leader who will ensure the City reaches its public safety goals."



Lancaster Sheriff's Operations Named One of Nation's Best

A recent study by Altus, a global organization committed to improving public safety and government accountability, found the Lancaster Sheriff's Station to be among the best in the nation, ranking third overall. The Altus survey, conducted last October, sent local community groups to more than 800 police stations around the globe.

The Lancaster station received an overall score of 87.3 out of a possible 100 based on five areas of observation – the organization's community orientation, the physical conditions of the station, equality in treatment of the public, detention conditions, along with transparency and accountability. Each of these categories contributed 20 percent to the overall score. Lancaster scored substantially above the average score of 75 recorded by the 22 public safety organizations tallied within the U.S.

City Expands Environmental Efforts by Adding to Alternative Fuel Fleet

The City of Lancaster is reducing its impact on the environment by using more vehicles powered by alternative fuels. Today, about 20 percent of the City's sedans and pickups run alternative fuels and six more hybrids are on order.

The effort began in 1994 when the City joined the Blue Skies Program and adopted policies advocating the use of alternative fuels whenever possible. This has now blossomed into a fleet of 12 compressed natural gas (CNG) vehicles and 17 hybrid-electric cars and trucks. Public Works also uses two large dump trucks that run on a combination of diesel and CNG.

Extra costs associated with vehicles that use alternative fuel are offset by funds from the State available to help reduce pollution. Thanks to these, the negative economic impact is minimized, while the positive environmental impact is maximized.



Household chemicals and electronic components can cause serious damage to the environment by leaching into water supplies and contaminating the earth.

Since 2005, many Antelope Valley residents have done their part to protect the eco-system by bringing hazardous household waste (HHW) and unwanted electronic equipment (e-waste) to the Antelope Valley Environmental Collection Center. Over the last three years the Center has collected, recycled and properly disposed of over 2.2 million pounds of such toxic garbage.

The Center is located at the Antelope Valley Public Landfill, 1200 West City Ranch Road in Palmdale and is open on the 1st and 3rd Saturdays of each month from 9 am to 3 pm. There is no charge to safely dispose of these materials at the AVECC.

Polite Pooches Enjoy Hull Dog Park

All dogs need exercise and the chance to explore the great outdoors. The City's Hull Dog Park can be a great place for this to happen. Observe these simple rules to ensure fun for everyone:

- Remove leash after entering play area.
- Dogs should wear buckle collars with ID.
- Be sure your dog is current on vaccinations.
- Do not bring treats or food into play area.
- Dogs under four months old and females in season should not use the dog park.
- If dog seems overly excited on arrival, keep your pet on a leash outside the play area for a few minutes. This will let them adjust to the park and calm down.
- Never leave your dog unattended.
- Keep the park neutral territory by walking around with your dog. Don't stay in one place for extended periods.
- Smaller dogs should play in the area designated for breeds of similar size.
- If your dog becomes unruly or bullies other animals, it is time to leave.
- Always clean up after your dog.
- Supervise young children and do not allow them to run or yell around the play area.

City Sets Time for Roadside Memorials

For grieving friends and families of someone lost in a traffic accident, roadside memorials provide an important means of remembrance and respect for loved ones. The City of Lancaster understands and strives to do everything within its power to prevent collisions and highway loss of life.

Roadside memorials to people who have lost their lives in traffic accidents remain undisturbed on public property and in the right-of-ways to give 30 days to honor the lost loved one and to remind others to drive safely. After 30 days, any memorial still in place is respectfully removed to storage where the owner may retrieve it. Any items left unclaimed for more than 60 days will be discarded.
