



- Identifies 200 Collision Concentration Corridors in which three or more fatal or severe injury collisions occurred within a half-mile road segment, in a 5-year period during 2013-17.
- Identifies Top 20 Corridors based on a formula that considers collision severity, vulnerable users (bicycles/pedestrians), and underserved communities:
 - First Supervisorial District = 2 corridors
 - Second Supervisorial District 2 = 15 corridors
 - Third Supervisorial District = none
 - Fourth Supervisorial District = 1 corridor
 - Fifth Supervisorial District = 2 corridors
- Identifies over 60 actions focused on road safety, including:
 - o Implement traffic safety infrastructure and programs.
 - Update and evaluate traffic safety infrastructure guidelines.
 - o Increase community engagement for traffic safety programs and projects.
 - Enact policy changes (e.g., State legislative efforts related to speed limits).
 - o Improve coordination with law enforcement partners to focus enforcement efforts.





Figure 1. Q3 Comparison of Systemwide Strikes by Type



The HDC should continue to educate and advocate for transportation infrastructure investments from all government and private sector sources to deliver critical mobility options to reverse the decades-long transportation equity gap created in the high desert communities of Los Angeles and San Bernardino Counties.

Toward that end, the Authority has taken major steps advancing the SR18/SR138 Highway Alternative and Rail Component projects.

HDC Highway Alternative (SR18/SR138) Update

High Desert Corridor

Original Project

- 63 miles Highway, Expressway, Tollway, High Speed Rail, Bikeway, and energy production/transmission corridor concepts
- Connecting North Los Angeles County and San Bernardino County (Victorville)
- Transit connection between the CHSR and the XpressWest
- In Measure M for ROW and related services in 2019
- Final EIR/EIS completed in 2016
- No Funding

Alternatives being Considered

- Alternative highway alignment being studied on SR-138 and SR-18 to accommodate continuous 4 lane connection
- PSR started in 2021
- PSR completion Fall 2022

Gabriel Reyes Mayor, City of Adelanto Metro, SBCTA, Caltrans Districts 7/8 focused on widening SR18/SR138 as a continuous 4-lane highway between the Antelope and Victory Valleys (Victorville/Palmdale) connecting high desert communities in San Bernardino and Los Angeles Counties. SBCTA allocated Measure I funds and Metro allocated Measure M HDC funds for the focused PSR-PDS project development documents with Metro as the lead agency. Study started in June 2021 and is scheduled to conclude Fall 2022.

HDC Rail Component Status Update

April 2021, HDC submits the Reevaluation petition to the Federal Railroad Administration (FRA) and Surface Transportation Board (STB) with positive meetings. HDC' objective is to receive the Rail Project Record of Decision (ROD/NOD), Notice of Determination approval in 2022. This will complete clearance for the high-speed rail project component and put the HDC Rail Project in position to advance to the next phase, Preliminary Engineering.

The HDC Rail Project includes changes from the design evaluated in the HDC EIR/EIS document. These changes are necessary to connect to the currently planned California HSR station in the City of Palmdale and to the redesigned Brightline West station in the Town of Apple Valley. The April 2021 Reevaluation will be used by FRA to determine if the prior results set forth in the 2016 HDC EIR/EIS remain valid. HDC staff and consultant team met with FRA in June, August, and September and the HDC Consultant Team has had numerous meetings with the various FRA staff to discuss the Reevaluation.

September 2021, FRA verbally agrees to be Lead NEPA Agency beginning the process to send appropriate notification to agencies to continue the environmental review process. An initial meeting with FRA, the San Manuel Band of Mission Indians, and HDC Staff and Consultant Team occurred on October 12, 2021. We are awaiting the FRA to formally declare they will be NEPA Lead and to begin the formal consultation process.

September 2021, Metro pays the Surface Transportation Board HDC Petition fee to allow the JPA to formally submit the petition with Verified Statement submitted by Executive Director Arthur Sohikian.

December 9, 2021, STB issues an order instituting an exemption proceeding in response to the JPA's petition. STB accepted comments on the Petition for Exemption through January 10, 2022, and responses to those comments through February 8, 2022. The National Rail Passengers Association wrote a support letter for the exemption. The STB is statutorily required to issue a decision within 9 months of instituting a proceeding.

Metro Board HDC Intercity Rail Service Development Plan & Funding Plan including \$3 million of HDC Measure M funds, \$1.375 million in CalSTA 2018 Transit Intercity Rail Capital Plan State grant under the Network Integration category, and \$625K from Brightline West (\$250K in cash and \$375K of in-kind contributions) continues.

The 3rd Stakeholder Meeting occurred on December 14, 2021, with a turnout of over 70 participants from Los Angeles and San Bernardino Counties, Metro, SBCTA, Caltrans, CalSTA, Metrolink, CA High Speed Rail Authority, AVTA, CPUC, UPRR, Victorville Airport, Cities of Palmdale, Lancaster, Adelanto, Victorville, Town of Apple Valley and Brightline West.

The Final Draft of the Development and Funding Plans are scheduled for release in Spring 2022.





High Speed Rail Operations Travel Time Modeling




Ridership

There are approximately 56 million annual trips by air and auto that travel between Las Vegas and Southern California. The current demand for HSR travel between Southern California and Las Vegas is estimated at 27.5 million round trips, most of whom currently drive to/from Las Vegas along the I-15, I-10 and SR-138. This is composed of 22.6 million annual round trips by auto, 3.1 million annual round trips by air and 1.8 million annual round trips by bus.

The estimated ridership on the High Desert HSR Corridor with initial service is estimated to start at **3.1 million riders per year**, growing to **14 million riders per year** by 2050 with the full service.

Based on the estimated trips captured by HSR service, the reduction in VMT is estimated to start at **371 million vehicles miles per year** and grow to over **1.4 billion vehicle miles per year** from California and Nevada freeways and highways in the region by 2050.


Economic Impact/Equity

Approximately 90 percent of High Desert Intercity HSR corridor between Palmdale and the Victor Valley is rural and the Cities of Adelanto and Victorville are designated as high poverty areas by the California Governor's Office of Business and Economic Development.

The entire area of the Project falls within the low-income communities and households as defined by AB 1550, with a significant portion also falling within the disadvantaged and low- income communities as defined by SB 535.

There are fifteen qualified opportunity zones in the area of the High Desert Intercity HSR Corridor— nine qualified opportunity zones in San Bernardino County and six in Los Angeles County.

Figure 5: Urbanized Areas and Qualified Opportunity Zones




Economic Impact/Equity

The High Desert Intercity HSR Corridor
Project will stimulate economic development
in one of the fastest growing areas in
California. The growing population of the
High Desert has major implications for
transit usage and greenhouse gas emissions.
Populations in both the Victor and Antelope
Valleys spend significant time commuting to
employment centers outside of the High
Desert region.

As these regions which have been underserved by transportation options and are heavily reliant on single-person automobile traffic continue to grow, it will be essential to provide a new HSR service. With the addition of the new HSR service, many of these communities will be incentivized to eliminate long drives into Los Angeles and other urban centers and capitalize on growing economic opportunities in the High Desert region. The connectivity of Metrolink and a high-speed rail service will ultimately provide reduced commute times for those still commuting into Los Angeles and nearby jurisdictions, while increasing economic prosperity in the Antelope and Victor valleys

The NCTC JPA January 2022 Executive Director Update will cover the following items:

1. ANTELOPE VALLEY LINE (AVL) SERVICE CAPACITY IMPROVEMENTS

On December 2, 2021, the Metro Board of Directors certified the Environmental Impact Report (EIR) for the Antelope Valley Line Service and Capacity Improvements. Construction could begin by 2023 and the phased completion of the projects is scheduled for completion by 2026.

At the request of the NCTC, Metro Regional Rail presented the estimated AVL Study Phase 2 improvements that will provide 30-minute bi-directional passenger rail service between LA Union Station and City of Lancaster for an estimated \$550 million. NCTC staff will work with our partners at Metro and Metrolink to seek the next cycle of Federal and SB1 grants to fund the Phase 2 AVL Improvements.

2. SR14 TRAFFIC SAFETY IMPROVEMENT PROJECT

The Executive Director was authorized at the October 18, 2021, NCTC Board Meeting to prepare and send a letter to Caltrans requesting their continued funding of the next phase of the SR14 Traffic Safety Improvement Project. NCTC jurisdictions will commit our share of resources. However, for this project to become a reality, it is clear to NCTC members that Caltrans and Metro must take the lead to advance the critical life-saving improvements needed on SR-14 in the Antelope Valley and Santa Clarita Valley.

We have proven with Caltrans and Metro at the helm, we can be successful to improve mobility for north Los Angeles County. Therefore, NCTC is respectfully requesting that the State/Caltrans provide the funding for the next phase of the project, which consists of the Environmental and Preliminary Phase and estimated to cost between \$40 million and \$60 million. The NCTC Board of Directors has already allocated \$4.7 million to this project with its share of local Measure M sales-tax funds.

NCTC staff will work with our partners at Caltrans and Metro to seek the next cycle of Federal and SB1 grants to fund the SR14 Traffic Safety Improvements.

3. METRO GOLDEN OPPORTUNITY PACKAGE

In December 2021, the Metro Board of Directors unanimously signed a letter to the Los Angeles County State Legislative Delegation seeking a myriad of mobility improvements from the State Budget Surplus (attached). The "Metro Golden Opportunity Package" requests billions in multi-modal transportation funding for Los Angeles County that includes items beneficial to North Los Angeles County mobility including \$1 billion for "California Next Generation High Speed Rail Program" for the Antelope Valley Line and \$500 million for the Active Transportation Program. The NCTC should support this effort and continue to advocate for NCTC priorities on SR14, SR138 and AVL.

4. NCTC PARTICIPATES WITH SCAG AND KERN COG

On January 14, 2021, Chair Mclean, Director Carrillo, Director Gibbs, NCTC SCAG Transportation Committee Appointee Lancaster Councilmember Dorris, numerous elected officials from SCAG and the Kern County Council of Governments, and many staff discussed issues of mutual interest such as Investment in Freeway Safety and Capacity Enhancement, Goods Movement/Distribution Centers impacts, Housing Affordability, and Regional Equity, including Equity for Rural Roads in urbanized counties. The NCTC delegation spoke about fatalities and safety issues surrounding the SR14, SR138, and other unincorporated North Los Angeles County roads connecting to rural communities, many of which are Equity Focused/Opportunity Zones and near Goods Movement Distribution Centers. NCTC Members also spoke to the Housing Affordability Crisis their constituents face who have limited transit options and must rely on the road network to travel. All agreed that SCAG, NCTC, and Kern COG will look for opportunities to advocate for mutual priorities. We will report back on the progress of this effort.

<u>Rural Road Equity</u>: NCTC Executive Director has spoken about Rural Road Equity in numerous forums. The focal point is that Rural Roads such as the SR14 and SR138 must compete for scarce highways funds in Urbanized Counties like Los Angeles County against major Interstates like the I-5, I-10 and I-405. The below language was supported and requested by Representative Mike Garcia (25th District) but did not get into the final Biden Infrastructure Bill.

For insertion in H.R. 2 INVEST in America Act or other highway transportation legislation. Draft Language for consideration:

Funding \$\$\$\$\$ from XXXXX is hereby authorized for highway transportation infrastructure projects on the National Highway System located in rural areas of North Los Angeles County that are vital to access strategic defense facilities, expedite goods movement, and/or have significant safety and nonstandard issues that result in a high number of vehicular collisions resulting in death or severe injury.

Eligible projects include curve corrections, passing lanes, traffic signals, profile grade corrections, roundabouts and other infrastructure improvements designed to improve access and egress and eliminate unsafe conditions and nonstandard issues. The Federal Highway Administration shall work with State Departments of Transportation, Regional Transportation Agencies and Local Agencies to identify and select eligible projects for this program.

5. NCTC LETTER SUPPORTS FULL FUNDING FOR METRO LAW ENFORCEMENT

On November 15, 2021, the NCTC JPA held a Special Board meeting with Los Angeles County Sheriff Alex Villanueva to discuss law enforcement issues in north Los Angeles County. The NCTC JPA Board directed staff to send a letter to the Metro Board of Directors strongly supporting the \$75.2 million allocation for continued Metro contracted Law Enforcement Services on Metro's Transit Systems (attached). NCTC strongly believes fully funding the existing law enforcement contracts for 2022 by allocating \$75.2 million on the Metro system is critically important. On December 2, 2021, the Metro Board of Directors approved fully funding the law enforcement contracts.

On behalf of the North Los Angeles County Transportation Coalition JPA (NCTC) member agencies Los Angeles County 5th District, the Cities of Lancaster, Palmdale and Santa Clarita located in North Los Angeles County, we strongly support the \$75.2 million allocation for continued Metro contracted Law Enforcement Services on Metro's Transit Systems as staff recommends in Board Agenda Item 25. NCTC strongly believes fully funding the existing law enforcement contracts for 2022 by allocating \$75.2 million on the Metro system is critical.

NCTC members strongly oppose recommendations made by the Metro Public Safety Advisory Council to end the current law enforcement contracts with the Los Angeles County Sheriff, LAPD, and Long Beach PD by the end of December. NCTC believes the Public Safety Advisory Council does not reflect the transit riders in north Los Angeles County and in numerous Metro NextGen surveys who continue to highlight the need for more law enforcement combined with more reliable, clean mobility options.

To close, NCTC fully supports the \$75.2 million allocation for continued Metro contracted Law Enforcement Services on Metro's Transit System and opposes the Metro Public Safety Advisory Council recommendation to end the current law enforcement contracts.

Thank you for your deliberation and leadership on this issue.

Dear LA County Delegation,

As we close out another year of historic challenges, we are grateful for your work in ensuring that California continues to deliver on critical priorities, especially regarding transportation, climate change, and equity. We look forward to continuing our work with you on the FY 2022-2023 budget, as we believe the current budget surplus presents what we consider **a golden opportunity** to improve mobility and quality of life for California residents. We would like to thank the Los Angeles County Legislative Delegation and Governor Newsom for enacting key environmental reform measures, including SB 288 (Weiner) and SB 44 (Allen), as well as AB 917 (Bloom) which will support enforcement of bus only lanes.

The Los Angeles County Metropolitan Transportation Authority (Metro) Board of Directors and our partner organizations urge you to continue your momentum by investing existing State budget surplus funds in LA County mobility projects. Coupled with the investment of the Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act (IIJA), these funds will allow Los Angeles to significantly advance the nation's most comprehensive transit system expansion, while addressing long-standing inequities by bringing transit to disadvantaged communities.

We are executing a long-term strategy to transform Los Angeles County, creating a true regional transportation system supporting the mobility of the future. In the coming years, we will host some of the largest, most complex events held anywhere in the world, including Super Bowl LVI, the Major League Baseball All-Star Game in 2022, and the 2028 Summer Olympic and Paralympic Games. Los Angeles County's infrastructure will need to accommodate tens of thousands of visitors from around the world for these events, while ensuring Angelenos can continue to navigate the region without significant disruption. Each of these events represents an opportunity to create legacy benefits for the residents of LA County: climate, equity, and workforce development. Our infrastructure also will need to position local businesses to meet the demand for commerce and tourism, realizing an important boost for our region's continued economic recovery.

At this historic moment, the future is now. We have the opportunity not just to complete individual projects, but to connect communities across our region, especially those who have been historically marginalized. Our coalition has worked to put a system in place that is greater than the sum of any of its parts. Metro's 2020 Long Range Transportation Plan estimates that our 30-year capital investment program, in combination with equity-focused

polices, will reduce greenhouse gas emissions by 19%, increase transit trips by 81% and create more than 1.8 million high-road construction and indirect jobs. The transit investment alone will dramatically expand regional access to high-quality travel options. After implementation, the number of county residents and jobs located within a 10-minute walk to high-quality bus and rail more than doubles.

While Metro may build a project in one area and expand a rail line in another, all of these projects combine to create benefits not just in one sub-region but throughout the county. For example, the completion of the Metro Eastside Extension and the Metro Exposition Line created an opportunity for people who live on the Eastside to take transit to the beach. Completing the Metro Orange Line across the San Fernando Valley allowed people to take transit from the western end of the San Fernando Valley to Downtown Los Angeles.

Our coalition is focused on mutual priorities and urges the State to allocate at least \$16.5 billion to transportation infrastructure in the upcoming budget. We believe an appropriate investment strategy is the following **Golden Opportunity Package**:

1. \$10 billion for Public Transit capital projects. Funding could be matched with local resources, as well as resources from IIJA. Leveraging State funds with local and federal dollars would multiply the positive impact of the State's investment and create tens of thousands of jobs.

Projects that could be funded from this allocation include the following key Metro priorities:

- Bus Rapid Transit/Bus-Only Lanes Countywide Expansion
- East San Fernando Valley Transit Corridor
- Eastside Transit Corridor Phase 2
- Foothill Extension of the Metro Gold Line
- Green Line Extension to Torrance
- Inglewood Transit Connector Project
- Sepulveda Transit Corridor
- Strategic State of Good Repair Investments such as Metro Green Line Rehabilitation
- West Santa Ana Branch Transit Corridor to Downtown LA
- 2. \$2.5 billion for projects that support the 2028 Summer Olympic and Paralympic Games. These funds could be allocated through the Transit and Intercity Rail Capital Program (TIRCP). However, these funds should be subject to controlling criteria separate from the regular TIRCP. With the world watching us, Southern California has an audacious goal for the Olympic and Paralympic Games: we want to enable all ticketed spectators to access competition venues by public transit, walking, or cycling. To ensure we provide a world-class user experience for these visitors and their

tourism revenue, we must improve and expand our core system to enhance speed, reliability, and connectivity. Projects that would achieve this goal include, but are not limited to:

- Adding capacity at key transit stations and transit system bottlenecks
- Expanding bus-only lanes on major arterial streets countywide
- Investments in zero emissions charging infrastructure
- Optimizing access to major venues and activity centers
- Planning and design activities for these projects
- 3. Increased allocation of up to \$500 million for the Active Transportation Program. These funds would help address the backlog of planned projects and link housing and transit in underserved communities. These linkages ensure that people who use transit can walk on safe sidewalks, ride bicycles on streets with proper bike facilities, and find their way around the county safely without using a car. Projects that could be funded out of this category include, but are not limited to:
 - First Mile/Last Mile connectivity
 - Modernizing bikeways to provide enhanced safety features
 - Rail to River
- 4. \$1 billion for a new California Next Generation High Speed Rail Program. This funding would support Metrolink's SCORE program helping to achieve the California State Rail Plan, Antelope Valley Rail Line improvements, and CA HSR Phase 1A projects in Los Angeles County. This category could fund projects such as:
 - Capacity and safety enhancements on Metrolink's entire system
 - Double tracking on key corridors such as the Antelope Valley Line
 - Palmdale to Burbank Tunnel
- 5. At least \$1 billion for Transit Customer Service, Resiliency and Fare Reduction programs. Over the past year, Metro's ridership has steadily recovered. We must maintain our momentum by investing in initiatives that will provide a safe, clean, and affordable system. Los Angeles County is also served by a network of municipal bus operators. This funding would also help to address similar needs on those systems. This program could fund key customer improvements such as:
 - Improved bus stop lighting
 - Providing shade at exposed bus stops
 - Supporting reduced and free fare programs, such as the Fareless System Initiative
- 6. \$1 billion for the deployment of zero emission buses. Metro is leading the State in this effort, as we aim to convert the State's largest bus fleet to zero emission 10 years ahead of the State's requirement of 2040. We have already completed the conversion

of the Metro G/Orange Line to zero emission, and we are currently converting the Metro J/Silver Line. Zero emission buses continue to be significantly more expensive to procure than traditional CNG buses. The high cost of the charging infrastructure is also a significant challenge. This funding should be made available to purchase vehicles, install the necessary charging infrastructure, including support for the conversion of the municipal transit fleet to zero emission buses, as well as workforce development training. We also look forward to an ongoing commitment to funding both zero emission buses and trucks.

7. \$500 million for the Trade Corridors Enhancement Program and critical projects such as the San Gabriel Valley Council of Governments' Montebello and Turnbull Canyon Grade Separation Projects to address the supply-chain infrastructure. Los Angeles County is the epicenter of goods movement in California, with 40% of the nation's container shipments coming through its ports and ending up on trucks that use the Southern California freeway system and on trains that traverse our region. The Ports of Los Angeles and Long Beach have outlined significant investments that would help to relieve this backlog. This crisis also points out the need to maintain a strong State commitment to investing in goods movement-related infrastructure.

We appreciate your consideration of our proposal. We have a once-in-a-generation, **golden opportunity** to make these truly impactful and equitable changes in transportation for the Southern California Region. We look forward to achieving these goals together, working cooperatively with the legislature and the Newsom Administration throughout the budget process.
