General Facts:

- It is illegal to consume cannabis products while you are driving or riding as a passenger in a vehicle.
- People who drive after using cannabis may increase their risk of crashing by 25% to 35%.
- Under the Per Se Law, if suspected of DUI, Law Enforcement officers can take your license and provide you with a temporary driver's license for 30 days.
- · Anyone granted the driving privilege is presumed to have given consent to law enforcement to conduct chemical testing of the motorist's blood or breath.

Effects of Driving Impaired:

- Studies show that drivers with only a small amount of THC in their blood can feel the effects.
- Drivers often try to be more cautious, driving slower than usual, even sometimes too slow.
- Drivers tend to weave in and out of lanes more, react slower to traffic lights and unexpected obstacles, and are less aware of their speed.
- The effect of cannabis is most potent during the first 30 minutes after consumption.
- The impairing effect rises rapidly and remains for some time. These effects can be delayed if the cannabis is ingested rather than smoked.
- Estimates show that almost 44% of drivers in fatal car crashes tested positive for drugs including cannabis.



Consequences of Driving Impaired:

Several studies have shown that drivers with THC in their blood were roughly twice as likely to be responsible for a deadly crash or be killed than drivers who hadn't used drugs or alcohol.

All DUI convictions remain on your driver's record for ten years (DMV, 2023).

When convicted, you must (DMV, 2023):

- Complete a DUI Program
- File an SR 22/sr 1p
- May be required to install an ignition interlock device on your vehicle.
- May be sentenced to 6 months in jail
- May have to pay a fine
- May have your car impounded
- May face a civil lawsuit if you cause serious injury/death

Solutions to Avoid Driving Impaired:

- Designate a support driver Before going out, designate a sober support person to drive and support where needed.
- Call a cab/ride-share service.
- Stay at home or a hotel If you can't find a safe way to travel, stay home or find lodging.
- Call a friend or family member.
 Identifying an "In Case of Emergency"
 (ICE) group to save on your phone is good. These are people that you can call if you need help.
