

WHAT'S NEXT

Summer is here and I think it's safe to say we are all welcoming the summer into Lancaster with open arms. As we all start to put the pandemic behind us, I want to acknowledge our amazing Lancaster City staff who have remained dedicated to providing essential services over the last year. Our staff has overcome many unexpected challenges with efficiency all while keeping our City running smoothly. I could not be more proud to work with such incredible, hard-working people.

It also cannot be overstated how grateful the City is to our Lancaster community. Without your willingness to stay safe, stay healthy and support one another, we would not be able to reopen safely. Your perseverance, resilience and optimism has seen us through to the end of this crisis.

The City has continued to push to make Lancaster a more resilient City and a better place to live for all of its residents. Lancaster has always prioritized futuristic thinking and progressing forward. We did not stop pursuing new initiatives and projects during the pandemic and we are ready to dive head first into the post-pandemic world.

The City of Lancaster developed a vision for hydrogen as a new way to further decarbonize – a mission the City embarked on over a decade ago in 2009. Lancaster attracted companies that had already built innovative hydrogen projects and that are being developed with major companies like Hitachi Zosen Inova, SGH2, Toshiba, and Heliogen. The City of Lancaster committed to becoming the first "Net Zero" energy city in the world and achieved that goal in 2019.

As we continue to look forward, approximately \$75 million will be invested into the Capital Improvement Program this fiscal year. Lancaster continues to proactively address safety concerns at problematic roadways and intersections through the Complete Streets Safer Action Plan and the Measure R Interchange Improvements that has \$15 million earmarked for construction.

Further more, we acquired Measure M, a sales tax proposed by the Los Angeles County Metropolitan Transportation Authority (METRO) and approved by voters in 2016, that will fund \$50 million in Lancaster roadway preservation and rehabilitation through 2023. Proceeds from Measure M and Measure R will also fuel local infrastructure investments.

Lancaster youth are the future and we are investing in the next generation through our SEE AND BE SEEN program as well as the GOOD+LIFE Manufacturing Training Program. The all-inclusive playground at Sgt. Steve Owen Memorial Park was also completed this past year, giving all children of all abilities a safe place to play and enjoy themselves.

Though the past year has been incredibly difficult, we have so much to celebrate in Lancaster! It is our hope that you continue to support us as we push Lancaster into a green future. Bigger and better things are on the horizon for Lancaster and we can't wait to embrace them.

UPDATE FROM THE CITY OF LANCASTER'S SOCIAL EQUITY COMMISSION

Our vision is to ensure all citizens of Lancaster have equitable access to opportunities and the resources necessary to thrive and succeed within an environment where everyone feels safe, heard, respected, and valued.

WHAT IS SOCIAL EQUITY?

Social equity aims to achieve fair outcomes for all. Building greater social equity involves addressing existing outcome disparities due to race, income, age, gender, health, ability, and other factors.

There is a common misconception between equity and equality. While both equity and equality promote fairness, the terms are distinct in how each achieves fairness. Equality is treating everyone the same regardless of need. Equity, on the other hand, is treating everyone fairly by recognizing their needs. Equity attempts to correct the imbalance between the advantaged and disadvantaged, which creates an even starting point for everyone, and thus fair outcomes for everyone.

In the City of Lancaster, our mission is to cultivate and sustain equity, diversity and inclusion within our community through accountability, transparency and civilian oversight. We are committed to understanding and overcoming the most significant and addressable social equity challenges facing our community and to stop further inequities from rising. We strive to raise the voices of underrepresented, underserved, or otherwise marginalized groups while serving as a communication bridge between the public and local government.

- Collect and recommend actions for community ideas and concerns relating to inequities in education, public safety, health and social services, housing and economic development, and other areas of the community
- Organize an inventory of all available community resources and work towards implementing programs, practices, and systems to close resource gaps

Launched in 2020, the GOOD+LIFE Manufacturing Social Enterprise Program is a vocational skills apprenticeship program where young people ages 18-24 years old are compensated as they learn a trade.

This pilot program was developed by the City's Community Services division in partnership with Lost Angels Children's Project (LACP). The program operates in collaboration with L.A. County's Office of Education, Department of Social Services, and Homeless Initiative, as well as America's Job Center of California. Participants receive hands-on experience in welding, fabrication, auto restoration, mechanics, composites, bodywork, paint and prep, and much more.

In the words of Aaron Valencia, LACP founder & CEO, the program aims to provide "'Adulting' and life skills right along with the vocational training."

Before participating in GOOD+LIFE, John was an unemployed young parent with limited job experience. After graduating from the program, John landed a permanent, living wage, career-oriented position at Northrop Grumman. When program graduate Ashley heard about the GOOD+LIFE program, she was working at a fast food restaurant and did not have a driver's license. Although attending a local college, she needed work experience and job skills to move forward in her career path.

Enrolling in the program, Ashley displayed an amazing work ethic, drive, and leadership abilities; obtained her driver's license with assistance from LACP; and found a job opportunity at Stratolaunch. She graduated at the top of her class, is currently employed at a local aerospace company, and continues working toward her engineering degree. (continued on pg. 6)

At the time of this writing, 92% of the program's participants have successfully graduated from the program, and 81% have been hired into permanent, full-time employment after graduation. While the numbers are inspiring, the true measurement of success is the GOOD+LIFE's impact on the lives of graduates and their families.

The 12-week GOOD+LIFE program is offered for Transitional Age Youth (TAY), ages 18-24, especially those who are experiencing or at risk of unemployment and/or homelessness. When attempting to transition into independent living and adulthood, many TAY individuals experience barriers associated with housing and employment - ending up homeless. As such, this program is a key homelessness prevention strategy in the City's Homelessness Plan. To help TAY succeed, this program provides training and work experience needed to obtain gainful employment, while also connecting students to job placement assistance and supportive services. Program alumnus Roberto received a job offer from his company of choice, Northrop Grumman, before he even graduated the program. He reminisces about GOOD+LIFE, "They were just here to help you with whatever problems you had, not just class-wise, but life-wise. And that just kinda made you feel at home."

While GOOD+LIFE is a newer program, local non-profit Lost Angels has worked to transform young people's lives for years. Jadon, now a Program Assistant with LACP, tells the story of how he was involved in trouble as a teen, resulting in community services hours, which he completed under LACP.

Little did he know his time with LACP would become his career. He credits Lost Angels with not only teaching him a trade, but helping him become "a better worker, a better person" and an "upstanding citizen." He says "it helped me become the man I am today and taught me everything I know, from manners to trades."

Prevention programs like GOOD+LIFE aim to assist individuals in regaining a sense of control and feeling of empowerment to actively overcome obstacles. This process involves highlighting the individual's goals, positive choices, and their strengths – all of which reinforce the progress that is essential to self-determination and success.

SHOPPING CART PROGRAM

The City of Lancaster is helping local businesses locate and retrieve their displaced shopping carts that have been displaced. When shopping carts are scattered throughout Lancaster, not only are the carts unable to be utilized by local customers but they can also turn into litter, block streets and sidewalks, ding cars and end up in road gutters where they catch debris and become unwanted dams.

In 2018, Lancaster adopted an ordinance that requires businesses that own shopping carts to create a cart containment and retrieval plan to avoid runaway carts. If a cart owner is unable to retrieve their own carts within three business days of receiving a notification from the City, each cart retrieved will have an impound fee. The City will store the carts in its maintenance yard for a fee of \$8 per day until picked up. After 30 days, the carts will be destroyed and the store will be responsible for fees incurred during that time.

Housing shopping carts in their proper place will help keep Lancaster a beautiful and safe place to live and shop.

GETTING BACK TO TRAVELING



Getting back to life as usual means slowly getting back to our daily routines. As more residents start to head out onto the road, the City of Lancaster has a few Safe Driving reminders to help create a safe environment for all of our residents.

- FOLLOW THE SPEED LIMIT It is important to adhere to the posted speed limits at all times.
- **FOLLOW TRAFFIC SIGNALS** Pay close attention to and obey stop signs and traffic lights.

RESPECT THE

- **YELLOW LIGHT** The yellow light is used to notify drivers to slow down and prepare to stop.
- **NEVER DRIVE UNDER** THE INFLUENCE Do not operate a vehicle if you have been drinking or if you are otherwise impaired.

5 SEE & BE SEEN

Actively pay attention to your actions and those around you. Texting while driving, as well as other types of distractions, are very dangerous and must be avoided while operating a vehicle.

- **6** SHARE THE ROAD This includes yielding to the right of way and recognizing that all drivers, pedestrians, and bicycles deserve to be treated with respect.
- **7** BUCKLE UP Wearing your seat belt reduces injuries during crashes.



Don't flush! Help keep your home's sewer pipes clog-free and the City of Lancaster's sewer system flowing by throwing your wipes away.

YOU CAN MAKE AN IMPACT

WIPES CLOG PIPES!

DID YOU KNOW THE "FLUSHABLE WIPE" IS NOT **ACTUALLY SUPPOSED TO BE FLUSHED?**

Golf balls are flushable, but that does not mean they are supposed to be flushed down the toilet.

"Flushable" wipes are made of nylon fibers to prevent tearing and the accidental poke-through. This characteristic does not allow for the wipe to break down like standard toilet paper. These wipes will clump together in low spots of sewer pipes, slow down the flow of the waste stream, and can cause clogs in pumps.

WATCH FOR SIGNS OF HEAT ILLNESSES

Heat exhaustion and heatstroke are serious. Heat exhaustion signs include profuse sweating, headaches, dizziness, and nausea. If left untreated, it can lead to more serious conditions. Heatstroke signs include very hot dry skin, confusion, or convulsions. For either, find a cool, shady, or air-conditioned place and reduce body temperature with damp cloths, water misting, or ice packs. For heat exhaustion, encourage the individual to drink water. For persons experiencing heatstroke, call 911 immediately to request emergency medical help. Do not provide anyone experiencing heatstroke with food, water, or aspirin.



NEVER LEAVE CHILDREN OR PETS ALONE IN VEHICLES

It only takes moments to reach dangerous temperatures inside a vehicle as they can quickly become higher than the temperatures outside.

DRESS LIGHTLY

Wear lightweight and light-colored clothing that allows airflow.

EXERCISE

Avoid strenuous activities outdoors during the hottest part of the day, typically between 10 AM and 3 PM.

STAY HYDRATED

Drink plenty of water on a regular basis. Remember to keep water out for thirsty pets.



NOTICE ON ILLEGAL FIREWORKS

Please be responsible and leave the use of fireworks to the professionals. Every year, fires and serious injuries to people and pets result from the illegal use of fireworks including burns, blinding, and even disfiguration. Fireworks may cause distress, cost the county millions of dollars in property loss, and put your property at risk.

Fines for the use of illegal fireworks, including "Safe and Sane" fireworks, begin at \$2,500. The use, possession, sale, and transportation of all types of fireworks are illegal in Lancaster and any of the unincorporated areas of Los Angeles County.

To report illegal fireworks, please call the non-emergency number at the Lancaster Sheriff Station, (661) 948-8466 or the Los Angeles County Fire Department, which has a hotline at 888-654-FIRE (3473).

DERELICT VEHICLES & PROJECT CARS

Did you know that the Municipal Code prohibits storing dismantled, inoperative, or wrecked vehicles (including boats and trailers) outdoors? An inoperative vehicle is any vehicle that appears to be incapable of legally driving on the street and must be stored insided an enclosed garage.

Junk cars are not just unsightly, they also provide harborage for rodents that may transmit Hantavirus, plague, and other diseases.

When inoperative vehicles are found, Code Enforcement Officers can cite the vehicle or the person in control of the property, or they can impound the vehicle.

- Make the vehicle operable
- Store it inside a garage



A GREEN FUTURE:

Hitachi Zosen Inova's Anaerobic Digestion Process



A new waste-to-energy solution is coming to Lancaster in partnership with Hitachi Zosen Inova and Waste Management.

Hitachi Zosen Inova is a global cleantech company operating in energy-from-waste using their Kompogas® technology. Their \$100 million anaerobic digestion plant, called LOW-C, will be developed at the Lancaster landfill to produce renewable natural gas. In alignment with Lancaster's hydrogen city efforts, the plant will be co-developed with a nearby hydrogen facility using Hitachi's latest green hydrogen generation technology.

What is Anaerobic Digestion? Anaerobic digestion is the process in which organic matter is broken down to produce two valuable outputs: biogas and natural fertilizer. Hitachi Zosen Inova's Kompogas® plant is called an anaerobic digester which treats food and yard waste in an oxygen-free environment and converts it into biogas, electricity, and heat.

The following materials are considered organic and can be processed in an anaerobic digester:

- Food scraps from residential properties
- · Food scraps from businesses (e.g., restaurants)
- · Commercial food processing waste
- Fats, oils and greases
- Yard waste



35 MILLION TONS OF FOOD WASTE IS SENT TO LANDFILLS EACH YEAR.

DID YOU KNOW?

Food waste is the largest category of municipal solid waste sent to landfills in the United States, accounting for approximately 24% of the waste stream. Over 35 million tons of food waste is sent to landfills each year.

WHAT'S THE BENEFIT?

A healthier planet. If organic materials are allowed to decay in landfills, methane and carbon dioxide can be released into the air and contribute to climate change. We also lose valuable nutrients from our ecosystem when we send organic materials to the landfill. When these materials are anaerobically digested, the resulting nutrients found in digestate can be used to feed and nourish soil. Through Kompogas® anaerobic digestion, one ton of organic waste can yield around 850 kg of compost and liquid fertilizer, and 100 Nm3 of biogas containing some 600 kilowatt-hours of heat.

This project is supported by California SB 1383, which requires cities and companies to divert organic waste from landfills to reduce methane emissions. The Hitachi Zosen Inova plant in Lancaster is on track to begin construction by the end of 2021.



GETTING BACK TO BUSINESS GROWTH

As the state and nation are beginning to move out of the COVID-19 pandemic restrictions, retailers and developers have started to expand or build out their 2021/2022 development plans.

For commercial development, economists estimate recovery will be in full swing by mid-summer this year and that there is more than \$1.5 trillion in pent-up retail demand nationwide that should help speed up recovery across all retail segments.

The City has partnered with The Retail Coach to assist with retail recruitment efforts. The knowledge, relationships, and data they provide help to market Lancaster to national retailers. With The Retail Coach, we are actively recruiting retailers across all retail segments, including soft goods retailers and discount department stores, grocery and specialty grocers, fast-casual and casual sit-down restaurants, entertainment, and more.

There is already an abundance of growth in Lancaster. While we cannot announce all the new growth yet, the new developments and retailers/ restaurants planning locations in Lancaster will help drive additional growth by complementing the existing retail base and creating opportunity for more retail synergy. This ultimately provides opportunities for the co-tenancy that retailers look for in new markets.

HOUSING

- 382 market-rate apartment units were approved for the corner of 20th Street West and Avenue I.
- 176 market-rate single-family units with accessory dwelling units will be developed near 40th Street West and Avenue J-10.
- An additional 336 affordable multi-family units have been approved around the City.

COMMERCIAL

- The former Toys "R" Us site is beginning to take shape and the City is working with the site owner and developer to bring new brands to the City.
- A new 7-11 development was approved at the corner of 20th Street West and Avenue J.
- Two Dutch Bros Coffee are currently under review, which will bring a new coffee concept to the valley.





Aquatic Class Information

PARENT/TOT

(6mos-3yrs) Parents teach their children to feel more relaxed and comfortable in the water.

PRESCHOOL

(3-5yrs.) Children learn to feel comfortable in water as well as how to control breathing, flutter kick, front float and back float. This is not a learn-to-swim class.

PRESCHOOL 2

(3-5yrs) Prerequisite: Three sessions of Preschool swim class. Preschoolers advance to prone kick glide and underwater movement as well as combination arm and kick movements.

PRESCHOOL 3

(3-5yrs) Prerequisite: Three sessions of Preschool 2 swim class. Preschoolers advance to side breathing as well as enhance combined arm and kick movements.

LEVEL 1: INTRODUCTION TO WATER SKILLS

(6-14yrs) Helps students feel comfortable in water. Learn to enter and exit water safely; submerge mouth, nose and eyes; exhale underwater through mouth and nose; open eyes underwater; pick up submerged objects as well as float on front and back.

LEVEL 2: FUNDAMENTAL AQUATIC SKILLS

(6-14yrs) Teaches fundamental skills and enhances Level 1 skills. Learn to enter water by stepping or jumping from side; exit water safely using ladder or side; submerge entire head; perform front and back glide; roll over from front to back, back to front; swim on side; swim on front and back and tread water.

LEVEL 3: STROKE DEVELOPMENT

(6-14yrs) Builds on skills in Level 2 through additional guided practice. Learn to jump into deep water from side; dive from kneeling or standing position; submerge and retrieve an object; bob with head fully submerged; use rotary breathing in horizontal position; perform Check-Call-Care in an emergency; and change from horizontal to vertical position on front and back.

Additional skills taught include front and back glide, survival float, front and back crawl, butterfly kick and body motion, HELP and Huddle position and reaching assist.

LEVEL 4: STROKE IMPROVEMENT

(6-14yrs) Develops confidence in skills learned and improves Level 3 skills. Learn to shallow dive and dive from stride position; swim underwater; feet-first surface dive; tread water using sculling arm motions and kick; swim on side and perform open turns on front and back using any stroke.

Additional skills include front and back crawl, breaststroke, butterfly and elementary backstroke.

LEVEL 5: STROKE REFINEMENT

(6-14yrs) Provides further coordination and refinement of Level 4 strokes and teaching survival swimming. Learn to tread water with two different kicks; perform rescue breathing; standing dive; shallow dive; glide two body lengths and begin any front stroke.

LEVEL 6: SWIMMING AND SKILL PROFICIENCY

(6-14yrs) Refines the student's strokes to improve swimming ease, efficiency, power and smoothness over greater distances. Class is designed with "menu" options that focus on preparing students to participate in more advanced courses.




