Residents Get Preview of New Vision for Downtown

Following up on its "Downtown Immersion" program held in May, the City of Lancaster and the planning firm of RBF Consulting unveiled a preliminary draft of a Vision Plan for Downtown Lancaster.

The plan envisions a significant transformation for the area surrounding Lancaster Boulevard between 10th Street West and Sierra Highway. The area would be divided into seven distinct districts, each with its own focus.

- The Gateway District offers a dramatic entry to downtown with a new 10th Street West roundabout.
- The Commerce District focuses on financial and professional services.
- · The Boulevard District provides entertainment and retail along with a new public plaza and amphitheater.
- The Cedar Avenue Arts District features walkways tying together lofts, galleries, living spaces and craft shops.
- The Transit District connects the Metrolink station with the rest of downtown via pedestrian friendly paseos.
- The Civic Village encompasses the existing City Hall, Library and Sheriff's Station, as well as a new park.
- · The Neighborhood Office District offers a mixture of small offices and homes intermingled with new higher density housing.

- Make sure everyone knows to "Stop, Drop and Roll" in case clothing does catch fire. Call 911 if a burn needs serious medical attention.
- Never barbecue in enclosed areas carbon monoxide could be created.




A FRESH NEW OUTLOOK!


