Board of Supervisors in 2020.

# Transportation Demand Management / Shared-Reduced Parking Ordinance | County of San Diego, California

Michael Baker currently serves in an as-needed capacity for the County of San Diego on their Advanced Planning contract. As part of this contract, Michael Baker lead the task order to prepare two new ordinances required as part of the County's Climate Action Plan. The TDM Ordinance and the Shared-Reduced Parking Ordinance combined aim to reduce VMT by 15% countywide through integration of TDM measures and reduced parking strategies. Phase 1 of the project included a detailed peer agency review and documentation of best practices amongst similar agencies in Southern California, throughout California and nationally. The team used this information to then develop a framework document that outlined recommended TDM and reduced parking strategies that would be effective in different parts of the County based on land use type. Supplemental to the strategies was a recommended point system that align the strategies with VMT reduction goals. The County's CAP was recently sued and the County is now reconsidering TDM measure as part of the CAP as a result of the lawsuit. Michael Baker, as part of Phase 2 of this project is providing input to the CAP team and is working with the SB-743 team to reconsider the approach to TDM, parking and VMT mitigation measures. The project is anticipated to be completed in 2021.

## Civil and Traffic Engineering Service Contract | City of Del Mar, California

Michael Baker current serves as adjunct staff and staff support services for the City of Del Mar. In this capacity, we were responsible for developing guidelines for conducting VMT analysis and identifying mitigation measures in this largely developed City. With roughly 4,000 residents, a downtown commercial core, and several miles of beach front activity, City of Del Mar is largely walkable and accessible by bicycle. Due to limited employment opportunities however, the city holistically exceeded the regional VMT average for both residential and employment trips. Therefore, Michael Baker assisted the planning department in preparing the necessary evidence

to support no net change in VMT as the threshold of significance, as opposed to a 15% below the regional average. This allows the City to implement transportation demand management strategies that will successfully reduce VMT impacts to less than significant for smaller projects and will provide ample opportunity for more robust VMT mitigation for larger scale redevelopment projects. Michael Baker was responsible for presented in the recommendations to Planning Commission and City Council in June 2020. Our team continues to provide supportive services to the Planning Department on VMT related issues.

# Transportation Project Prioritization Study and Regional Arterial Cost Estimate Update | Coachella Valley Association of Governments (CVAG), California

Michael Baker provided services for the Transportation Project Prioritization Study (TPPS) and Regional Arterial Cost Estimates (RACE) 2010 updates, Active Transportation Plan (ATP), and Transportation Uniform Mitigation Fee (TUMF) Nexus Study. Michael Baker teamed with Fehr & Peers and with EPS in the preparation of documents for this project.

The client is the acting regional transportation agency for this portion of suburban/rural Western Riverside County, located in the Palm Desert, California. This project is a five-year periodic update, with the TPPS renewing the list of regional arterial projects identified to be studied within the Riverside County sub-region and nine incorporated cities, including Palm Springs and Coachella. The project includes a ranking system for evaluating the need for improvements and is useful as a monitoring program that will allow the client to address changing conditions of their arterial road system over time. New to this year's family of documents was the inclusion of the ATP. Michael Baker's team identified all of the potential projects through the entire study area, determined if they were considered regionally significant, and are positioned to include them in the TUMF calculations to act as a new potential funding source for these projects.

# State Route 14 (State Route 138)/Avenue G Interchange Improvement Project Initial Study/Mitigated Negative Declaration

Michael Baker International is currently assisting the City of Lancaster with prepration of an Initial Study/Mitigated Negative Declaration (IS/MND) with related technical studies for the State Route 14/Avenue G Interchange Improvement Project.

## **Avanti South Specific Plan EIR**

Lancaster, CA

Michael Baker prepared an EIR for the Avanti South Specific Plan Project. The Avanti South Specific Plan is a regulatory document and provides a means for implementing the General Plan 2030 for the site. The policies and regulations contained in the proposed Specific Plan would serve as the zoning for the property. The Specific Plan proposes a master-planned community and provides a development plan, including a land use plan, parks and open space plan, mobility plan, and infrastructure and public services plan, as well as development standards and design guidelines to guide future development of the property.

The Specific Plan proposes a mix of residential uses at varying densities, commercial, and open space/parks uses; a 12.8-acre school site and 1.3-acre fire station site are also proposed along with internal streets. The Land Use Plan organizes the project site into planning areas that are centered on common open spaces and trail amenities. The Specific Plan would allow a maximum of 1,700 residential units consisting of low density residential, medium density residential, to include two specialty neighborhoods for agetargeted and active adults and high density residential. Commercial uses would include retail, restaurant, and office uses. Commercial uses for the planning areas adjacent to the proposed active adult areas specifically allow for medical office, assisted living, convalescent care, and similar uses. The parks and open space plan proposes an interlinked system of parks connected by multipurpose trails with promenades and linear parks

The EIR reviewed the following topics: aesthetics, air quality, biological resources, cultural and tribal cultural resources, geology and soils, greenhouse gas emissions, hazards and hazardous materials, hydrology and water quality, land use and planning, noise, public services and utilities and transportation/traffic.

## Representative Project Examples

## **Orange Transportation System Improvement Program Fee Update**

Orange, California

The City of Orange engaged a consultant team led by EPS to prepare an update of the City's Transportation System Improvement Program (TSIP) development impact fees. The nexus study updated the TSIP fees and established the legally required nexus findings. The updated fees reflected several major changes to the TSIP. The original TSIP primarily funded projects improving roadway level of service, while the updated TSIP seeks to fund a broader range of project types, including multimodal transportation facilities and intelligent transportation systems. In addition, the fee update shifted the existing trip-based fee schedule to a vehicle-miles-traveled based schedule. Finally, the TSIP fees were modified from area-based fees to citywide fees, reflecting a more holistic approach to addressing the City's transportation needs. The Transportation Impact Fee Nexus Study quantifies the allocation of the proposed transportation improvements to new growth in the City and calculates the maximum allowable citywide fee by land use category. The nexus study was adopted by the Orange City Council in October 2020.

## **Sacramento Citywide Development Impact Fee Updates**

Sacramento, California

The City of Sacramento initiated an effort to conduct a comprehensive review of citywide fee programs, evaluating existing fee programs and determining the viability of establishing new fee programs. The City of Sacramento engaged EPS to provide overarching economic and development feasibility analysis and fee program policy guidance to inform the citywide development impact fee update process. As an outcome of this effort, the City of Sacramento established a fee program update strategy that included alternative public financing approaches for certain facilities and implementation of new, updated, and restructured fee programs in other circumstances.

In addition to overarching economic and policy analysis and guidance, EPS prepared the Development Impact Fee Report and Nexus Analysis for the proposed Capital Facilities Impact Fee Program inclusive of police, fire, library, government facilities, cultural facilities, solid waste facilities, and corporation yard facilities, as well as the City's Transportation Development Impact Fee Report and Nexus Study. The Transportation Development Impact Fee Report and Nexus Study ultimately was adopted by the City Council and included a VMT-based cost allocation methodology and consideration of reduced fee rates for Transit-Oriented Development.

Subject: Approval of the purchase of networking equipment for City Hall

## **Recommendation:**

Approve the purchase of Cisco networking equipment from Logicalis using National Association of State Procurement Officials (NASPO) ValuePoint Master Agreement #AR3227 for City Hall.

## **Fiscal Impact:**

\$341,595.65 as per the attached Logicalis quotation #2021-117451v4 to be paid from account 112-4315-302.

## **Background:**

The City of Lancaster operates an Internet Protocol (IP) network that allows for electronic data and voice communications between city sites and the wider world. City Hall is the core backbone of the larger City wide network that all electronic communications flows through as well as the location of the City's primary data center. As such it is vital to have supported, robust and secure networking equipment that is also modern allowing for fast network speeds.

This project will replace 8 HP 3800, 2 HP 5700 and 1 HP 2910 series switches in the master distribution frame (server room) as well as 3 HP 5412 series switches in the various intermediate distribution frames in City Hall and 1 HP 5412 at the Public Works Yard intermediate distribution frame.

The existing network equipment is seven years old and no longer supported by the vendor leaving the city unable to get support and critical updates and patches. Additionally, the existing network is not capable of delivering gigabit speeds to each city desktop which is becoming increasingly critical in order to deliver online resources such as video teleconferencing and cloud based applications. Finally, the existing network equipment cannot take advantage of the new CAT6a cabling being installed with the City Hall Remodel.

The new network equipment will allow for gigabit speeds to every city desktop as well as allow the City to fully utilized the new CAT6a cabling. To ensure extra reliability the new equipment will have redundant fiber links between the MDF and all IDFs in City Hall utilizing existing unused fiber. IT Staff designed the new equipment to have extra capacity for future growth and

flexibility. Cisco was selected as the new networking vendor due to the City's past positive experience with Cisco switches and routers as well as Cisco's competent and easily available support resources.

Information Technology staff leveraged the NASPO ValuePoint Master Agreement #AR3227 with Cisco Participating Addendum California #7-20-70-40-01 contract to achieve the best possible value for the City of Lancaster. NASPO Master Agreements are awarded by a lead state using a competitive procurement process. First, the lead state works with volunteers from other states to form a sourcing team. The sourcing team collaborates to develop the RFP and the evaluation of the proposals. The sourcing team then evaluates the responses to the solicitation and determine the best offers. Master Agreement #AR3227 allows for a 35% discount on hardware and 10% on services.

The City of Lancaster currently has a network running a 1Gbps backbone on outdated HP switches. The Data Center is also in need of a UPS refresh. Subject: General Municipal Election Date Reestablishment

#### **Recommendations:**

Introduce **Ordinance No. 1086**, an ordinance of the City Council of the City of Lancaster, California, reestablishing the second Tuesday in April of even-numbered years as the date of the City's General Municipal Election.

#### **Fiscal Impact:**

The cost of mailing change of election date postcards is projected to be approximately \$46,334.40; sufficient funds are available in account 101-4210262.

#### **Background:**

On September 26, 2017, the City adopted Ordinance No. 1033 which consolidated the City's general municipal elections with a statewide election in even-numbered years, beginning with the statewide direct primary election in February of 2022. Adoption of Ordinance No. 1033 satisfied the requirements of the California Voter Participation Rights Act (Cal. Elec. Code §§ 14050-14057) ("CVPRA"), which generally required that as of January 1, 2018, the City either (a) consolidate future general municipal elections with a statewide election or (b) adopt a plan to consolidate general municipal elections with a statewide election not later than the November 8, 2022, statewide general election.

However, since the requirement to consolidate was implemented, the *City of Redondo Beach v. Padilla*, 46 Cal. App. 5th 902, held that the CVPRA does not apply to charter cites. The City of Lancaster is a charter city in which would not be required to merge with statewide elections.

Adoption of this Ordinance pursuant to Section 102 of the City's Charter and other applicable law would allow the City of Lancaster to resume elections on the second Tuesday in April of even-numbered years.

Therefore, staff is requesting Council approve introduction of Ordinance No. 1086 reestablishing the City of Lancaster's election date to the second Tuesday in April of even-numbered years.

#### ORDINANCE NO. 1086

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF LANCASTER, CALIFORNIA, REESTABLISHING THE SECOND TUESDAY IN APRIL OF EVEN-NUMBERED YEARS AS THE DATE OF THE CITY'S GENERAL MUNICIPAL ELECTION

WHEREAS, the City of Lancaster ("City") previously held its general municipal elections on the second Tuesday in April of even-numbered years; and

WHEREAS, the California Voter Participation Rights Act (Cal. Elec. Code §§ 14050-14057) ("CVPRA"), generally required that as of January 1, 2018, the City either (a) consolidate future general municipal elections with a statewide election or (b) adopt a plan to consolidate general municipal elections with a statewide election not later than the November 8, 2022, statewide general election; and

WHEREAS, on July 11, 2017, the California Attorney General in opinion 16-603 opined that the CVPRA applies to charter cities; and

WHEREAS, on September 26, 2017, the City adopted Ordinance No. 1033 to satisfy the CVPRA by consolidating the City's general municipal elections with a statewide election in even-numbered years, beginning with the statewide direct primary election in February of 2022; and

WHEREAS, on March 23, 2020, the California Court of Appeal in *City of Redondo Beach v. Padilla*, 46 Cal. App. 5th 902, held that the CVPRA does not apply to charter cities; and

WHEREAS, as decisional law now clarifies that, as a charter city, the City is not subject to the CVPRA, the City now desires to repeal portions of Ordinance No. 1033 and reestablish the second Tuesday in April of even numbered years as the date of the City's general municipal election.

NOW, THEREFORE, THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF LANCASTER, CALIFORNIA, DOES HEREBY ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

- Section 1. Pursuant to Section 102 of the City's Charter and other applicable law, the City hereby reestablishes the second Tuesday in April of even-numbered years as the date of general municipal elections.
- Section 2. Sections 1, 2, 3, 4, 5 and 6 of Ordinance No. 1033 are hereby repealed and of no force or effect as of the effective date of this Ordinance. Section 7 of Ordinance No. 1033 is unchanged by this Ordinance and remains in full force and effect.
- Section 3. Pursuant to Section 102 of the City's Charter and Section 36503 of the California Elections Code, those City Council Members of the City of Lancaster whose terms of office expire in 2022 shall terminate their offices upon certification of the results and administration of the oaths of office after the City's general municipal election held in 2022.

## **Background:**

Statewide Community Infrastructure Program (SCIP); Authorizing the California Statewide Communities Development Authority (CSCDA) to Accept Applications from Property Owners of Developments (Participating Developers), Conduct Special Assessment Proceedings and Levy Assessments and Special Taxes and to Form Assessment Districts and Community Facilities Districts within the City of

Lancaster

#### **Recommendation:**

Adopt Resolution No. 21-46 to amend and restate Resolution No. 21-10 of the City Council of the City of Lancaster, authorizing the City to join the Statewide Community Infrastructure Program; authorizing the California Statewide Communities Development Authority to accept applications from property owners of developments, conduct special assessment proceedings and levy assessments and special taxes, and to form Assessment Districts and Community Facilities Districts within the territory of the City of Lancaster; embodying a joint community facilities agreement setting forth the terms and conditions of community facilities district financings; and authorizing related actions.

#### **Fiscal Impact:**

No expenditure of City funds is expected. Bonds will be sold to reimburse Participating Developers for impact fees and to reimburse the City for the administrative costs of this program. The future homeowners will pay the bond debt service through a Mello-Roos special tax levied on their tax bills.

#### **Background:**

Through Resolution No. 21-10 (adopted February 23, 2021), the City joined the CSCDA, which is a joint powers authority sponsored by the League of California Cities and the California State Association of Counties. The CSCDA members include 530 cities, counties, and special districts throughout California.

Resolution No. 21-10 allowed Participating Developers to finance development impact fees through pooled Statewide Community Infrastructure Program (SCIP) special assessment districts programs. SCIP has been expanded to include Community Facilities Districts ("CFDs"), as provided for in this proposed Amended and Restated Resolution.

By adding CFDs, Participating Developers can finance a broader range of fees including school fees, and allow the Participating Developers more flexibility in adjusting tax rates by specific product type, assist in forming separate improvement areas when projects need to be phased, and provide for more facilities to be financed similar in type to the fees. Costs as low as \$500,000.00 can be financed.

If a developer chooses to participate, City development impact fees owed to the City and other agencies, along with other agency public improvements, may be financed by the issuance of tax-exempt bonds through CSCDA. CSCDA will form the district and impose an assessment or special tax, as applicable, on the development's parcels to repay the bonds. The City is never at risk for payment of its fees.

Benefits to the Participating Developers include:

- Only developers who choose to participate in the program will have assessments or special taxes imposed on their property; and
- Instead of paying cash for development impact fees, the fees may be financed, freeing up capital for other purposes.

The benefits to the City include:

- CSCDA handles all district formation, district administration, bond issuance and bond administration functions. Reimbursement for any City staff time may be included in the Mello-Roos bonds; and
- Providing tax-exempt financing, helps cushion the impact of rising public capital
  improvements costs and development impact fees on new development. Many developers
  rely on assessment district or CFD financing through SCIP in making the decision to
  purchase land, thereby improving a City's competitive advantage in attracting new
  development.

#### RESOLUTION NO.

AMENDED AND RESTATED RESOLUTION OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF LANCASTER AUTHORIZING THE CITY TO JOIN THE STATEWIDE COMMUNITY **INFRASTRUCTURE** PROGRAM; **AUTHORIZING** CALIFORNIA STATEWIDE COMMUNITIES DEVELOPMENT AUTHORITY TO ACCEPT APPLICATIONS FROM PROPERTY OWNERS. CONDUCT **SPECIAL ASSESSMENT** PROCEEDINGS AND LEVY ASSESSMENTS AND SPECIAL TAXES AND TO FORM ASSESSMENT DISTRICTS AND COMMUNITY FACILITIES DISTRICTS WITHIN TERRITORY OF THE CITY OF LANCASTER; EMBODYING A JOINT COMMUNITY FACILITIES AGREEMENT SETTING FORTH THE TERMS AND CONDITIONS OF COMMUNITY FACILITIES DISTRICT FINANCINGS; AND AUTHORIZING **RELATED ACTIONS** 

WHEREAS, the California Statewide Communities Development Authority (the "Authority") is a joint exercise of powers authority, lawfully formed and operating within the State pursuant to an agreement (the "Joint Powers Agreement") entered into as of June 1, 1988, under the authority of Title 1, Division 7, Chapter 5 (commencing with Section 6500) of the California Government Code (the "JPA Law"), the members of which include numerous cities, counties and local agencies in the State of California, including the City of Lancaster (the "City"); and

WHEREAS, the Joint Powers Agreement authorizes the Authority to undertake financing programs under any applicable provisions of State law to promote economic development, the stimulation of economic activity, and the increase of the tax base within the jurisdictional boundaries of its members (such members, the "Program Participants"); and

WHEREAS, as one of the Programs under the Joint Powers Agreement, the Authority has established the Statewide Community Infrastructure Program ("SCIP") to allow the financing of certain public capital improvements to be constructed by or on behalf of property owners for acquisition by a public agency (the "Improvements") and improvements eligible for funding from certain development impact fees (the "Fees") levied in accordance with the Mitigation Fee Act (California Government Code Sections 66000 and following) and other authority providing for the levy of fees on new development to pay for public capital improvements (collectively, the "Fee Act") through the levy of special assessments pursuant to the Municipal Improvement Act of 1913 (Streets and Highways Code Sections 10000 and following) (the "1913 Act"), and the issuance of improvement bonds (the "Local Obligations") under the Improvement Bond Act of 1915 (Streets and Highways Code Sections 8500 and following) (the "1915 Act"), upon the security of the unpaid special assessments; and

WHEREAS, the "Mello-Roos Community Facilities Act of 1982," being Chapter 2.5, Part 1, Division 2, Title 5 (beginning with Section 53311) of the Government Code of the State (the "Mello-Roos Act") is an applicable provision of State law available to, among other things, finance public improvements necessary to meet increased demands placed upon local agencies as a result of development; and

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WHEREAS, the Authority also uses SCIP to allow the financing of Fees and Improvements through the levy of special taxes and the issuance of Local Obligations under the Mello-Roos Act upon the security of the special taxes; and

WHEREAS, the City desires to allow the owners of property being developed within its jurisdiction ("Participating Developers") to participate in SCIP and to allow the Authority to conduct proceedings and to form Community Facilities Districts ("CFDs") and to issue Local Obligations under the Mello-Roos Act, as well as to conduct assessment proceedings to form assessment districts ("Assessment Districts") under the 1913 Act and to issue Local Obligations under the 1915 Act, to finance Fees levied on such properties, provided that such Participating Developers voluntarily agree to participate and consent to the levy of such assessments or special taxes, as applicable; and

WHEREAS, from time to time when eligible property owners within the jurisdiction of the City elect to be Participating Developers, the Authority will conduct proceedings under the 1913 Act and the Mello-Roos Act and issue Local Obligations under the 1915 Act and the Mello-Roos Act to finance Fees payable by such property owners and, at the conclusion of such proceedings, will levy assessments or special taxes, as applicable on such property within the territory of the City; and

WHEREAS, both the Authority and the City are "local agencies" under the Mello-Roos Act; and

WHEREAS, the Mello-Roos Act permits two (2) or more local agencies to enter into a joint community facilities agreement to exercise any power authorized by the Mello-Roos Act; and

WHEREAS, the City desires to enter into such an agreement with the Authority to authorize the Authority to form CFDs from time to time within the territorial limits of the City to finance Fees payable by such property owners; and

WHEREAS, the City has previously presented Resolution No. 21-10 of the City Council of the City of Lancaster, authorizing the City to join the Statewide Community Infrastructure Program; authorizing the California Statewide Communities Development Authority to accept applications from Participating Developers, conduct special assessment proceedings and levy assessments within the territory of the City of Lancaster; approving a form of acquisition agreement; and authorizing related actions (the "Original Resolution"), and such Original Resolution was adopted on February 23, 2021; and

WHEREAS, the City now wishes to amend and restate the Original Resolution; and

WHEREAS, there has been presented to this meeting a proposed form of Resolution of Intention to be adopted by the Authority in connection with assessment proceedings (the "ROI"), a copy of which is attached hereto as Exhibit "A", and the territory within which assessments may be levied for SCIP (provided that each Participating Developer consents to such assessment) shall be coterminous with the City's official boundaries of record at the time of adoption of such ROI (the "Proposed Boundaries"), and reference is hereby made to such boundaries for the plat or map required to be included in this Amended and Restated Resolution pursuant to Section 10104 of the Streets and Highways Code; and

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WHEREAS, the City will not be responsible for the conduct of any proceedings; the levy or collection of assessments or special taxes or any required remedial action in the case of delinquencies in such assessment or special tax payments; or the issuance, sale or administration of the Local Obligations or any other bonds issued in connection with SCIP; and

WHEREAS, the Authority may issue revenue bonds pursuant to the Marks-Roos Local Bond Pooling Act of 1985 (the "Marks-Roos Act"), to acquire Local Obligations and thereby provide the proceeds to finance the Fees and Improvements; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to Government Code Section 6586.5, notice was published at least five (5) days prior to the adoption of this Amended and Restated Resolution at a public hearing, which was duly conducted by this City Council concerning the significant public benefits of SCIP and the financing of the Improvements including Improvements to be paid for with the proceeds of the Fees.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF LANCASTER AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. This Amended and Restated Resolution shall constitute full "local approval," under Section 9 of the Joint Powers Agreement, and under the Authority's Local Goals and Policies (defined below), for the Authority to undertake and conduct proceedings in accordance herewith and under the Mello Roos Act to form CFDs with boundaries that shall be coterminous with the City's official boundaries of record at the time of such proceedings or any portion thereof (the "Proposed Boundaries"), and to authorize a special tax and to issue bonds with respect thereto; provided that the Participating Developers, who shall be the legal owners of such property at the time of formation of the CFD, execute a written consent to the levy of special tax in connection with SCIP by the Authority and execute a ballot in favor of the formation of such CFD and the Mello-Roos Act.

- Section 2. The City hereby consents to the conduct of special assessment proceedings by the Authority in connection with SCIP pursuant to the 1913 Act and the issuance of Local Obligations under the 1915 Act on any property within the Proposed Boundaries; provided, that:
  - (1) Such proceedings are conducted pursuant to one (1) or more Resolutions of Intention in substantially the form of the ROI; and
  - (2) The Participating Developers, who shall be the legal owners of such property at the time of the formation of the Assessment District, execute a written consent to the levy of assessments in connection with SCIP by the Authority and execute an assessment ballot in favor of such assessment in compliance with the requirements of Section 4 of Article XIIID of the State Constitution.

Section 3. The Joint Powers Agreement, together with the terms and provisions of this Amended and Restated Resolution, shall together constitute a separate joint community facilities agreement between the City and the Authority under the Mello-Roos Act for each CFD formed. As, without this Amended and Restated Resolution, the Authority has no power to finance City Fees (as defined herein) in proceedings under the Mello-Roos Act to form the CFD, adoption by the Commission of the Authority of each Resolution of Intention to form a CFD under the Mello-

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Roos Act to finance City Fees shall constitute acceptance of the terms hereof by the Authority with respect to such CFD.

- Section 4. This Amended and Restated Resolution and the agreement it embodies are determined to be beneficial to the residents/customers of the City and are in the best interests of the residents of the City, and of the future residents of the area within the proposed CFDs and Assessment Districts. The City hereby finds and declares that the issuance of revenue bonds by the Authority to purchase Local Obligations in connection with SCIP will provide significant public benefits, including without limitation, savings in effective interest rate, bond preparation, bond underwriting and bond issuance costs, and the more efficient delivery of local agency services to residential and commercial development within the City.
- Section 5. The Authority has adopted Local Goals and Policies as required by Section 53312.7 of the Mello-Roos Act. The City approves the use of those Local Goals and Policies in connection with the formation of CFDs. The City hereby agrees that the Authority may act in lieu of the City under those Local Goals and Policies in forming and administering the CFDs.
- Section 6. The Authority has prepared and will update from time to time the "SCIP Manual of Procedures" (the "Manual"), and the City will handle any applicable fee revenues and funds for Improvements for properties participating in SCIP in accordance with the procedures set forth in the Manual.
- Section 7. Pursuant to the Mello-Roos Act and this Amended and Restated Resolution, the Authority may conduct proceedings under the Mello-Roos Act to form the CFDs and to have such CFDs authorize the financing of any or all of the facilities and Fees set forth on Exhibit "C", attached hereto. All of the facilities, whether to be financed directly or through Fees, shall be facilities that have an expected useful life of five years or longer and are facilities that the City or other local public agencies, as the case may be, are authorized by law to construct, own or operate, or to which they may contribute revenue. Exhibit "C" may be modified from time to time by written agreement between an authorized representative of the Authority and of the City. The facilities are referred to herein as the "Improvements," and the Improvements to be owned by the City are referred to as the "City Improvements." The Fees paid or to be paid to the City are referred to as the "City Fees."
- Section 8. For Fees paid or to be paid to another agency by any particular CFD (an "Other Local Agency"), the Authority will obtain the written consent of that Other Local Agency before issuing Local Obligations to fund such Fees, as required by the Mello-Roos Act. For the Improvements to be owned by an Other Local Agency, the Authority will separately identify them in its proceedings, and will enter into a joint community facilities agreement with such Other Local Agency prior to issuing Local Obligations to finance such Improvements, as required by the Mello-Roos Act. Each joint community facilities agreement with each Other Local Agency will contain a provision that the Other Local Agency will provide indemnification to the City to the same extent that the City provides indemnification to the Other Local Agency under the terms of this Amended and Restated Resolution.
- Section 9. At the time of formation of each CFD, the City will certify to the Commission of the Authority that all of the City Improvements to be constructed or acquired with the proceeds of City Fees to be funded by such CFD are necessary to meet increased demands

placed upon the City as a result of development occurring or expected to occur within the proposed CFDs in the form attached hereto as Exhibit "D". Any appropriate officer or staff of the City is authorized to execute and deliver such certificate in substantially the form attached hereto as Exhibit "D", with such changes as such signatory shall approve. Joint community facilities agreements with other local agencies will each contain a requirement that each Other Local Agency will make identical certification in connection with respect to the Improvements to be owned by, and Fees paid or to be paid to, such Other Local Agency equivalent to that made by the City in this paragraph.

Section 10. The Authority will apply the special tax collections initially as required by the documents under which any Local Obligations are issued; and thereafter, to the extent not provided in the Local Obligations documents, may pay its own reasonable administrative costs incurred in the administration of the CFDs. The Authority will remit any special tax revenues from any particular CFD remaining after the final retirement of all related Local Obligations to the City and to the other local agencies in the proportions specified in the Authority's proceedings. The City will apply any such special tax revenues it receives for authorized City Fees and its own administrative costs only as permitted by the Mello-Roos Act. The joint community facilities agreements with each Other Local Agency must require the Other Local Agency to apply the special tax revenues they receive for their authorized Improvements and Fees under the CFDs and for their own related administrative costs only as permitted by the Mello-Roos Act.

Section 11. The Authority will administer the CFDs, including employing and paying all consultants, annually levying the special tax and all aspects of paying and administering the Local Obligations, and complying with all State and Federal requirements appertaining to the proceedings, including the requirements of the United States Internal Revenue Code. The City will cooperate fully with the Authority in respect of the requirements of the Internal Revenue Code and to the extent information is required of the City to enable the Authority to perform its disclosure and continuing disclosure obligations with respect to the Local Obligations and any revenue bonds, although the City will not participate in nor be considered to be a participant in the proceedings respecting the CFDs (other than as a party to the agreement embodied by this Amended and Restated Resolution) nor will the City be or be considered to be an issuer of the Local Obligations nor any revenue bonds. The Authority is required to obtain a provision equivalent to this paragraph in all joint community facilities agreements with each Other Local Agency.

Section 12. In the event the Authority completes issuance and sale of Local Obligations, and Local Obligation proceeds become available to finance the Improvements, the Authority shall establish and maintain a special fund for each development project (the "Acquisition and Construction Fund"). The portion of Local Obligation proceeds which is intended to be utilized to finance the Improvements and Fees shall be deposited in the Acquisition and Construction Fund. The Acquisition and Construction Fund will be available both for City Improvements eligible for construction from City Fees and for the Improvements and Fees pertaining to each Other Local Agency. Subaccounts shall be created as necessary.

Section 13. As respects the Authority and each Other Local Agency, the City agrees to fully administer, and to take full governmental responsibility for, the construction of the City Improvements eligible for funding from City Fees and for the administration and expenditure of the City Fees including but not limited to environmental review, approval of plans and

specifications, bid requirements, performance and payment bond requirements, insurance requirements, contract and construction administration, staking, inspection, acquisition of necessary property interests in real or personal property, the holding back and administration of retention payments, punch list administration, and the Authority and each Other Local Agency shall have no responsibility in that regard. The Authority is required to obtain provisions equivalent to this paragraph in the joint community facilities agreement with each Other Local Agency.

Section 14. The City agrees to indemnify and to hold the Authority, its other members, and its other members' officers, agents and employees, and each Other Local Agency and their officers, agents and employees (collectively, the "Indemnified Parties") harmless from any and all claims, suits and damages (including costs and reasonable attorneys' fees) arising out of the design, engineering, construction and installation of the City Improvements eligible for funding from City Fees. The Authority is required to obtain a provision equivalent to this paragraph in all joint community facilities agreements with each Other Local Agency naming the City and its officers, agents and employees as Indemnified Parties with respect to each Other Local Agency's respective Improvements and the improvements to be constructed or acquired with each Other Local Agency's Fees.

Section 15. As respects the Authority and each Other Local Agency, the City agrees to take maintenance responsibility for the City Improvements eligible for funding from City Fees, and to indemnify and hold harmless the Indemnified Parties to the extent provided in the preceding paragraph from any and all claims, etc., arising out of the use and maintenance of the City Improvements. The Authority is required to obtain a provision equivalent to this paragraph in all joint community facilities agreements with each Other Local Agency naming the City and its officers, agents and employees as Indemnified Parties.

Section 16. The City acknowledges the requirement of the Mello-Roos Act that if the City Improvements are not completed prior to the adoption by the Commission of the Authority of the Resolution of Formation of the CFD for each respective development project, the City Improvements must be constructed as if they had been constructed under the direction and supervision, or under the authority of, the City. The City acknowledges that this means all City Improvements must be constructed under contracts that require the payment of prevailing wages as required by Section 1720 and following of the Labor Code of the State of California. The Authority makes no representation that this requirement is the only applicable legal requirement in this regard.

Section 17. [RESERVED].

Section 18. [RESERVED].

Section 19. The City hereby consents to the formation of the CFDs in accordance with this Amended and Restated Resolution and consents to the assumption of jurisdiction by the Authority for the proceedings respecting the CFDs with the understanding that the Authority will hereafter take each and every step required for or suitable for consummation of the proceedings, the levy, collection and enforcement of the special tax, and the issuance, sale, delivery and administration of the Local Obligations, all at no cost to the City and without binding or obligating the City's general fund or taxing authority.

- Section 20. The terms of the Agreement embodied by this Amended and Restated Resolution may be amended by a writing duly authorized, executed and delivered by the City and the Authority, except that no amendment may be made after the issuance of the Local Obligations by the Authority that would be detrimental to the interests of the bondholders without complying with all of the bondholder consent provisions for the amendment of the bond resolutions, bond indentures or like instruments governing the issuance, delivery and administration of all outstanding Local Obligations.
- Section 21. Except to the extent of the indemnifications extended to each Other Local Agency in the Agreement embodied by this Amended and Restated Resolution, and the City's agreement to take responsibility for and ownership of the City Improvements, no person or entity, including the Participating Developer, shall be deemed to be a third party beneficiary of this Amended and Restated Resolution, and nothing in this Amended and Restated Resolution (either express or implied) is intended to confer upon any person or entity other than the Authority and the City (and their respective successors and assigns) any rights, remedies, obligations or liabilities under or by reason of this Amended and Restated Resolution.
- Section 22. The City shall be identified as a third-party beneficiary of all joint community facilities agreements between the Authority and each Other Local Agency to the extent of the indemnification provisions and the provisions whereby each Other Local Agency agrees to take responsibility for and ownership of their Improvements.
- Section 23. The appropriate officials and staff of the City are hereby authorized and directed to make SCIP applications available to all property owners who are subject to Fees for new development within the City and/or who are conditioned to install Improvements and to inform such owners of their option to participate in SCIP; provided, that the Authority shall be responsible for providing such applications and related materials at its own expense. The staff persons listed on the attached Exhibit "E", together with any other staff persons chosen by the City Manager from time to time, are hereby designated as the contact persons for the Authority in connection with SCIP.
- Section 24. The appropriate officials and staff of the City are hereby authorized and directed to execute and deliver such closing certificates, requisitions, agreements and related documents, including but not limited to such documents as may be required by bond counsel in connection with the participation in SCIP of any districts, authorities or other third-party entities entitled to own Improvements and/or to levy and collect fees on new development to pay for public capital improvements within the jurisdiction of the City, as are reasonably required by the Authority in accordance with the Manual to implement SCIP and to evidence compliance with the requirements of federal and state law in connection with the issuance by the Authority of the Local Obligations and any other bonds for SCIP. To that end, and pursuant to Treasury Regulations Section 1.150-2, the staff persons listed on Exhibit "E", or other staff person acting in the same capacity for the City with respect to SCIP, are hereby authorized and designated to declare the official intent of the City with respect to the public capital improvements to be paid or reimbursed through participation in SCIP.
- Section 25. This Amended and Restated Resolution shall take effect immediately upon its adoption. The City Clerk of the City of Lancaster is hereby authorized and directed to transmit a certified copy of this Amended and Restated Resolution to the Secretary of the Authority. This

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Amended and Restated Resolution shall remain in force with respect to any Assessment District and CFD formed until all Local Obligations have been retired and the authority to levy the special tax conferred by any CFD proceedings and to levy the assessment conferred by any assessment proceedings has ended or is otherwise terminated. The Original Resolution shall remain in force with respect to any Assessment District formed pursuant to its authority until all Local Obligations have been retired and the authority to levy the assessment conferred by any assessment proceedings carried out pursuant to the Original Resolution has ended or is otherwise terminated.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED THAT THE COMMISSION OF THE CALIFORNIA STATEWIDE COMMUNITIES DEVELOPMENT AUTHORITY HEREBY FINDS, DETERMINES AND RESOLVES AS FOLLOWS:

- Section 1. The above recitals are true and correct.
- Section 1. Pursuant to Section 2961 of the Special Assessment Investigation, Limitation and Majority Protest Act of 1931 (the "1931 Act"), being Division 4 (commencing with Section 2800) of the Code, the Commission hereby declares its intent to comply with the requirements of the 1931 Act by complying with Part 7.5 thereof.
- Section 2. The Commission has designated a registered, professional engineer as Engineer of Work for this project, and hereby directs said firm to prepare the report containing the matters required by Sections 2961(b) and 10204 of the Code, as supplemented by Section 4 of Article XIIID of the California Constitution.
- Section 3. The proposed boundary map of the Assessment District is hereby approved and adopted. Pursuant to Section 3111 of the Code, the Secretary of the Authority is directed to file a copy of the map in the office of the County Recorder of the [County of \_\_\_\_\_] within fifteen (15) days of the adoption of this resolution.
- Section 4. The Commission determines that the cost of financing the Improvements and/or the payment of the Improvement Fees shall be specially assessed against the lots, pieces or parcels of land within the Assessment District benefiting from the financing of the Improvements and/or the payment of the Improvement Fees. The Commission intends to levy a special assessment upon such lots, pieces or parcels in accordance with the special benefit to be received by each such lot, piece or parcel of land, respectively, from the financing of the Improvements and/or the payment of the Improvement Fees.
- Section 5. The Commission intends, pursuant to subparagraph (f) of Section 10204 of the Code, to provide for an annual assessment upon each of the parcels of land in the proposed Assessment District to pay various costs and expenses incurred from time to time by the Authority and not otherwise reimbursed to the Authority which result from the administration and collection of assessment installments or from the administration or registration of the improvement bonds and the various funds and accounts pertaining thereto.
- Section 6. Bonds representing unpaid assessments, and bearing interest at a rate not to exceed twelve percent (12%) per annum, will be issued in the manner provided by the Improvement Bond Act of 1915 (Division 10 of the Code), and the last installment of the bonds shall mature not to exceed twenty-nine (29) years from the second day of September next succeeding twelve (12) months from their date.
- Section 7. The procedure for the collection of assessments and advance retirement of bonds under the Improvement Bond Act of 1915 shall be as provided in Part 11.1 thereof.

- Section 8. Neither the Authority nor any member agency thereof will obligate itself to advance available funds from its or their own funds or otherwise to cure any deficiency which may occur in the bond redemption fund. A determination not to obligate itself shall not prevent the Authority or any such member agency from, in its sole discretion, so advancing funds.
- Section 9. The amount of any surplus remaining in the improvement fund after acquisition of the Improvements and/or payment of Improvement Fees and all other claims shall be distributed in accordance with the provisions of Section 10427.1 of the Code.
- Section 10. To the extent any Improvement Fees are paid to the Authority in cash with respect to property within the proposed Assessment District prior to the date of issuance of the bonds, the amounts so paid shall be reimbursed from the proceeds of the bonds to the property owner or developer that made the payment.

District No. 14 of the County Sanitation Districts of Los Angeles County is organized to receive, through their trunk sewers, the wastewater from all of the City of Lancaster, a small region of the westerly portion of the City of Palmdale, and a smaller region of the unincorporated County of Los Angeles. A Board of Directors, comprised of one representative from each City and the County, generally meets monthly to review and decide upon the business of the District.

The following is a summary of the items discussed during the Special Board of Director's Meeting of the Los Angeles County Sanitation District No. 14 held on July 28, 2021.

  - 1. Execution and Delivery by District of *Installment Purchase Agreement* and *Bond Purchase Agreement in Connection with Issuance of Bonds*
  - 2. Distribution of Preliminary Official Statement and Official Statement in Connection Therewith
  - 3. Execution of Necessary Documents and Certificates and Related Actions
- b) Approved Use of Standard and Poor's Financial Services LLC, at Cost of Approximately \$34,250.00 and Fitch Ratings, Inc.at Cost of Approximately \$32,000.00 as Bond Rating Agencies

Summary: Between 2007 and 2012, the District made a number of upgrades to its facilities, including construction of the Lancaster Water Reclamation Plant Expansion, construction of the Rosamond Outfall Trunk Sewer, and replacement of a section of the Trunk F Sewer. Four State Clean Water Revolving Fund low-interest loans obtained during that period were used to partially fund the work. Now, because interest rates have dropped to near-historic low levels, savings can be realized by refinancing the loan principal still outstanding. The proposed Resolution, as attached, includes approval of the necessary documents, direction to staff to distribute the documents, and authority for the Financing Authority (comprised of all the active Districts and governed by a Commission made up of those Districts' chairpersons) to sell new revenue bonds on the District's behalf. Under the proposed action, the District would approve the issuance of approximately \$45 million of refinancing bonds resulting in an estimated net present value savings of \$4 million. The necessary extensive documents to be considered for the sale of the bonds are available at http://www.lacsd.org/d14bonds. A letter discussing this issue accompanies the agenda. This item is consistent with the Districts Guiding Principles of commitment to fiscal responsibility, and prudent financial stewardship, and to protect financial assets through prudent investment programs.

Summary: In order to fund obligations to District No. 14 associated with its Pacific Palacio development, the Developer has proposed establishing a Community Facilities District (CFD) through the Authority pursuant to the Mello-Roos Community Facilities Act of 1982. In accordance with the Mello-Roos Act, the Authority is the sponsoring agency for the CFD. The District must be party to the Agreement since it would be the ultimate recipient of the bond proceeds. The District would have no obligations for issuing any CFD bonds or for repaying any bonds that might be issued. The proposed Resolution, copy attached, would authorize the Chief Engineer and General Manager to execute the Agreement. This item is consistent with the Districts' Guiding Principle of commitment to fiscal responsibility and prudent financial stewardship.
